Message from the Board of Directors

A Report from the 2/3rds Committee

(For those who at a loss, this is the committee behind providing the list of items to be voted on pertaining to changes in the park, both past and present)

e are happy to announce that the "proxy" vote that transpired just a short time ago, garnered the largest number of participants on any issue. Thank you to all for voting and making your voices heard.

If you recall, there were 5 items – "A" through "E", listed, with 15 sub items under "A" (which were already completed over the last 5 years or replacements, such as the glider at the South Boat Ramp). Every item, except for "E" was passed according to statue and our bylaws. Going forward we will ensure that votes such as these come before the members as is required. During the Board Meeting when the votes were counted, we took advantage under our bylaws, to suspend the meeting for 90 days. This was to allow for mailed ballots to still come in and be counted and to reach out to those who had not voted. It will not affect all the items that were passed as they exceeded the number of votes required, but it may affect item "E" which was just under the threshold. Members of the committee, street captains and board members will be reaching out to those who have not responded to ensure they have their vote counted.

In closing, I would like to thank all the members of the committee, but especially Nancy Olson and her team of street captains, for the hard work they put forward to make this happen. This team effort shows how Americana Cove will continue to work together and remain a place where residents are happy to live.

What's the Scoop on Dog Poop and Rats

R ats are an age ole urban problem. At some time or another, everyone has had a problem and had to deal with them. Once you have confirmed that rats are indeed living or active in your yard or home, the next step is to determine their sources of food, water and shelter so you can either eliminate them or minimize the rats' access to them. There are many things that can attract rats to your yard and home. Even the plants you grow in the landscape can attract them, especially if you have large (citrus, mango, avocado, or other exotic fruits)

and small fruit and nut trees and plants growing in the yard. Since rats are so fond of these different kinds of fruit, Americana Cove rules and regs currently disallow such plantings within common or residential properties. Rats also love acorns and seeds of all kinds, which is again why bird feeders are disallowed within the park. Since rats require regular access to water, it's important to eliminate any potential water sources available to the rats. For water, be sure to fix any leaky hoses, pipes and AC units, and dump out standing water from planters and their retention trays.



As you might expect, rats also love eating all kinds of pet food. Pet owners should be aware that only 20 to 40% of the dry food your dog consumes is actually digested. The other *...continued on page 6*

60 to 80% is discharged, and this is why resident pet owners are expected to scoop and bag as their pets are paraded around the park. Besides preventing others from stepping into it, there are other reasons that it needs to be bagged and removed. Dog waste is often a leading food source for rats and other urban animals such as opossum, raccoon, and coyotes. It should come as no surprise that if you store the bags in a bucket and discover the bags have been chewed open, with no poopy left in the bag, it got eaten by a rat or other urban animal. As it turns out, poops of all kinds have been determined to be a primary food source for rats and mice. Although I suppose it is good that the waste is being eaten, it's definitely not ideal that dog poop that isn't picked up will likely attract both rats, mice, and these other urban pests. If you have seen, heard, or have a problem with rats, cleaning up your pet's waste, disposing of your trash immediately and keeping dog poop in a garbage can that is rodent proof are all recommended solutions to help reduce and manage any rat problems you might have. 





Increase The Value of Your Home Through Cleaning

ost homeowners who are listing their homes for sale don't realize that one can add value to a home by cleaning and reducing clutter. Homeowners understand that upgrades such as new flooring or countertops will instantly increase the value of a home. What many owners don't realize, however, is that a little elbow grease will bring value as well! Where owners leave money on the table is by not giving their home a good scrubbing and removing

When a home is for sale through the hot Florida summers, be sure to turn the A/C down to a temperature that will allow the unit to run. The Florida Dept of Agriculture and Consumer Services recommends a setting of 78 degrees. They also recommend that the indoor and outdoor coils are cleaned, add shades on east and west facing windows to reduce heat and leave ceiling fans turned on to help circulate the air.

If a homeowner doesn't have the time or ability to clean, then an option could be to hire a cleaning company or friends and family to not only clean the home but de-clutter, as well. Since the owner will be moving, boxing up personal items and giving away or selling furniture that is not being used is a great way to make the home "show ready."

"Most homeowners don't enjoy cleaning or decluttering but when they realize how much more money they can add to the value of their home, then they know it's worth it to make the effort," says Broker Marty Pozgay.
