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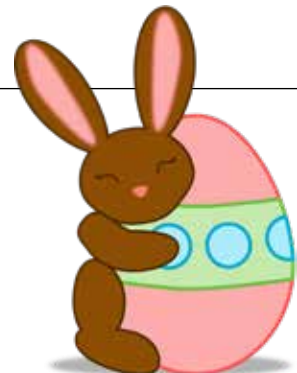
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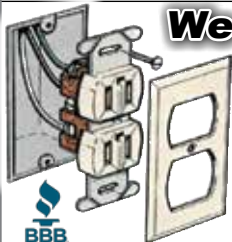
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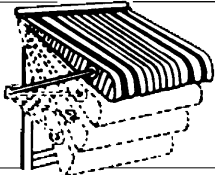
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Card Bingo

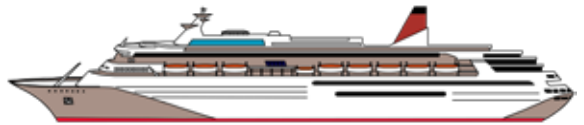

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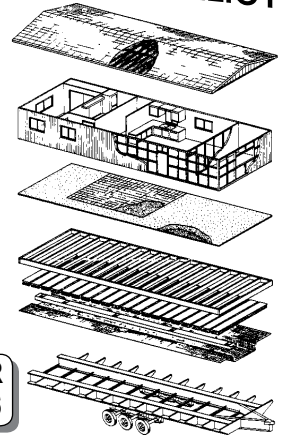

Projects: The Geothermal System, to heat our pool, will have been completed by the end of March.

Several other projects are underway by our many resident volunteers. Under the leadership of Gurrin Gillingham, unit 40, the volunteer teams have been hydro-cleaning the sidewalks and other teams fertilized the palm trees. This is a tremendous amount of work by many and greatly appreciated; it makes our 5 Star Park.

Thank you, Brian Penney



Brian Penney, unit 146, retired from the Board after serving two 3-year terms as Secretary. Brian and his wife Janice, from St. John's, Newfoundland, Canada, came to the park in 2014. For the 9 years Brian has been very involved in too many to mention park projects including holiday decorations, cleaning sidewalks, dredging and repairing of the canal behind Virginia Avenue. Brian golfs, rides a motorcycle, and he and Janice play pickleball.

Welcome Steve Hartseil

Steve Hartseil, unit 70, was elected by acclamation as our new board member for a 3-year term. He and his wife Melinda, full time residents for 1+ years, are from Peoria, Illinois (the s in Illinois is not pronounced) and currently both work full time for the Pinellas County School District. They were in Florida in 2018 when visited our park and knew they wanted to be resident as soon as they could. Steve said, "We loved what we saw, the cleanliness, people waiving at us who did not know us." Although his time is limited, his interests are keeping the park clean, quiet and safe, making the park prosperous by involving volunteers whenever possible to avoid expenses. He thinks the geothermal system is a valuable cost saving measure.





Geothermal System Heats The Pool

Geothermal Heating and Cooling Technologies (geo/earth and therme/heat). Geothermal technology harnesses the Earth's heat. Just a few feet below the surface, the Earth maintains a near-constant temperature, in contrast to the summer and winter extremes of the ambient air above ground. The in-ground water temperature is about 75 degrees. Our project will be completed hopefully by the end of this month. Both the electrical and plumbing work were completed first. At the time of this writing we are waiting for two wells to be drilled to source the water from the aquifer. Another trench will be dug, more pipes laid, and the heating system cut over. Our new system will suck heat out of one well and transfer the heat into the pool, then return the flow of water to the second well. The system has the capability of heating and cooling the pool water. The project will cost roughly \$60,000 and is 95% efficient so we don't lose heat. The cost of propane has sky rocketed daily since COVID; 50% higher than the last 2-3 years. Based on projected price increases, the new system will pay for itself in 5 years, or less. Thank you, Ron Hanson, unit 137, for taking the lead on this project.

Stewards of the Environment

It is the responsibility of all of us to practice environmental stewardship by separating recyclables. We ask you to separate your aluminum cans from your trash and bring them to the workshop next to the garage where you will find a bin near the door. Thank you, Cliff Bugden, unit 78, for crushing and cashing them in at the appropriate facility. This revenue is added to the park's petty cash fund.

Remember Do Not to put plastic bags in the recycle dumpster. If the collector sees plastic bags mixed in, the load will be designated trash. The park pays more for trash disposal. To save room in the Recycle dumpster, please break down your cardboard boxes. Remember to use the yard waste (Landscape Disposal) dumpster on Virginia Drive for grass, gardening and some home improvement items. Do Not use the dumpsters at the East Bay Drive entrance for these items. Lastly, please remember to close all dumpster doors when you are finished to help keep out rats and other animals. If we all do what we can, Colonial Village will continue to be the beautiful park we all enjoy. Thank you.

Our park board secretary, Susan Collins, unit 85, has taken it upon herself to shepherd this environmental stewardship effort. Susan, a park resident since 2018 (but a frequent visitor while her mom lived here since 1984), is from VT where recycling separation is mandatory. She, an avid knitter, is very active in the park with pot luck dinners, flea market, bingo, card bingo, and the pool. "I love the life in this park and will do what needs to be done to keep the park lovely and friendly." she said.



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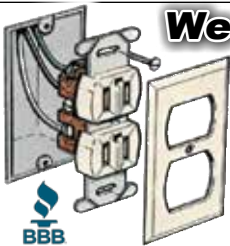

First, call the Largo Police Department's non-emergency number. Second, report it to the CV office. For your own safety, LOCK doors, windows, vehicles and bikes. TAKE pictures of valuables. KNOW your neighbors. INFORM the office when you leave for a period of time. Board Member Jon Lago, Unit 96, is our liaison with the park and Largo Police Department. Swimming Pool Rules

April and May will continue to be busy times at the swimming pool. Residents, please inform your guests of the rules (some of which are not posted).
Open 8 AM to dusk.

- A shirt or cover-up must be worn to and from the pool.
- No diving, No jumping, No splashing, No oversized flotation devices such as inner tubes and rafts. Wearable safety flotation devices and noodles are allowed.
- No food, No glass or breakable items. No running. No drinks other than water in the pool area. No alcoholic beverages. No smoking.
- A shower must be taken before entering the pool.
- Children must be accompanied by an adult.
- Children who are not toilet-trained are not permitted in the pool unless they are wearing special leak-proof diapers designed for swimming.
- Not a rule but a courtesy. Water Aerobics is every Tuesday and Thursday, 11-12.
- Not a rule but as a courtesy, use ear buds when listening to your music.

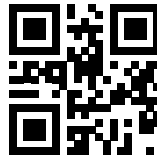


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Yours Guests. Parking. Your Departure.

Remember to register your guests at the office by completing the appropriate form. A Guest is a person who stays more than 24 hours and whose stay does not exceed 30 total days per calendar year, unless the Board of Directors approves. Guest parking is available in front of the Clubhouse, the intersection of Virginia and Mt. Vernon and adjoining the Landscape Disposal dumpster. No parking permitted on the streets and sidewalks between 11 pm and 7 am. There is no parking or use of neighbor's driveways without written permission of the neighbor. No storage area exists in the park. Before you head north, residents must notify the office in writing the date of their return, where they can be reached in an emergency, and the name of the person responsible for the care of the planters and property. Residents are responsible to make arrangements to have bushes trimmed, and planters and flowerbeds weeded.

Before You Head North

When you are preparing to leave for the season keep in mind that there will be a box available in the Clubhouse for canned or dry foods you don't wish to bring home with you or leave here. The food products must be unopened and nonperishable. They will be donated to local food banks. The boxes will be available from the end of March through the end of April. Your donations are greatly appreciated. Thank you in advance and safe travels.

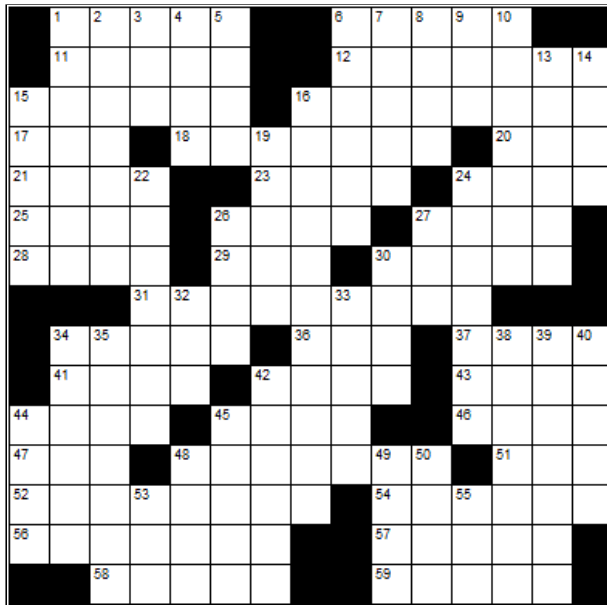
