1 t. parsley flakes

Rub lemon pepper seasoning on chicken. In a large skillet, melt butter over medium heat. Sauté chicken 7-10 minutes per side or until done. Remove chicken from skillet and keep warm. Add carrots and onions to skillet, sauté 2 minutes. Whisk together broth and flour, pour over vegetables, bring to a boil. Simmer 2 minutes. Add sour cream and parsley. Simmer 2 minutes. Pour over chicken.

WHITE CHOCOLATE AND CRANBERRY COOKIES

½ c. butter, softened
½ c. packed brown sugar
1 c. white sugar
1 egg
1 T. brandy
1 ½ c. all-purpose flour
½ t. baking soda
¾ c. white chocolate chips
1 c. dried cranberries



Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Grease cookie sheets. In a large bowl, cream together the butter and sugars until smooth. Beat in the egg and brandy. Combine the flour and baking soda; stir in the sugar mixture. Mix in the white chocolate chips and cranberries. Drop by heaping spoonfuls onto prepared cookie sheets. Bake for 8 to 10 minutes. For best results, take cookies out while they are still doughy. Allow to cool for 1 minute on cookie sheet before transferring to wire racks to cool completely. Makes 2 dozen.

"Take your eyes away from the dark spots in your life. Focus on the bright parts all around you and let positivity guide your thoughts."









Love on the rocks

re love and marriage dying? CNN reports that Americans these days don't seem to be forming relationships, moving in together, and even having as much sex as they once did.

The 2021 General Social Survey found that 26% of Americans 18 and up didn't have sex at all in the past year. That's up from 23% in 2016 and also 2018, so it's not just fear of the pandemic preventing hookups. Only slightly more than 50% reported having sex once a month or less, the first time that figured exceeded 50%.

Americans aren't shacking up as much either. The GSS found that about 62% of Americans 25–54 were living together, married or unmarried, in 2019, far below the 70% who lived together in 1990, which serves as a baseline. Ten percent more men, and seven percent more women, were living alone than in 1990.

Even without living together, partnerships aren't as popular in recent years. The GSS found that 30% of adults 25–54 had a steady partner, down from 20% in 1986.

One bright spot: The divorce rate seems to be dropping. Divorces and annulments dropped, with 2.7 per 1,000 people in 2019, down from four per 1,000 in 2000.

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
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
