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

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

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


Need to clean — go green

If you feel like you're spending too much money on store-bought cleaners, maybe you should try making some of your own. Sound complicated? It's not. You can make homemade cleaners easily, and you won't have to worry about the toxins that are part of so many store-bought cleaning products.

Most homemade cleaners can be made from things that are readily available in house-holds, or at least in your local grocery store. You might be impressed with the results of your cleansers. Here is a list of basic ingredients that will help get you started:

- Baking soda
- Vinegar
- Water
- Lemon juice
- Ammonia
- Salt
- · Vegetable or olive oil
- Club soda
- Isopropyl alcohol
- Toothpaste
- Spray bottles



Club soda does a wonderful job of cleaning linoleum floors. And vinegar added to the rinse cycle works as a fabric softener. Toothpaste is a great chrome cleaner.

Here are a couple of recipes:

Glass Cleaner

- 1 gallon water
- 1/2 cup white vinegar
- 1/2 teaspoon liquid dishwashing detergent

Furniture polish

- 1 cup vegetable or olive oil
- 1/2 cup lemon juice —adapted from "Homemade cleaners: How to make all-natural green cleaners," by Sara Noel, on the Sideroad Web site

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

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
