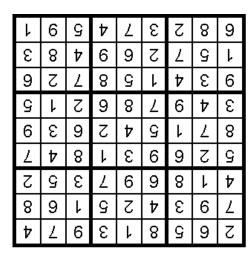

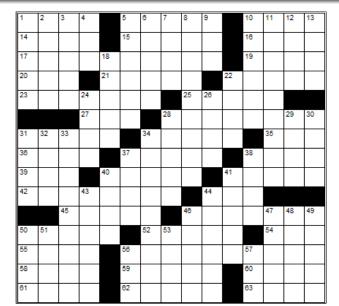

## **Reflections on hangovers and their cures**

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 $\mathbf{T}$  ith the holiday party season upon us, it might be useful to reflect on the subject of the hangover. According to Harold McGee, author of On Food and Cooking: The Science and Lore of the Kitchen, remedies for hangovers go back to ancient times. McGee says that as far back as medieval times, hair of the dog was being recommended by the medical school of Salerno: "If an evening of wine does you in, more the next morning will be medicine."

McGee says that the logic of this prescription is that the person who overimbibes is actually going through a slight withdrawal from drugs. That means, generally, that the longer you feel high and continue to drink, the worse you're going to feel the next day. There are probably millions who can verify this supposition. So it goes, that if you have a drink the next morning, you are giving the body what it got used to the night before, and you will feel slightly better from halting the withdrawal and mildly anesthetizing yourself.

However, this remedy comes with a caveat: You will at some time have to go through the withdrawal, so you are merely postponing the consequences by having another drink (one should also consider that repeating this over time can also lead to alcoholism).

Caffeine-laden drinks can reverse the effects of alcohol on the cranial blood vessels (alcohol enlarges them and caffeine shrinks them). This may help eliminate headaches due to alcohol consumption. Drinking liquids can also help restore fluid to the body, which has been lost due to dehydration when drinking. Eating carbohydrates can also help the body recover from the fatigue and malaise you may feel. Exercise may also help speed up the removal of the drug from the body. But generally speaking, and sad news for many, most hangovers must be treated by the passage of time.

## You can get moving without going to the gym

**T**f you want to get in shape, make it your business to move around more. This doesn't mean you have to do a "real workout," it just means that you need to make a conscious effort to L make "action-enhancing" decisions. Here are a few suggestions for getting on the move:

- Take the stairs, not the elevator or escalator.
- After lunch, take a walk with a friend instead of sitting around the lunch table gabbing.
- Mow your lawn, and stop waiting for someone else to take care of it.
- Plant flowers.
- Play hide and seek with your kids.
- Take your dog for a walk.

The main point here is to move around more than your norm. If you're living a sedentary life, now's the time to break the pattern. Once you do, you'll feel your energy start to increase — and you'll be glad you did.

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#### Want to have more energy and feel better? Try this

re you grateful for what you have in life? Do you recognize what you have? Many people don't, so how do you go about being more mindful of the good things in your life? According to some experts, keeping a "gratitude" journal," in which you list the good things that you are grateful for in your life, might be a good way to start. In a study of those who kept gratitude journals, Robert Emmons, a professor of psychology at University of California, found that those who wrote down what they were grateful for were more optimistic and felt better on the whole than those who wrote down what was bothering them or just wrote down neutral observations about their lives. So buy a journal, sit down and ponder the good things you have going for you and write them down.

### What to do when someone pushes your buttons

veryone knows someone who knows how to get him or her going. There is always a person in life who seems to possess an almost uncanny knowledge of ✓ what will put you over the edge—and it becomes that person's goal to do just that. This person can be your co-worker, your spouse, your mother, your child, even a perceptive stranger on a train.

The first step in dealing with these types of people and situations is to develop awareness of how you react. Do you crawl inside yourself to hide when some one roughs up your emotions? Do you become aggressive out of fear? Everyone's reaction to the fear and anger caused when someone pushes their buttons will be different. When you see the pattern of how you react, you are on your way to healing.

The next step is to develop a curiosity about your reaction. Is it linked to your past? What does it tell you about yourself? When you understand what you are reacting to, you will realize that people who push your buttons can teach you a lot about yourself.

After you have gathered this information, then you need to develop a way to pause for a moment when your button is pushed. Give yourself that moment of time to stop an automatic reaction. Let your awareness build-try exercises such as thinking, "I am feeling very angry right now" or "This is how I used to feel when my brother tried to tell me how to live my life." Take a deep breath and use the moment to avoid immediate reaction and you will be on your way to developing not only a deeper understanding of yourself, but of something universally human. One of the great Tibetan teachings, or mind-heart trainings known as lojong, is "Be grateful to everyone." Pema Chodon, a Buddhist nun and author of Start Where You Are: A Guide to Compassionate Living, says: "The slogan 'Be grateful to everyone' is about making peace with the aspects of ourselves that we have rejected. Through doing that, we also make peace with people we dislike. More to the point, being around people we dislike is often a catalyst for making friends with ourselves. Thus, 'Be grateful to everyone.""
