Good Evening Crosswinds Residents:

<u>There are several issues that have come up recently that we need to remind</u> <u>everyone of.</u>

- 1. Staff working hours are Monday Friday 8am 5pm. Any calls or emails or texts during this time, will be responded to the next business day. Office staff has 24 business hours to respond to all non-emergency calls and emails. Please be patient and polite and respectful of our staffs private and personal time.
- 2. Resident portal issues and rent payment issues can and will only be handled during regular business hours. For resetting your password or login information, please email our office at Crosswinds@lakeshoremhc.com and we will request a password reset and email to you. Again this can only be done during business hours. To prevent having to remember your log in or get locked out and have to rest your login every month, please set up the e-billing on your account and the autopay. Also, please remember, even though you have submitted your payment through the portal, it will take approximately 2 business banking days for the money to be fully withdrawn out of your bank. (ex. You submit on Saturday the 5th, your payment will not reflect out of your account until Tuesday 8th or Wednesday the 9th.) Also remember, no payments are accepted at the office. The acceptable methods of payment are via the resident portal, ACH or Paylease (via Amscot). For additional information on any of these, please let us know.
- 3. All yard maintenance, weeding, shrub trimming and tree trimming are the responsibility of the homeowner. Each homeowner is responsible for maintaining the site their home sits on. Please refer to the rules and regulations on pages 8 & 9 for clarification on this. If you need another copy, please let us know.
- 4. All pets are to be leashed and controlled when outside of the home. Way too many cats are being allowed to roam free in the community. Should yours get caught and taken to Animal Control, they will fine you. This is not just a community rule, it is a Pinellas county leash law. If you still have not provided your pets information, please remit all the required documentation so that you are not in violation of the lease terms and rules of the community.
- 5. All pets are to be picked up after anywhere and every where in the community. A lot of homeowners take pride in their yards and do not want to have to pick up or step in your pets poop. And be polite, if someone asks you to stay out of their yard, please do. Please take pet poop bags with you anytime you are outside with the pets and pick up their debris. You will be held responsible for your pets actions and you could lose your right to have the pet in the community. These rules do not exclude service animals. Service animals must also follow all rules and regulations of the community.



6. Pool use – the pool is available for residents and their guests. All guests must be accompanied by a resident, children and adults.

A. The pool hours are from 8am – dusk.

B. NO glass containers of any kind are permitted at the pool or at the TIKI Hut. ****If you weren't aware, IF a glass container breaks and glass gets into the pool or the filters the pool will have to be shut down. The pool will then have to be drained. Cleaned and thoroughly sanitized. Refilled and chemically treated. Then we have to wait for the health department to say it is all OK to open the pool back up. This could take days to weeks. And the person responsible will be held liable for the costs. ***** Even if the glass does not get into the pool, but someone gets cut by the glass and their blood goes into the pool, the pool will have to be shut down and treated and wait for inspection to re-open.*** Please refrain from this activity unless you want to lose the ability to use the pool.

C. NO eating is allowed in the pool.

D. NO smoking is allowed in the pool.

E. Please rinse off all oils and sunscreen before getting into the pool as this is what clogs up the filters and causes the black film along the edges of the tile around the pool.

7. Please stop at all stop signs and adhere to the speed limit signs of 10mph. We have recently added additional signs and will hold each resident responsible for their behaviors.

Work continues to community improvements.



- 1. Paving and striping will be completed this week. If you have a vehicle parked at the shuffleboard lot or the pool, please remove the vehicle from that area so that we can stripe the parking spaces.
- 2. The paving company will also be resurfacing driveways that the company has deemed in need of repairs. Please remove your vehicle from your driveway if you have received a separate email notification of this. Not everyone will be done. Only those that have been notified.
- 3. The laundry room is getting a bathroom.
- 4. The area by the laundry lines is getting a covered picnic pavilion with picnic tables and charcoal grills.
- 5. The old Homeowwners activities shed is being converted to a cardio only Fitness center.
- 6. There will be a screen room added to the back side of the clubhouse.
- 7. Pet poop stations will be installed around the common areas and along the outer street in the community.
- 8. We are starting a "give back to the community group and program." Stay tuned for more information.
- 9. Old community owned bathhouses and sheds are being removed.



anada Day, July 1. Often informally referred to as "Canada's birthday," Canada Day celebrates the anniversary of Canadian confederation on July 1, 1867.


Independence Day, July 4. U.S. holiday commemorating the signing of the Declaration of Independence in 1776.


- **7** ou think high school algebra was hard? Try wrapping your mind around these amazing numbers, courtesy of the Cracked website:

'We hold these truths to be self-evident ...'

n July 4, Americans celebrate the signing of the Declaration of Independence. The Declaration was officially adopted by the Continental Congress in Philadelphia on July 4, 1776, although Congress formally declared independence from Great Britain on July 2, and the Declaration wasn't signed by all 56 members until August. Some other facts about the founding document of the United States that you may not know:

- There's a message on the back. No, it's not an invisible treasure map (as in the Nicolas Cage movie National Treasure). The words "Original Declaration of Independence, dated 4th July 1776" appear on the reverse side of the document on display in the National Rotunda, at the bottom and upside down.
- About 200 copies of the Declaration were immediately produced by printer John Dunlap for ٠ distribution through the 13 colonies. Of these original "Dunlap broadsides," 26 still exist.
- The original document wasn't printed on paper, but "engrossed" on parchment. Engrossing is a process for preparing an official document in large, clear handwriting.
- At the bottom left corner of the Declaration is an unidentified handprint. Historians speculate that it's the result of the document's being rolled up for transport and handled by various people for extensive exhibition in the early years of its existence.
- The two youngest signers of the Declaration were Thomas Lynch Jr. and Edward Rutledge, both of South Carolina, both 26 years old at the time. The oldest signer was Benjamin Franklin, 70. Nine of the original signers died before the American Revolution ended in 1783.

Telepsychiatry a boon for patients during pandemic

The COVID-19 pandemic forced many health care workers into virtual mode, offering their services via Zoom or other video outlets. Mental health services were among those embracing the technology. A survey of clinicians at 18 mental health centers in 11 states, reported on the Psychiatry Advisor website, found that 73% who used two-way video to treat patients found the experience "excellent" or "good." Sixty-six percent who used phone-based services said the same. Only 4% who used video, and 3% who relied on phones, rated the experience "poor" or "very poor."

Overall, the most common advantages cited by providers were flexible scheduling or rescheduling (77%), timely appointment starts (68%), and a decline in no-shows (52%). There were some disadvantages, including technical difficulties by patients using devices (52%), lack of closeness or connection with patients (46%), and technical difficulties on the provider end (39%). Still, 64% of providers in the survey plan to continue using telepsychiatry in some capacity after the end of the pandemic.

Summer travel is back again

ots of vacations got canceled last summer. According to the Travel Weekly website, a Harris Poll reports that 77% of Americans plan to travel this summer, up from 29% in sum-

mer 2020. As of early May, two-thirds have actively planned or booked a vacation—more than half of them traveling for the first time since the start of the pandemic.

Alternatives to meat growing in acceptance

eat isn't automatically on the menu these days, according to the Lansing State Journal. A 2021 Michigan State University Food Literacy and Engagement poll found that approximately 41% of Americans say they're likely to buy artificially produced forms of meat that look and taste the same, up from 33% in 2018.

The survey looked at people's understanding of the relationship between food and climate change. One finding: Fewer than 50% of people surveyed realized that eating plant-based foods can help reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

Meatless meat was originally made from beans, soy, cauliflower, and the like. Newer versions feature plant-like "meat" designed to resemble traditional meat. But Americans are becoming more open to eating meatlike products made from other sources, like insects. One 2019 poll found that 25% of Americans are willing to try that. Meat grown from cells in labs are a potential future option, though none are commercially available in the U.S. right now. Still, 35% of Americans say they're likely to buy some when it comes out.




