DAY TRIPPIN' ~ MARIE SELBY BOTANICAL GARDENS

A rie Selby Botanical Gardens provides 45 acres of bayfront sanctuaries connecting people with air plants of the world, native nature, and our regional history. Established by forward thinking women of their time, Selby Gardens is composed of the 15-acre Downtown Sarasota campus and the 30-acre Historic Spanish Point campus in the Osprey area of Sarasota County, Florida. The Downtown Campus on Sarasota Bay is the only botanical garden in the world dedicated to the display and study of epiphytic orchids, bromeliads, gesneriads and ferns, and other tropical plants. There is a significant focus on botany, horticulture, education, historical preservation, and the environment. The Historic Spanish Point (HSP) Campus is located less than 10 miles south along Little Sarasota Bay. The HSP Campus, one of the largest preserves showcasing native Florida plants that is interpreted for and open to the public, celebrates an archaeological record that encompasses approximately 5,000 years of Florida history. Marie Selby Botanical Gardens was founded in 1973 when Sarasota resident and passionate gardener Marie Selby bequeathed her former home and property "for the enjoyment of the general public." The

15-acre original Downtown Sarasota campus features botanical highlights such as a captivating banyan grove planted by Marie and her husband, William, nearly a century ago. In 2020, Selby Gardens adopted Historic Spanish Point as a second campus. This cultural landmark less than 10 miles from the Downtown Sarasota campus boasts an archaeological record that encompasses approximately 5,000 years of Florida prehistory. A onetime pioneer homestead and the former winter estate of Chicago-born Bertha Palmer, Marie Selby Botanical Gardens' Historic Spanish Point campus provides visitors the opportunity to explore that heritage via an ancient shell midden and collection of historic structures and serves as one of the largest preserves showcasing native Florida plants that is interpreted for and open to the public. It was Palmer's family who both donated the property and helped it become the first site in Sarasota County to be listed in the National Register of Historic Places. The Historic Spanish Point campus is a model of long-term environmental sustainability. Native Americans lived here for thousands of years, apparently with minimal impact on the rich bays and fertile soils that supported them. The early pioneers also lived light on the land, building homes with features that we label as "green" today. Early architectural features included wide roof overhangs to provide shade and large double-hung windows to provide natural cooling. Fresh water was crucial for survival and so cisterns captured every drop of rainwater that fell on their roofs. Wind provided propulsion for the sailboats that provided transportation and commerce. Today, the Historic Spanish Point campus embraces sustainability through energy and water conservation strategies funded through the Partners for Green Places grant project. Reflective window tint, high efficiency air conditioning and LED lighting help conserve energy while saving vital financial resources. Low-flow plumbing fixtures save precious water just as the early pioneers did. Both the early pioneer designs and the latest conservation improvements allow the Historic Spanish Point campus to demonstrate responsible use of resources and long-term sustainability. FLORIDA FISH AND WILDLIFE

'd like to highlight a different fish/wildlife species native to Florida each month. <u>COBIA</u>

The Cobia are a large species that grow to 4 feet and can weigh over 50 pounds with the record in Florida 130 pounds caught in Destin, but most caught are in the 30 pound range. Mostly a solitary fish, you may sometimes find them in small groups in bays and inlets around structure. Offshore, Cobia feed on crab, shrimp, squid and small fish usually around shipwrecks and deep reefs. Cut bait chumming works best to attract the Cobia. Use live fish and crabs as bait fishing the surface and have fun battling this very aggressive fighter. Cobia are excellent tablefare and are filleted into steaks. Cobia skin is chewy, so it is always removed.

RECIPE: CHICKEN MARSALA

- 1/2 c. all-purpose flour
- 8 chicken cutlets or 4 chicken breasts, sliced in half (about 1.5 lbs)
- Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 2 tbsp. canola oil
- 2 tbsp. unsalted butter
- 1 (8-ounce) package sliced mushrooms

- 1/3 c. chopped onion (about 1/2 small onion)
- 2 cloves garlic, chopped
- 1/2 c. dry Marsala wine
- 3/4 c. chicken stock
- 1/2 c. heavy cream
- 1 tsp. fresh thyme, plus more for garnish

Place flour in a shallow bowl. Use a meat tenderizer or the bottom of a sturdy cup to pound chicken to about 1/4 inch thick. Season with salt and pepper. Dredge chicken in flour, turning to coat all sides. Heat oil in a medium skillet over medium-high heat. Cook chicken in batches, turning once, until golden brown, 3 to 4 minutes. Transfer to a plate and tent to keep warm. Reserve skillet. Step 2 Pour off oil from skillet. Melt butter in skillet over medium heat. Add mushroom and onions. Season with salt and pepper. Cook, stirring occasionally, until tender, 5 to 7 minutes. Add garlic and cook, stirring, until fragrant, 2 to 3 minutes. Add wine, stock, cream, and thyme. Simmer, stirring occasionally, until thickened, 14 to 16 minutes. Season with salt and pepper. Return chicken to pan and toss to coat. Serve immediately garnished with thyme.

INVENTING THE DISHWASHER – JOSEPHINE COCHRAN

Josephine Garis Cochran (sometimes spelled Cochrane) (1839-1913) is largely unknown now, but she should be declared the patron saint of the modern busy family. For in 1886, she patented the first commercial dishwasher. Cochran wanted a machine that would save time washing dishes, and would prevent broken crockery. She was convinced that there had to be a mechanical solution to the tedium of dishwashing. Josephine grew up in a family of engineers, but finding no one that could or would invent such a machine, she vowed, "If nobody else is going to invent a dishwashing machine, I'll do it myself." So she invented a contraption of gears, belts, and pulleys that could take a cage filled with over 200 dirty dishes, and would re-appear a few minutes later with the dishes as clean as if they had been hand-washed. Her machine, unlike others that had been attempted, was the first to use water pressure rather than scrubbers to clean the dishes. It also had fitted racks to hold the dishes and cutlery in place.

Once her patent application, under the name of "J.G. Cochran" was approved, the next challenge was production. "I couldn't get men to do the things I wanted in my way until they had tried and failed in their own," Josephine later explained. "And that was costly for me. They knew I knew nothing, academically, about mechanics, and they insisted on having their own way with my invention until they convinced themselves my way was the better, no matter how I had arrived at it." In 1886, with the aid of a young mechanic named George Butters, she set to work in a woodshed behind her home bringing the first prototype to life. Once she had the patent and a machine, she had to sell the dishwashers. Although she wanted to sell directly to women, as they would appreciate how much drudgery the machine eliminated, because very few households in the 19th century could afford to pay over \$100 for an appliance, her main customers were large hotels and restaurants. She was successful at sales, but it was very difficult to challenge the mores of the 19th century, to enter these establishments on her own. When discussing selling to a large hotel, she described it as "almost the hardest thing I ever did, I think, crossing the great lobby of the Sherman House alone. You cannot imagine what it was like in those days...for a woman to cross a hotel lobby alone. I had never been anywhere without my husband or father-the lobby seemed a mile wide. I thought I should faint at every step, but I didn't-and I got an \$800 order as my reward." In 1893, she exhibited her dishwashers at the Columbian Exhibition World's Fair in Chicago, and the orders came pouring in from schools, colleges, hospitals and other large institutions. Her product, the Garis-Cochran Dishwasher was a success. With the assistance of her business partner, George Butters, they opened a factory in 1898, Cochran's Crescent Washing Machine Company. At first the dishwashing machines were used primarily by large businesses and institutions, but decades later, Cochran's invention eventually evolved into the appliance considered essential by millions of householders today. Cochran died of a stroke in 1913, a very successful businesswoman. Her company was bought out in 1926 by the Hobart Corporation which produced appliances under the KitchenAid brand. In 1986, KitchenAid was acquired by Whirlpool. Josephine Garis Cochran was inducted into the National Inventors Hall of Fame in 2006. In 2013, on the 100 year anniversary of her death, the country of Romania (a country with which Cochran had no connection) issued a postage stamp in her honor, an indication of just how widespread her influence was.

Skyway bridge, which cost \$21 million to build, opened on September 6, 1954. This original two lane steel cantilever bridge, built by the Virginia Bridge Company, served the area on its own until the late 1960s when, due to changing standards for the interstate highway system, four lanes were required. In 1969 a second, parallel bridge was built to the just to the west, making a total of four lanes, two in each direction. Opening of the newer span was delayed until 1971 due to necessary repairs. The second bridge was used for all southbound traffic, while the original span was converted to carry northbound traffic. The first tragedy associated with the Sunshine Skyway bridge occurred on January 28, 1980, when the US Coast Guard Cutter Blackthorn, which had recently completed a major overhaul in Tampa, collided with a tanker named the Capricorn as it made way under the Sunshine Skyway bridge, headed for the Gulf of Mexico. Due to the extensive damage caused when the tanker's anchor ripped into the Blackthorn's hull, the ship capsized and 23 of the Blackthorn's 50-member crew perished. A commemorative plaque can still be found on the bridge's approach. Of course, the bridge's most famous disaster took place on May 9, 1980, when a freighter, the MV Summit Venture, collided with a support column pier during a severe storm. As a result, 1,200 feet of the southbound Sunshine Skyway bridge collapsed into the water, along with six vehicles and a Greyhound bus, killing 35 people. Of those who plunged into the Bay, only one man, Wesley MacIntire, survived. His falling truck hit the Summit Venture's deck before sliding into the water. He was able to get out of the truck and swim to the Summit Venture, where he was rescued. Construction of the current Sunshine Skyway began in 1982, and the completed bridge was dedicated on February 7, 1987. The new, six-lane bridge cost \$244 million to build, and was opened to traffic on April 20, 1987. At a length of 29,040 feet and a height of 190 feet above the water, it is the world's largest cable-staved concrete bridge, and it has won dozens of engineering and design awards. Because protecting the new bridge from collisions was paramount, large concrete islands, called dolphins, were built around each of the bridge's six piers, and were designed to withstand the impact of an 87,000-ton ship. The bright yellow paint job on the cables is said to reflect the Skyway's home in the Sunshine State. The placement of the cables between the two roadways, rather than on the outside, offers drivers and passengers an unobstructed view of the water as they cross the bridge. The remains of the old bridge were demolished in 1993, and it was decided to leave the north and south over-water approaches intact. Today these are known as the Skyway Fishing Pier Park, and scores of fishermen can be seen daily with their lines in the water. In 2005, an act of the Florida Legislature officially named the current bridge the Bob Graham Sunshine Skyway Bridge, after the former Governor of Florida and then U.S. Senator who presided over its design and most of its construction. The Sunshine Skyway, surely one of the most beautiful bridges in existence, has garnered more than its share of praise. The graceful span and shining yellow cables are well lit at night, and can be seen for miles day or night. It can best be viewed from the East Beach area of Fort Desoto Park. Due to its beauty the span has been the scene of several auto commercials. It is also worth noting that a special on the Travel Channel rated our Sunshine Skyway third best of their Top Ten Bridges. The next time you drive across the Sunshine Skyway, perhaps you will recall some of its interesting history. Or maybe you will just enjoy the gorgeous view.

HISTORY OF MACDILL AIR FORCE BASE – TAMPA FL

acDillAFB, originally Southeast Air Base, was established, constructed, and dedicated from 1939 to early 1941, starting operational service as MacDill Field more than six months before the US entered World War II. Before the end of construction the base was named for Colonel Leslie MacDill, a World War I pilot and aerial gunnery school commander, killed in 1938 due to engine failure. MacDill Field was one of several Army Airfields in the Tampa Bay area in World War Two, all of which were organized under the Third Air Force, with commands split among the various fields. The main mission of MacDill was to establish US air security over the Gulf of Mexico, especially defense of US oil tankers from ports of Texas and Louisiana; the US was providing Lend-Lease equipment to the United Kingdom and Soviet Union at this time, and much of the material was being shipped from Gulf ports; there was concern that German U-boats could slip into or even through the Florida Straits and run rampant in the event of war. Furthermore, the US controlled the Panama Canal, and Florida was the last major staging base on the way to Panama. MacDill was constructed in haste, with flight operations beginning while personnel camped in tents in the buggy Florida wetlands. MacDill units included pursuit fighters for scramble response, and reconnaissance bomber squadrons, mainly B-26 Marauders, which had good loiter time and could carry sizeable ordnance loads for on-the-spot attacks, but suffered from landing difficulties. Early in the war, MacDill was a logistics hub for Project X, a supply program shipping combat aircraft to the Philippines via the South Atlantic, across Africa and through India (which was less dangerous than over the Pacific and through Japanese controlled airspace). As the war progressed, MacDill became an excellent location for wartime movies, standing in for Pacific tropical locations, and two Hollywood films were partly shot here, A Guy Name Joe, and Air Force. Air Force featured repainted B-26s standing in for Japanese bombers; these scenes were shot near MacDill. Memos were circulated, and Japan was certainly nowhere near Florida, but vigilant and well intentioned Coast Guard units fired on the Japanese marked planes, with no casualties. Ironically, these exterior filming shots were done at Tampa Bay because of fear that Japanese marked planes would cause panic on the West Coast. Later in the war, MacDill converted to a mainly training mission, focusing on the B-17 Flying Fortress, and later the B-29 Superfortress. The end of the war led to rapid demobilization, and many bases inactivated, but MacDill, with a regionally important location, remained open at lower strength. In 1946 MacDill was assigned to Strategic Air Command, and units from MacDill were sent to strategic bombing campaigns in the Korean War. The Cold War demanded a high level of alertness, and although Tampa Bay was nowhere near approaches to the Soviet Union, it was still a perfectly useful training facility and well back from the expected northern air theaters. In 1955 MacDill was again used for backdrops and exterior shots for a Hollywood film, Strategic Air Command, starring James Stewart and June Allyson. Stewart plays an Air Force Reservist called to active duty, who struggles with his wife's (Allyson) displeasure over his situation; Steward was an actual Air Force Reservist and ... continued on page 39

pilot, at the time a Colonel. By 1960 budget concerns and the ever-changing global situation made MacDill look like a surplus base; the Cuban Missile Crisis shortly put an end to this idea, and MacDill's squadrons were flown in support of the Cuban Blockade. MacDill went from apparently surplus to central for Gulf-Caribbean security, and a new unit command concept, the US Strike Command was established at MacDill for global crisis response. Over the course of the 1960s MacDill transitioned to a fighter base, transferring to Tactical Air Command in 1962, a mission the base would follow to the end of the Cold War. When the Cold War did end, MacDill's mission was reevaluated, and a review concluded that air traffic in the Tampa Bay area was becoming too congested for safety; MacDill stayed open but its mission altered to airlift and flight operations reduced. The airlift mission has since supported the 1994-1995 Operation Support Democracy (overthrowing a revolutionary dictatorship in Haiti). The early 2000s saw another round of base realignment affecting MacDill, notably the reassignment of additional air refuelling wings and reassignment of the US Marine Forces Central Command headquarters to MacDill AFB.

ARMADILLOS

kay, this article says that armadillos like to eat termites. I wonder if ELS would let us keep them as pets to ward of the yearly termite swarms. Just kidding. . . I love animals, but don't think I want an armadillo toolin' around the house. Of the 20 varieties of armadillo, all but one live in Latin America. The familiar nine-banded armadillo is the only species that includes the United States in its range. Armadillo is a Spanish word meaning "little armored one" and refers to the bony plates that cover the back, head, legs, and tail of most of these odd looking creatures. Armadillos are the only living mammals that wear such shells. Closely related to anteaters and sloths, armadillos generally have a pointy or shovel-shaped snout and small eyes. They vary widely in size and color, from the 6-inch-long, salmon-colored pink fairy armadillo to the 5-foot-long, dark-brown giant armadillo. Others have black, red, gray, or yellowish coloring. Contrary to popular belief, not all armadillos are able to encase themselves in their shells. In fact, only the three-banded armadillo can, curling its head and back feet and contorting its shell into a hard ball that confounds would-be predators. Habitat and Diet Armadillos live in temperate and warm habitats, including rain forests, grasslands, and semi-deserts. Because of their low metabolic rate and lack of fat stores, cold is their enemy, and spates of intemperate weather can wipe out whole populations. Most species dig burrows and sleep prolifically, up to 16 hours per day, foraging in the early morning and evening for beetles, ants, termites, and other insects. They have very poor eyesight, and utilize their keen sense of smell to hunt. Strong legs and huge front claws are used for digging, and long, sticky tongues for extracting ants and termites from their tunnels. In addition to bugs, armadillos eat small vertebrates, plants, and some fruit, as well as the occassional carrion meal.
