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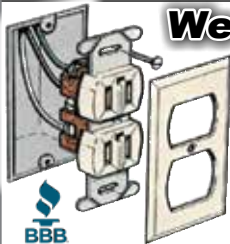

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## **BOARD BUSINESS AND UPDATES**

### **Clubhouse & Pool FOB's**

The installation of the keyless security system has been completed and fully activated. The FOB will be needed to enter the clubhouse and pool gates. The keys for the clubhouse will now only be useful if you use the laundry building on Sugar Bear.

If you have not yet received a FOB. There are request authorization forms in the information bins located by the Directors office. Complete and return to the mail slot in the director's office. You can also send a request to [briarcreekkoff@gmail.com](mailto:briarcreekkoff@gmail.com). The FOB will be delivered to your Rock Box if you are in your home at the time. If you are away please contact me when you return.

Please be aware the total replacement of the pool heaters and pumping equipment is schedule to begin in June. During the construction period the pool gates will only allow access to Directors and the construction crew. The pool area will become a construction site and access will be restricted during the construction phase. This project will take several weeks however it is necessary to re-place the 40+ year old equipment. The new state of the art electronics and environmentally friendly heater units will benefit us in the future. There will be three heaters/chillers to replace the two Geo-thermal units currently being used for the pool. The Spa will have its own dedicated heating unit.

## Cautious Reminder

Neither pool in Briar Creek is deep enough to safely dive – or jump into. The posted warning is a reminder that safety comes first. I personally know of a childhood friend who was severely injured, and wheelchair bound, from diving into shallow water. In an attempt to give credence to a cautionary tale, I searched the world wide web and found this from the Mayfield Clinic and the National Spinal Cord Injury Association. The link below will go into more detail and numbers of people living with debilitating spinal cord injuries; many

Public Service Announcement: When diving, make sure the water is deep! (mayfieldclinic.com)

*"The physics of what happens is unforgiving, as a diver can enter the water at 15 feet per sec-ond. Consider that most of these accidents occur in water that is less than 3 feet deep, and you see why the result is often severe damage to the spinal cord and -- all too often -- complete pa-ralysis." As many as one of every 10 injuries to the cervical spinal cord is caused by a diving accident.*

According to the American Association of Neurological Surgeons, an estimated 11,000 spinal cord injuries occur in the United States each year. Males suffer 81.2 percent of these injuries. Diving is the fourth leading cause of spinal cord injury among males and the fifth leading cause among females.

I, for one, found Paradise when I moved to Briar Creek. As adults (ok, seniors), we want to enjoy these second-childhood years for as long as we can. We certainly want to be safe at the pool. Most likely, those who tempt fate are kids. Please make certain that any youngsters visiting and using the pool are properly supervised by a responsible adult. It may be tempting to encour-age your six- or seven-year-old grandchild to “dive” or “jump” into the water. DON’T. Doing so is dangerous and a violation of our documents. It also counts as a “strike one.” An official letter will be sent to the resident whose FOB opened the gate.

If a resident is a ‘**repeat rule breaker.**’ There is a good chance that your **FOB will be temporally deactivated.** Three board members will assess the severity of the violation(s). Con-tact the offender; possibly deactivate the FOB. Re-activating the FOB will be determined by three board members when correction of the violation has been made.

Another cause for deactivation of FOB is **falling behind three months** in homeowners’ association fees.

Remember, in school, hearing those words; “This will be on your permanent record.”? All joking aside, we just want everyone to be safe and secure in our corner of Paradise.

# WHAT DO YOU KNOW ABOUT RAT POISON?

**N**o one wants to wake up to the sight of a rodent walking across the kitchen counter. Ideally, people will find a way to keep unwanted critters outside of our homes without killing them, especially with poison.

Safety Harbor is known for its beautiful birds, and people come from all over to see and photograph them. Recently, we had an owl family living in Philippe Park, three owlets and their parents, which nested in an oak tree where people could watch them grow and thrive. Birds of prey and raptors such as owls commonly feed upon mice, voles, rats, squirrels and (yes) rabbits and other small mammals and insects. A single great-horned owl alone can consume over 1,400 rodents in a year! They are a critical part of our balance of nature.

First one of the owlets was discovered dead. The deaths of both parents and another baby quickly followed. The remaining baby owlet, a female named Daisy, has disappeared. It was proved that all four owls were poisoned by a rodenticide, most likely by eating an infect-ed rat. Rat poison bait traps kill much more than just rats. It is spread by rodents and can be discovered and eaten by other animals, including pets. Imagine taking your dog on a walk and then discovering it had found and eaten rat poison. These products typically contain anticoagulants, which cause the animal to bleed to death internally. These poisons are also toxic to children and adults when handled improperly.

We all share a responsibility to keep our Safety Harbor wildlife safe and protected from harmful rodenticides.

You can make a big difference to protect our wildlife and pets by not using anticoagulant rat bait boxes. These poison baits actually lure rats to your property!

There are better ways to control the rodent population, including:

- Keeping garbage properly sealed
- Maintaining frequent trash pickup
- Sealing all points of entry to homes and buildings
- Removing all pet food from outdoor areas
- Avoiding spilled bird food and ground fruits
- Requiring your pest control companies not use anticoagulant

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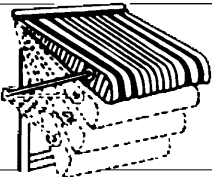

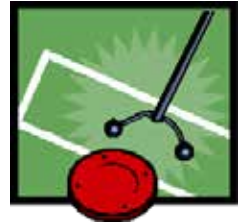
Little things make a big difference! **You can help support Ronald McDonald House** by donating the tabs you pull to open soda, soup and other aluminum cans and help the environment at the same time.

**W**hat is Juneteenth? **Juneteenth**<sup>[c]</sup> (officially **Juneteenth National Independence Day** and also known as **Jubilee Day**,<sup>[3]</sup> **Emancipation Day**,<sup>[4]</sup><sup>[5]</sup> **Freedom Day**,<sup>[6]</sup> and **Black Independence Day**<sup>[6]</sup>) is a federal holiday in the United States commemorating the emancipation of enslaved African-Americans. It is also often observed for celebrating African-American culture.<sup>[6]</sup> Originating in Galveston, Texas, it has been celebrated annually on June 19 in various parts of the United States since 1865. The day was recognized as a federal holiday on June 17, 2021, when President Joe Biden signed the Juneteenth National Independence Day Act into law.



President Abraham Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation, issued on January 1, 1863, had freed the enslaved people in Texas and all the other Southern secessionist states of the Confederacy.<sup>[10]</sup><sup>[11]</sup> Enforcement of the Proclamation generally relied upon the advance of Union troops. Texas, as the most remote state of the former Confederacy, had seen an expansion of slavery and had a low presence of Union troops as the American Civil War ended. Celebrations date to 1866, at first in Texas. They spread across the South and became more commercialized in the 1920s and 1930s, often centering on a food festival.

During the Civil Rights Movement of the 1960s, these celebrations were eclipsed by the nonviolent determination to achieve civil rights. Growing again in popularity in the 1970s with a focus on African American freedom and African-American arts. Beginning with Texas by proclamation in 1938, and by legislation in 1979, 49 U.S. states and the District of Columbia have formally recognized the holiday in various ways.<sup>[e]</sup> With its adoption in certain parts of Mexico, the holiday became an international holiday. Juneteenth is ...celebrated by the Mascogos, descendants of Black Seminoles who escaped from slavery in 1852 and settled in Coahuila, Mexico.<sup>[20]</sup><sup>[21]</sup>

Celebratory traditions often include public readings of the Emancipation Proclamation, singing traditional songs such as "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot" and "Lift Every Voice and Sing", and the reading of works by noted African-American writers, such as Ralph Ellison and Maya Angelou. Some Juneteenth celebrations also include rodeos, street fairs, cookouts, family reunions, park parties, historical reenactments, and Miss Juneteenth contests. When Juneteenth became a federal holiday on June 17, 2021,<sup>[22]</sup><sup>[23]</sup> it was the first new federal holiday since Martin Luther King Jr. Day was adopted in 1983.

Recently the BCII Board began distributing our updated Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws that residents approved in December, 2021. Distribution of the updated Restrictions that align with those documents will be distributed soon as well. The purpose of this article is to remind residents that we have chosen to live in a community that is governed through our Incorporation Articles, Bylaws and Restrictions. For the most part, they are easy to follow, at other times, perhaps not so much. Regardless, the Documents are what they are and each of us should be familiar with how they work and affect how we live in BCII. It's important to remember we are chartered under Florida Statute Chapter 718 as a "Condominium Community". Many people think of a condominium as a traditional tower like building. Increasingly, more mobile home parks are adopting this chartered approach. What this means is that many of the rules we must follow were not developed by Briar Creek. They were developed by federal, state or local legislators and enacted into law. Being a Condominium Community means BC is not legally comprised of single family homes nor are we chartered as a Home Owner's Association (HOA)". That is a different animal with a different set of state statutes and regulations. Often Condo and HOA laws and restrictions do not overlap and can be quite different. It is also important for owners to remember that our Association, like other condo associations, must comply not just with our own legal documents, but that those documents must comply first with numerous legal requirements as well. As owners, we agree at the time of purchase to abide by and live within the boundaries of those documents. While some of the issues a Board must deal with may seem petty or unreasonable, they are enforced to ensure compliance with outside regulatory requirements. Enforcing rules and restrictions can be very beneficial to our community. The many advantages of rule enforcement include protecting and enhancing home values, preserving the aesthetics of the area, community pride of ownership in BCII, maintaining common area property and that of its owners, and enforcing the community's governing documents. Living in a condominium community is not for everyone, and may not be for those that have come from areas where there were no zoning or property restrictions and now question, "what are all these rules?". Conversely, if one wants to own in a community like Briar Creek, seeking out and becoming familiar with its Documents, Bylaw and Restrictions prior to buying is critically important. That is one reason why prospective buyers are interviewed by Board Members in advance of the purchase to make them aware of what is involved in living in BCII and what is expected once the closing occurs. So, please, once you receive your updated Documents, take time to become familiar

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with their contents, follow the rules and help us work together to continue making BCII a premier community in which to live.

## **Golf clubs, gently used golf balls and the BC2 Bazaar**

**H**ave you donated unused golf clubs or golf bags to the BC2 Bazaar? Or have you bought a few dozen used golf balls to replace balls that keep going astray? If you are one of these people, then BC2 owes you a big thank you. Also we cannot forget the people who saved and dropped off their egg cartons, especially the clear plastic cartons. These cartons are essential for storing the clean balls. The money that has been raised from golf 'stuff' in the



last couple of bazaars has been a significant contributor to BC2's bazaar sales total.

The prices are hard to beat. \$5 to \$10 for a club, \$3 or \$4 for a dozen used golf balls, a golf bag with a complete set of used clubs maybe \$25 to \$40 depending on condition. Before they are sold, before or at the bazaar, these clubs and bags have been cleaned, and a bag with a set of clubs will usually have a dozen balls and a bag of tees packed into one of the pockets.

Then there are the golf balls. Last year, one of BC2's residents washed, bleached, cleaned and inspected dozens of used balls found on golf courses and at the edge of ponds on the local courses. Then they were sorted by brand and condition and as of the day of the bazaar, there were 44 dozen boxes of used balls for sale, and every one of them was sold, and another 15 boxes had been sold before Bazaar Day.

How much money has been raised by golf related 'stuff'? At the last 3 bazaars, golf 'stuff' has raised over \$680. And our golfers have been successful in asking the local golf clubs where they play for prizes, free green fees and other items for the many draws.

So next time you see one of our golfers waiting to be picked up for his or her ride to the golf course, just think, they may be going out for fun, activity and friendship, but maybe also they are going to find some used balls to contribute to the BC2 bazaar and its sales total.

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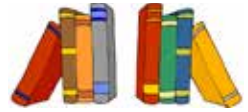

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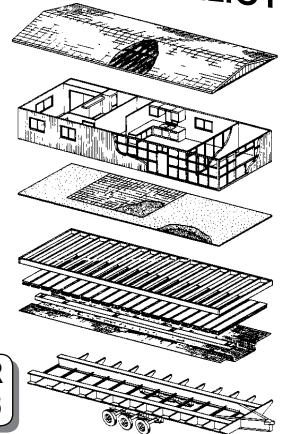
