

Did we drink more during COVID-19?

ocked down in 2020 because of the spreading coronavirus outbreak, many people baked bread, studied foreign languages, and stopped wearing pants. But did they drink more? It might have been tempting, but a study conducted on behalf of the Beer Institute (reported on the Craft Brewing Business website), found that most people didn't increase their consumption of beer and other

alcoholic beverages, despite the assumption that drinking must have increased during the lockdown.

Echelon Insights conducted a nationally representative survey of registered voters age 21+ during March 1–4, 2021. One in five respondents indicated they did drink more beer, wine, and liquor last year, but the same number also reported drinking less, and 60% said their drinking habits hadn't changed at all since the beginning of the pandemic.

COVID-19 did have an impact on the beer industry, though. The pandemic resulted in a loss of almost \$20 billion in retail beer sales, and more than 561,000 U.S. jobs were lost, the majority in bars and restaurants that suffered from restrictions or closed outright.

The true nightingale

H ans Christian Andersen's fairy tale, "The Nightingale," tells the story of a Chinese emperor so attracted to the singing of a nightingale outside his window that he invites the bird into his palace to live with him. At first they're happy together, but then the emperor receives a mechanical nightingale

as a gift. Losing interest in the living nightingale, he sends the bird back to the forest. Years later the emperor lies dying. The nightingale returns to his bedside to sing to him one last time. Her song is so moving that Death allows the emperor to recover.

According to the Listverse website, the inspiration for the tale may have been Jenny Lind, a famous singer known as "the Swedish Nightingale." Andersen was in love with her, but she didn't return his love, choosing instead to marry Fredric Chopin, the Polish composer.

"Through Jenny Lind I first became sensible of the holiness of art," Andersen wrote in his memoirs. "Through her I learned that one must forget one's self in the service of the supreme. No books, no men, have had a more ennobling influence upon me as a poet than Jenny Lind."





The couple produced photos of their 50-foot motor home, which was clean and well maintained and equipped with a beautiful nursery.



What does that mean? Origins of common terms

The origins of some figures of speech are obvious — putting the cart before the horse, for instance. Others are a little more obscure. From Jeff Rovin's book The Unbelievable Truth! (Signet) here's a look at the explanations behind three common expressions:

- Pulling the wool over their eyes. In the 17th and 18th centuries, thieves and robbers would yank their victims' wool wigs down over their eyes so they couldn't see who was attacking them.
- Blackmail. In 16th-century England, mail meant "rent" or "tribute." Debts that had to be paid in silver were called "whitemail."



- A debt that could be paid in any other way—from livestock to property—was called "blackmail." Because blackmail did not have a set value, the person collecting the debt could extort any amount or anything they wished from the debtor.
- Red tape. For centuries, it was British custom to seal important documents with red wax and red tape. Cutting through it was the only way to get at the documents and read them.

August: What's in a name?

ugust is named for the Roman emperor Augustus Caesar, grandnephew of Julius Caesar. When Augustus defeated Cleopatra and Mark Antony at the Battle of Actium in 30 B.C., he became emperor of Rome, and the Roman Senate quickly decided that since the month of July was named for Julius, their new emperor should also have his own month.



At the time, Sextillius (the sixth month of the year in the pre-Gregorian calendar) had only 30 days, so the Senate also decreed that the newly named August should be equal to July, and took a day from February to keep the calendar in balance.

Other emperors tried to get months named for them: May was called Claudius for a while, and April became Neronius, but the names didn't stick. Only Julius and Augustus Caesar's names apparently had the staying power to last 2,000 years.

One last barbecue? Keep it safe

The end of summer frequently means one last barbecue—your final chance to enjoy warm weather before school starts for kids and work ramps up again for everyone else. You don't want to spoil the fun with an accident at the grill, though. Keep these important safety tips in mind for a good time:

- **Read the instructions.** Whether you're using a gas grill or one that burns charcoal, take some time to read the owner's manual before starting your fire. Be sure you're following the manufacturer's safety guidelines.
- Always grill outdoors. This may seem elementary, but not everyone understands the need for proper ventilation and basic fire precautions. Your garage, or a tent, isn't a safe location for a grill.
- Keep the grill stable. Check the surface you're placing your grill on. You don't want it to tip over unexpectedly. Also, take care to place it well away from the flow of people and pets, and especially children.
- Clean the grill first. Scrape off any grease or fat that can make a fire difficult to control.
- Stay close by. Never leave your grill alone while you're talking, getting food, or enjoying yourself.
- **Dispose of coals safely.** Once you're finished, douse the hot coals thoroughly, cover the grill, and wait at least 24 hours before emptying it. Never store coals in paper, wood, or plastic

The facts about ransomware attacks

ybercriminals are increasingly demanding what's called "ransomware" to halt their attacks on company data around the world. A survey of 120 executives by Threatpost looked at its rise and implications.

Less than a third of respondents to the survey said they had suffered ransomware attacks. Of those that did, 17% were in the tech industry and 15% were in manufacturing, followed evenly by companies in finance, health care, and infrastructure.

However, 80% said they didn't pay the demanded ransom. Their main reason: They couldn't be sure paying the thieves would actually get them a decryption key. They were probably smart—80% of organizations that did pay the ransom were hit by a second attack from the same source, and a third said they suffered another attack by somebody else.

Of those companies that paid, five percent decided that giving into the demands was easier than dealing with the threatened business disruption, and two percent relied on cybersecurity insurance to cover the costs.

Sixty-five percent of attacked companies suffered a revenue loss as a result, and about a quarter had to shut down; 53% reported that their brands and reputations suffered damage, and 32% reported losing top-level talent as a result.

Getting back to normal—slowly

W ith vaccines now available and society seemingly reopening for business, at least some of us are ready to say that things are going back to normal after the pandemic year. According to Gallup, 66% of adults in the U.S. say their lives have "somewhat" or

"completely" returned to normal. That's 57% saying their lives are somewhat normal again, with only nine percent saying things are completely normal, and 34% saying normal life has yet to come back.

Complicating the return to normalcy is the finding that 52% of Americans say their life is still being disrupted because of the pandemic—14% say "a great deal" and 38% say "a fair amount." And that may not change soon. Thirty-nine percent expect the disruption to continue through the end of the year, and 16% feel the impact will last longer.
