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Bylaws of Hillcrest Residents, Inc. Homeowners Association As Adopted, March IS, 1985 Amended 1/27/86, 2/10/88, 2/2/98, 4/10/201.2 Article I. Location and purpose

These are the Bylaws of the Hillcrest Residents, Inc., hereinafter called the "Corporation" or "Association", a Corporation for profit or non-profit, whichever is applicable, if there is a change in status.

Section 1. Principal Office. The principal office of the Corporation shall be 2346 Druid Road E. Clearwater, Florida, 33764 or as specified by the Board of Directors.

Section 2. Purpose. The purpose of the Corporation.

- a. As a homeowners association to represent the home owners within the Hillcrest Mobile Home Park located at 2346 Druid Rd. E., Clearwater, Florida 33764.
- b. To negotiate with management on behalf of the mobile home owners.
- c. To liaise with and support external organizations which are active in supporting the lifestyle and objectives of mobile homeowners.
- d. To work for the good and welfare of all residents and serve as a liaison between park management and resident owners of the Hillcrest Mobile Home Park.
- e. To protect our personal and property rights.
- f. To sponsor the recreational, social and cultural activities and to promote other clubs, organizations or groups which may be formed, as long as they abide by and follow the bylaws of this association.
- g. Park management shall have no responsibility in relationship to this Association and no management employee, with administrative and or supervision authority shall serve on the Board of Directors.
- **Section 3.** Corporation. This Corporation is not to be confused with the Hillcrest Social Club, which organization is responsible for and limited to the conduct of organized social activities for the residents of Hillcrest Mobile Home Park.
- **Section 4. Fiscal Year.** The Fiscal Year of the Corporation shall end on January 31 of each year.
- **Section S. Seal.** The seal of the Corporation shall bear the name of the Corporation and the word "Florida".
- **Section 6. Govern Corporation.** The Directors shall govern this corporation in accordance with these by-laws and applicable Florida Statutes.



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

Oh, my aching neck...

The neck is a pretty common place to experience pain. That's because your neck is the most mobile part of the spine — so injuries and painful conditions are more likely to occur there. If you are suffering from neck pain, you should see a health professional about it.

To prevent neck pain and injury, follow these tips:

- Maintain proper posture. Use a chair that is appropriate, stable and the right height. Use a table that is also the right height to avoid neck strain. Change your position periodically, so that exhaustion and pain will not occur. Avoid twisting your neck suddenly. When you are standing, maintain a relaxed neck, with your head upright and your chin retract—ed. You'll also want to get the right size pillow. A pillow should support your neck in a balanced position.
- Exercise your neck regularly to maintain and improve flexibility. Take a break from whatever you do during the day, about every half hour. Stretch your neck in different directions by looking up, down, to the right and to the left. Another good way to exercise this area is to raise and squeeze your shoulders together and then relax. Repeat this a few times.

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
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


Need to clean — go green

If you feel like you're spending too much money on store-bought cleaners, maybe you should try making some of your own. Sound complicated? It's not. You can make home-I made cleaners easily, and you won't have to worry about the toxins that are part of so many store-bought cleaning products.

Most homemade cleaners can be made from things that are readily available in households, or at least in your local grocery store. You might be impressed with the results of your cleansers. Here is a list of basic ingredients that will help get you started:

- Baking soda
- Vinegar
- Water
- Lemon juice
- Ammonia
- Salt
- Vegetable or olive oil
- Club soda
- Isopropyl alcohol
- Toothpaste
- Spray bottles



Club soda does a wonderful job of cleaning linoleum floors. And vinegar added to the rinse cycle works as a fabric softener. Toothpaste is a great chrome cleaner.

Here are a couple of recipes:

Glass Cleaner

- 1 gallon water
- 1/2 cup white vinegar
- 1/2 teaspoon liquid dishwashing detergent

Furniture polish

- 1 cup vegetable or olive oil
