We greet one another on the street and are appreciative of the conversation and perhaps plans are made for a game night or cornhole play. As of this writing (early June), we continue our search for a part-time janitor/maintenance technician and a full-time office administrator. A collection of potential contractor bids is being reviewed in support of work to be done this coming season. Please help us by ensuring you are signing in and out at the office when traveling. I'd also like to recognize Bet LeBrun for her efforts to include the Sign-In/Sign-Out form in our spring newsletter for access by all. This was a tremendous help.

The Rules Committee initial revision of the Rules document has been shared with the community for their feedback. The process will be on-going throughout the summer working towards completion for final submission by fall. A special shout-out goes to Karen Harding for her support with the documentation. The update of our office forms is being spearheaded by Patricia Osmond as Co-Chair of the Communications Committee. Many forms, previously existing in paper format only, will be transitioned to electronic format. Some will be available for download and reprint from our website, and some will be created as online form-field web pages for completion on the website itself. This will take significant time and effort and represents a continued work-in-progress. If you have strong computer skills (MSWord and/or Excel) and would like to assist, please contact Patricia Osmond at posmondsunsetpalms@gmail.com. I'd like to remind our residents that the submission of Exterior Alteration requests is required when working on the outside of your unit. Required review and pre-approval of requests take place year-round, not just in season.

URRICANE SEASON: Hurricane season has arrived. Ensure that your storm shutters/awnings are in working order and any items that may become airborne are stored either in the shed or

in the mobile. Out of Park residents please contact whoever is watching your unit to ensure this is done. Sunset Palms is a mandatory evacuation area. THE CLUBHOUSE IS NOT RATED AS A SHELTER. Residents should have a plan in place in the event an evacuation order is given.

BLOCK WALL: This project has been delayed due to the contractor (CCI) waiting on a signed change order that has not been presented to us. I am working on getting this resolved.

CARPORT CLUTTER: Article VII (13) of the Rules & Regulations states in part: "Each Resident is required to keep their lot and driveway free of debris. Patios/carports may not be used for storage and only furniture designed for outdoor use is allowed outside the home". Any items currently stored in the carport need to be moved to the shed or inside the home.

SELLING YOUR HOME: If you are planning on selling your home, you must let the office know. If you are using a realtor, they must contact the office so the proper forms can be completed in order to close on the property.

HISTORY OF SUNSET MOBILE HOME PARK

Original article dated late 1980's - early 1990's

This veritable garden of Eden was developed 20 years ago. We are located in Pinellas Park which is the middle of the so-called Golden Triangle – with Tampa on the East side, St. Petersburg on the South side and Largo/Clearwater on the North side. We are in close proximity to everything of interest.

The original owners cleared the farm and pastureland that was used for raising livestock. Our present laundry facility and maintenance building was originally a slaughterhouse. When drilling and digging holes to install hurricane anchors on mobile homes, many animal bones were unearthed.

Our beautiful lake was manmade. This might be the only park where lake water is piped to each home for watering lawns and shrubs. Two very deep wells were drilled near the lake and water from them can be pumped into the lake to provide enough water during any prolonged dry spell.

The original Gandy Blvd. was a two-lane hump-back road, and the entrance to the park was so close to the road that Virgil had to stand in the middle of the boulevard to stop all traffic to allow the convoy trucks pulling model mobile homes to enter the park. Gandy Blvd. was later widened, and a new entrance was constructed with landscaping and a larger Sunset sign installed. All homes are double wide in the new section (across the canal).

Our beautiful recreation hall and surrounding grounds were developed prior to accepting our first residents. Our hall has and will always be the focal point for all park activities. During the 1970's, the hall was used as the voting place for two precincts. The hall has been the scene for numerous musicals and plays produced and put on by our own local talent. Also, for the past 18 years, the hall has been the center of our religious activities. A non-denominational service is conducted each Sunday.

Naturally, the 520 spaces for mobile homes could not be sold and occupied within a reasonable time, therefore the park accepted recreational vehicles for the winter months. During the 1970's, we would accommodate up to 400 such vehicles during the season. Many of those folks later purchased mobile home models and thus enjoyed our way of life.

Our first Anniversary was held in January 1969. At that time there were 53 resident homes. Today there are five living couples of the original 53.

HURRICANE SEASON IS UPON US...

have compiled a list of things you could do, and items you could get. This list is extensive - choose what applies to you! By listing all the items, it may help you decide what you want or need.

Having a plan is #1 priority. Stay safe!

What should you include in a hurricane preparedness kit?

Assemble these items now and put them aside in a spot where you'll be able to quickly retrieve them. Keep heat-sensitive items inside your house and rotate the stock throughout the season:

- Flashlights and extra bulbs.
- Extra batteries.
- Portable cell phone chargers. Keep them charged. Be sure to have charging cords and wall chargers in case the power is working in your shelter or another safe place.
- Clock (wind-up or battery-operated).
- Battery-operated radio.
- NOAA emergency weather radio.
- Toilet paper.
- Matches (camping stores have waterproof matches).
- Scissors.
- Plastic garbage bags.
- Working fire extinguisher.
- Clean change of clothes, rain gear, sturdy swamp boots.
- Fully charged battery-operated lanterns. Don't use candles and kerosene lanterns. They are fire hazards.
- List of phone numbers.
- Copy of insurance policy.

What food supplies should you get for hurricane season?

Get enough nonperishable food to last two weeks. Keep in mind that canned and other prepared foods that are salty, dry or high in fat or protein might make for good provisions, but also will make you thirsty.

- Water: Enough for 1 gallon of drinking water per person per day, for a minimum of one week. Water for two weeks is ideal. (Also, figure another 1 gallon per person/per day of water for washing hands and flushing toilets.)
- Ice or dry ice.
- Shelf-stable milk and juice boxes.
- Canned and powdered milk.
- Beverages (powdered or canned, fruit juices, instant coffee, tea).

- Duct tape to waterproof items; masking tape isn't strong enough.
- Canvas tarps.
- Sturdy nails.

Include a first-aid kit with your hurricane supplies.

Stores will be mobbed just before a storm and closed for days after. Keep a two-week supply of prescription drugs. Your first-aid kit should include:

- Medical supplies.
- First-aid handbook.
- Insect repellent sprays.
- Citronella candles, insect bite lotion.
- Petroleum jelly for relieving itching.
- Ointments for burns, cuts.
- Antiseptic solution.
- Sunscreen.
- Extra over-the-counter medicine (for colds, allergies, cough).
- Aspirin, acetaminophen, antacid.
- Children's medicines.
- Diarrhea medication.
- Feminine hygiene items.
- Incontinence supplies.
- Rubbing alcohol.
- Iodine.

- Disinfectant.
- Wet wipes.
- Moist towelette packets.
- Medic Alert tags.
- Thermometer.
- Hypoallergenic adhesive tape.
- Cotton-tipped swabs.
- Sterile rolls.
- Adhesive bandages.
- Sterile gauze pads.
- Roller bandages.
- Tweezers.
- Needles.
- Adhesive tape.
- Safety pins.
- Latex gloves.

Kitchen supplies worth adding to a hurricane prep kit.

- Waterless hand sanitizer.
- Manual can opener.
- Water purification tablets.
- Bottle opener.
- Matches in a plastic bag.
- Pocket knife.
- Camp stove or other cooking device and plenty of fuel. (Use only canned fuel indoors never charcoal or gas. Buy extra gas or charcoal to use in a well-ventilated space after the storm has passed.)
- Ice chests or coolers.
- Paper plates, napkins.
- Plastic cups, utensils.
- Disposable pans for cooking.
- Plastic bags, jugs or containers for water and ice.

Keep your vehicle's gas tank full!

Keep your gas tank full. Stations could be without power for weeks after a catastrophic storm or it may be difficult for tankers to reach the area.

Items for an emergency toilet can be part of hurricane prep.

- Garbage can with tight lid.
- Plastic bags for liners.
- Disinfectant or bleach.
- Deodorizer.



• Extra toilet paper.

Water tips for hurricane preparation.

- **Basics:** Enough for 1 gallon of drinking water per person per day, for one-week minimum (a two-person household would need 14 gallons). Another 1 gallon per person/per day of water for washing hands and flushing toilets.
- **Special needs**: Without air conditioning, your body is susceptible to heat stroke and dehydration. Have extra water for infants, youngsters, nursing mothers and the elderly.
- Water in bulk: You can buy 5- and 10-gallon water bottles, but they're hard to move. Or sanitize a large garbage can with a lid to store drinking water. Pour 1 cup of regular, unscented household bleach into 30 gallons of water; let stand overnight, drain and rinse well. Fill with tap water and replace the lid. Buy a long-handled ladle; keep paper cups nearby. Freezing jugs of water also helps keep foods frozen and provides chilled drinking water.
- For household use, sanitize the bathtub by scrubbing well and rinsing with 1 cup of bleach in a tub of water. Let stand overnight; drain; refill. Use for flushing the toilet, but if necessary, for washing.
- Keep water clean! Contaminated water can cause diarrhea, leading to dehydration. If drinking water is compromised, use it for washing up or flushing toilets. After a storm, do not use tap water for drinking unless you boil it for 3 minutes first or use purifying methods.
- Wait until your utility or local government says water is safe to drink.

Ice tips for hurricane preparation.

- Freezing water jugs: Buy 1-gallon containers of drinking water (2½ gallons, if your freezer will accommodate them), drain out about a half cup to leave room for expansion, seal tightly and freeze.
- Keep jugs in the freezer even after the power goes out; they last longer than in coolers. Once thawed, water is drinkable. Put into smaller bottles to carry, or use it from the larger jugs, but keep it clean and uncontaminated.
- Buy block ice if possible (from ice companies, boat supply stores and some grocery stores). It lasts up to three times longer than bagged, cubed ice.
- **Make your own blocks.** When a storm approaches, clean the freezer and fill it with stackable containers of water. Large mixing bowls or small buckets work. Freeze, and when frozen, transfer ice blocks to sealable bags.
- **Buy extra coolers**. Smaller areas are easier to chill. Once the power goes out, and foods begin to thaw or warm, pack them, tightly, into the bottom of the coolers, then top them with ice.
- **Try the bathtub**. If you're not using the bathtub for water, use it for ice. Buy huge blocks and load the tub. Cover it with a tarp. Or fill with cubed ice; cover with newspapers and a heavy tarp, then a layer of plastic to keep cold in. Use a drain plug to save water for other uses.
- Put food under ice, not above it.

When we flush, the waste goes into a holding tank that has two pumps to expel the waste UP and OUT into the Pinellas Park sewage system. When any of the above gets flushed, it clogs the pump, overheats it and burns out the motor.
