


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On the fragility of opinions

The second man grabbed hold of the tusk of the elephant and said, "My, the elephant is smooth and sharp, like a wonderful spear."


The third man approached the animal and grabbed on to the trunk and said, "My, the elephant is exactly like a snake."

And so, the men continued arguing, even more loudly than before, each arguing for his opinion of what the elephant was like. And even though each was a little right—all of the men were more than a little wrong.





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
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The most important ingredient

Moral: What other men see as an obstacle can be an opportunity for the man who faces it head on.












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Reduce your food label confusion

re you confused by the labels on food products in the grocery store? Products now like to advertise that they are "fat free," "reduced fat" and "low calorie." So what do those terms really mean? The Food and Drug Administration regulates what foods can contain before they can make label claims. Here are a few FDA label-claims requirements for food manufacturers:

Free. This means that a product contains no amount of, or only trivial or "physiologically inconse-quential" amounts of one or more of the following components: fat, saturated fat, cholesterol, sodium, sugars and calories. For example, "calorie-free" means fewer than 5 calories per serving, and "sugar-free" and "fat-free" both mean less than 0.5 grams per serving. Synonyms for "free" include "without," "no" and "zero." A synonym for fat-free milk is "skim."

Low. This term can be used on foods that can be eaten frequently without exceeding dietary guidelines for one or more of these components: fat, saturated fat, cholesterol, sodium and calories. Thus, descriptors are as follows:

- Low-fat. 3 grams or less per serving.
- Low-saturated fat. 1 gram or less per serving.
- Low-sodium. 140 milligrams or less per serving.
- Very low sodium. 35 milligrams or less per serving.
- Low cholesterol. 20 milligrams or less and 2 grams or less of saturated fat per serving.
- Low calorie. 40 calories or less per serving.

Synonyms for low are "little," "few," "low source of" and "contains a small amount of."

Many Americans suffer from heartburn

A coording to the AstraZeneca Web site, heartburn is a burning feeling that rises from the stomach or lower chest up toward the neck. The burning sensation is caused by acid that backs up from the stomach into the gullet (esophagus). Usually a valve at the lower end of the esophagus opens when you swallow and closes when the food has passed. How-

ever, in some people, this function does not work properly and does not close off when it should—after a meal, for instance. Anyone who suspects they are suffering from heart-burn should seek a doctor's advice; medicine may be required and more serious problems need to be eliminated as the cause of the discomfort.

- In Western countries, about 40 percent (two in every five) of adults suffer from heartburn.
- Up to 44 percent of American adults suffer from heartburn at least once a month, and approximately 7 percent of Americans experience heartburn at least once a day.
- Twenty-five percent (one in four) of pregnant women experience daily heartburn and more than 50 percent have occasional symptoms.

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One of the greatest love stories of all time

In 1845, Robert Browning was an unknown poet and playwright when he first read Elizabeth Barrett's volume of poetry titled Poems. He was 32 years old.

Elizabeth Barrett was a well-known poet—and an invalid. She was 39 years old.

Browning was so moved by her poetry that he wrote to her "I love your verses with all my heart, dear Miss Barrett…" The two then commenced writing more than 600 letters to each other during the next 20 months.

According to The History Channel's Web site, Elizabeth had suffered from the time she was a teenager from a painful condition that caused uncontrollable spasms of pain and breathing difficulties. She had been a shut-in and a spinster for years. Elizabeth's father was a very controlling, wealthy man who had forbidden all of his 12 children from ever marrying.

Browning began to court Barrett, but at first she did not take him seriously, thinking that no one would be genuinely interested in her romantically. But Browning was ardent in his desire for Barrett. However, Barrett refused to see Browning for several months. Elizabeth found it hard to trust Browning's intentions because she had been isolated for so long and because she questioned the treatment of women inside the institution of marriage. But despite these almost over¬whelming obstacles, Browning continued to court her with passion.

Finally, with the encouragement of Browning, Elizabeth left the room where she had spent the previ-ous six years of her life. She began to go outside and live an active life again, and she cut back on the mor-phine and opium the doctors had prescribed for her painful condition.

In 1846, Barrett married Browning in a secret cere¬mony (to hide the fact that she was defying her father). When her father found out, he disinherited Elizabeth.

The couple left for Italy in the week after their marriage—and they spent the next 15 years together productively writing. Their courtship inspired some of the most beautiful and romantic poetry ever written.

The most famous line of her poetry was from her courtship period with Browning published in her Sonnets From the Portuguese, it reads, "How do I love thee? Let me count the ways."

Elizabeth died in her husband's arms in1861.

A fun chocolate tidbit

Here's a fun fact from the Chocolate Manufacturers Association. Folks at the CMA say that champagne and sparkling wines don't pair well with milk or dark chocolate. The reason? Apparently the acidity in these libations reacts to chocolate and causes a tart taste. The CMA suggests pair-

ing champagne and sparkling wines with white chocolate and red wines with dark chocolate.



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
