President's Message

Idon't often talk of my family, but, I want to tell you of my Great Grandmother, Mary. Grandma was born in 1880 and she died prior to her 114th birthday in 1994. Back in the early 70's, I did a school project interviewing Grandma about the changes she saw in her lifetime to that point. Can you imagine? No running water or flushing toilets, no electricity. Going from horses to cars, seeing airplanes in the sky, hearing radio for the first time. We have all seen changes. Do you remember the black and white television with rabbit ears? How about the rotary phone with the party lines? Did you take typing class in high school? Remember when computers first came out? You had to dial a phone, connect it to the computer, type in some really strange codes that appeared on a black screen, and they called it internet! Look at the changes you have seen through your lifetime. What about the changes



since Great Grandma passed away, the same year we became Americana Cove in 1994? Rotary phones don't exist, you don't see black and white tv or rabbit ears. Internet? It's everywhere and on the phone you carry in your pocket!

How do you respond to these changes? We all can talk about the "good ole days" but, we cannot continue to live in the past as the world changes around you. Grandma could not stop the businesses from booming around her little home that she lived in for all those years. She could no longer allow a horse to feed on her lawn or ride it down the street safely. Our current leadership team is aware that change is difficult, but, we need to adapt and show our resilience in accepting changes and being able to move forward. Documents that were written in 1994 need to be updated. We have engaged with a new legal firm that will streamline our documents to make them easier to read and follow. Infrastructure that was put in place needs to reflect where we are today. It's no longer feasible to have outhouses which changed to indoor plumbing with clay tile for sewer. We need to look at updating with PVC and ABS sewer pipes. We don't put in telephone poles anymore; now we need to add fiber optics. We are entering agreements with vendors for continual inspections and preventive maintenance. It's important to realize we can't continue to operate in the past. The world around us changes whether we like it or not. We need to show our strength, our determination, and our resiliency while we move with it.

Many of you are volunteering to help with those changes. I could not believe the number of people standing up to be on the committees we have asked for. The Planning Committee may suggest many changes and updates here in the Cove. The Marketing Committee will have good ideas to help implement ways to sell more property. Other committees are in place to ensure we continually strive to be better and more adaptive to the needs and circumstances around us. I sincerely appreciate you, your volunteer efforts, and your time and willingness to help update Americana Cove. Thank you!

Message from the Board of Directors

Text Generation Fiber Optic, Gigabit Network is coming to the Cove!

The Board of Directors is pleased to report that we have entered into a Right of Access (ROA) agreement with Tilman Fiber Co, to provide a Fiber Optic Next-Generation Gigabit Network throughout our community.

Tilman Fiber Co, in collaboration with T-Mobile, has a contract to lay fiber optics throughout the Southwest of Florida, in a campaign, T-Mobile refers to as "First to Fiber". They have offered to install a fiber optic network in our community at no cost to us. This would provide our residents an additional internet service provider, T-Mobile. This will be for Internet only, and not cable TV. Additionally, they will install free access points throughout our common



areas, such as the Office, Clubhouse/Pool Area, Gatehouse, Maintenance Building, Laundry Buildings, and possibly Founders Park and the South Boat Ramp.

By signing a Right of Access (ROA) agreement, we grant them access to existing easements and common areas, similar to what we have done in the past for our existing cable providers. They will first develop an engineering plan, and providing there are no impediments, they will install the fiber optic network. They are anticipating the installation to begin in late Q2, 2024. Tillman Fiber Co will maintain ownership and responsibility for maintaining the installed hardware, including the fiber optic cables. This is an excellent opportunity to enhance our infrastructure at no cost to the association.

The connection points will be at ground level, unlike our current unsightly pedestals that were previously installed by our cable providers.

Why would they offer this free of charge? T-Mobile secures exclusive rights to use the network for the first two years, with the potential to negotiate future use. By funding the installation, they gain access to almost 700 potential customers. Once the exclusivity agreement between Tillman Fiber Co and T-Mobile expires, the network will be considered open source and can support up to three additional providers.

What do we stand to gain from this arrangement? Updated Infrastructure in the form of Fiber Optics, at no cost to the association. With many of us switching to streaming apps, there is a need for faster internet speeds. Our current internet provider's equipment was installed more than 20 years ago. It is very outdated and they have no incentive to upgrade. This agreement will provide our residents access to a fiber optic, next-generation gigabit network. With our existing cable providers, we could potentially have access to as many as five internet providers, offering our residents more options, increasing competition, potentially lowering cost, while providing a next-generation gigabit network. As an added benefit, they will install free access points throughout our community, which will enable Wi-Fi connections to those areas.

It is important to note, that residents will still have access to their existing providers and there is no obligation to switch if you are satisfied with your current services.

When will this happen? Assuming there are no issues during the Engineering Study. They anticipate installation to begin toward the end of June 2024. We will update you on progress as the process continues.

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SOS - Serving Our Seniors

n the 2nd Tuesday of each month "Saving Our Seniors" Mobil Pantry visits Americana Cove with fresh vegetables to distribute to our residents. The pantry will be parked in the club house parking lot from 9:00-10:00am, Their Mission is to Serve the Needs of our Seniors Throughout the Tampa Bay Area by providing both fresh food and medical equipment.



Their only requirement is that you are, age, 55 or older. Saving Our Seniors is funded through donations and volunteers, this service is provided at no cost to you.

Five days a week, throughout the year, Kelli Casto rises at 3:30 a.m. to drive to the farmer's market in Tampa to select fresh food and vegetables for seniors throughout Tampa Bay area. Then she, one part-time employee and volunteers make three to four stops per day to distribute the food to communities of people 55 and older. This is in addition to a large medical equipment program she runs in which individuals and companies donate items such as wheelchairs, fourwheel walkers, shower grab bars, hospital beds, and lift chairs.

Casto was thrilled to procure a trailer recently to transport all her farmer's market food and some medical equipment. However, the offer of a truck to pull it fell through, so she hopes to find someone who could donate one. Please take advantage of their Pantry or use of Medical Equipment. 

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Can I Rent My Home?

Renting is popular at Americana Cove—for both owners and renters. To assist residents who want to rent their homes, we have a list of names of renters for both annual and seasonal rental who would like to rent in the community. As an owner, if you would like to obtain this list, send an e-mail to info@barefootrealtygroup.com and we will e-mail the list to you. You can then contact the renter direct regarding terms and monthly rental fee.

What to remember when renting:

- 1. Americana Cove rules state that residents can rent their homes for no less than 60 days.
- 2. The renter must be approved by management the same as residents. E-mail Barefoot Realty at the e-mail address stated above and we will e-mail the residency application to you.
- 3. Management will need a copy of your rental agreement, no matter if seasonal or annual rental.
- 4. If renting for less than six months and a day, residents should go to the Pinellas County Tax Collector website to sign up to pay the Tourist Development Tax. Here's the website: https://pinellastaxcollector.gov/property-tax/tourist-development-taxes/
- 5. If you rent your home for six months or more such as an annual rental, then you do not have to pay the Tourist Development Tax.
- 6. If you need assistance with an annual rental, contact Barefoot Realty at the e-mail address listed above.
- 7. How much can you earn from seasonal rental? The best months for renting are Jan. through March as residents can command the most rental fees: On average, from \$1,500 to \$2,000 for interior seasonal rental per month and \$2,500 to \$3,500 per month for waterfront seasonal rentals. The amount charged depends on size and age of home and amenities provided.
- 8. Annual rentals for interior homes range on average from \$1,300 to \$1,600 per month depending on age and size of home, while waterfront home annual rents range on average from \$1,500 to \$2,000 per month depending on size, age and amenities.


