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### Do we really want to have the Midas touch?

In modern times, the name Midas is associated with someone who has such good luck that everything seems to go his or her way—and they become rich without even trying. But the original meaning of the King Midas story was very different.



Midas was the king of Phrygia, according to Edith Hamilton's classic book Mythology. Phrygia was the land of roses, and Midas maintained large, beautiful rose gardens near his palace.

One day, the old man Silenus wandered off from Bacchus' caravan because he was intoxicated. The rotund and aging drunkard was found passed out in a bower of roses near the palace. The servants, having a little fun, bound him with garlands of flowers and crowned him with a wreath of roses and took him stumbling and looking ridiculous to King Midas as a great joke.

Midas welcomed Silenus and entertained him for two days. Then the king led the old man back to Bacchus, the god of wine and intoxication, where he belonged. Bacchus was so glad to get Silenus back that he told Midas that whatever wish he made would come true.

Without giving the matter any thought, Midas immediately wished that whatever he touched would turn to gold. Bacchus, being a god, of course, immediately saw the folly of the king's wish, but granted it anyway.

Then Midas sat down at his table to take his dinner, but as he lifted his food to his lips he saw that it had become a lump of metal. ### Moving forward—without looking back

ear can often get the best of even the very brave. Here's a story adapted from Tales for Change by Margaret Parkin, from whence comes the expression "burning the boats." It's a powerful story of facing change—and learning the lesson that sometimes it's best to push forward without looking back:

Cortez, the explorer, was born in Spain in 1485. At the age of 14, he made his way out into the world to study law—but his true ambition was to become a conqueror and explorer.

Cortez had many adventures in his twenties and thirties, and eventually he joined forces with another explorer, Diego Velasquez. Together the explorers hoped to achieve their goal of conquering the Aztec city of Tenochitlan.

Cortez set off with about 500 soldiers in the year 1519 and landed at a spot known as Veracruz. Soon the explorer realized there was talk amongst his men of turning back to Cuba—rather than facing the potentially hazardous journey ahead. The soldiers, in order to conquer Tenochitlan, would have to navigate 200 miles of jungle and swampland before attacking the city, which was surrounded by water.

Cortez knew that he was facing a possible mutiny, and so took the bold action of having all of his own party's boats burnt.

Cortez forced the men to choose to fight or die by taking away all hope of retreat. Cortez's party went on to fight the Aztecs and conquer the fortress city.

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### How to throw a great party

Throwing a party is often a matter of the right combination of providing your guests relaxation and enough structure that they are able to enjoy themselves.

A savvy hostess knows that there are many ways to do this. Here are a few tips for throwing a winning party:

- Set the tone. If you really want everyone to relax and have fun make sure that you are completely organized, but, according to party-throwing expert Katie Brown, you might want to answer the door in your robe with your hair wrapped up in a towel to show people you are and getting ready to enjoy the evening without stressing out. Then go change for the party.
- Whatever you're going to serve, have it ready to go, and know how you're going to serve it. If it's sit down, you'll want to have the first course on the table before you call your guests in to sit down. If it's a buffet, round up some light help from your guests to do last minute preparations—they'll be relieved to be called upon—just don't ask too much of them.
- Accept all gifts graciously, but don't feel pressure to use what people bring immediately if you already have something else planned. Make sure you thank the person and emphasize you can't wait to try it tomorrow. If someone brings flowers, put them in a vase, but don't destroy the look of your table or room by giving them a central location (unless you want to and feel they will look good).
- Keep people talking and the conversation rolling. Don't let one person dictate what everyone talks about. You are the hostess and you can politely interject if someone takes over inappropriately or focuses on an inappropriate subject. Listen to what the per-son is saying and find a place to interject and segue into a new subject.
- See people out when they are ready to go, but don't linger at the door and ignore your other guests. You want to make sure everyone leaves feeling you truly enjoyed their company and that they added to the uniqueness of the evening.


### The next time you panic — think on this

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### Staying fit in old age keeps the brain sharp, study finds

study published in the journal Neurology suggests that keeping physically fit in old age can also keep the brain functioning normally.

"Our study suggests that being physically active in old age could keep



the brain fit," says study author Boukje M. van Gelder.

Physical activity can improve blood flow to the brain and in so doing reduce the risk of

Physical activity can improve blood flow to the brain and in so doing reduce the risk of dementia, stroke and cognitive decline. Activity could stimulate the growth of nerve cells in the hippocampus, the region of the brain involved in memory function. This could help the brain prevent further deterioration, because there is a "reserve" of nerve cells available.

The study included data on 295 men between the ages of 70 and 90, born between 1900 and 1920. The study began in 1990, and the men were tracked for physical activity and mental agility over a 10-year period.

Researchers found:

- Men who reduced their physical activity by an hour or more were 2.6 times more likely to suffer cognitive decline than men who maintained their activity levels.
- Men who performed their physical activity at a lower intensity over a 10-year period were 3.6 times more likely to suffer cognitive decline than those who maintained intensity level.

### Researchers prove learning keeps brain physically fit

Researchers at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology have finally proved that when it comes to brainpower the lowdown is "use it or lose it."



According to DrWeil.com's Weekly Bulletin, rats that were put into a two-chambered box and then learned to avoid a darkened area through receiving unpleasant foot shocks exhibited strengthened connections among synapses in the hippocampus.

Weil says that even though this learning/brain health connection has been suspected for decades—that this evidence actually shows the physical change in the brain when learning takes place.

This is an important piece of evidence that learning keeps the brain physically strong.

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
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
