



Later he said, "There is a thin line between genius and insanity, and I have erased that line."

The audience loved him. But some viewers and critics thought he crossed the line of good taste by talking about his mental illnesses on television.

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Are you at risk for a stroke?

Association, risk factors are traits and lifestyle habits that increase the risk of disease. Studies have verified that most of the risk factors for strokes can be modified, treated or controlled. Some of the most important things to know are the warning signs of a stroke. They are:

- Sudden weakness or numbness of the arm, leg or face—especially when it occurs on one side of the body.
- Sudden confusion, or trouble understanding or speaking.
- Problems with vision, in one or both eyes.
- Sudden trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance or coordination.
- Sudden, severe headache without a known cause.

If you, or someone you know is experiencing symptoms, call 911 immediately. Lost time can be devastating in stroke treatment.

If you want to begin the work of reducing your risk for stroke, a health care professional can help you devise a safe and effective plan. The following is a list of risk factors for stroke that can be controlled or treat-ed: high blood pressure, tobacco use, diabetes mellitus, carotid or other artery disease, atrial fibrillation, other heart disease, transient ischemic attacks or "warning strokes," certain blood disorders, sickle cell disease, high blood cholesterol, physical inactivity and obesity, excessive alcohol use, illegal drug use.

Slowing the effects of aging

ccording the Discovery Health Web site, if you want to be a lively 80 or 90 year old some day—then you need to start

following an anti-aging program. Here are some of the recommendations:

- Follow a low-fat, high complex carbohydrate diet. Eat five servings of fruits and vegetables and three servings of whole grains every day. Drink five to eight glasses of water per day. Derive only 30 percent to 35 percent of your diet from fat—20 percent of which should be unsaturated (examples are 1 percent milk, canola and olive oil.) Fifteen percent of your diet should be protein, with the rest having an emphasis on complex carbohydrates (examples are wild rice, whole wheat bread and oatmeal).
- Develop and follow a regular exercise routine. Regular aerobic exercise will help slow down the aging process, experts say. Strength building is also important. Consult a health professional to adopt a routine that will be right for you. Good exercise programs should help prevent the loss of stamina, strength, balance and bone density.

Why is bubble gum pink?

Here are some fun facts about chewing gum provided by the National Association of Chewing Gum Manufacturers:

- The first patent for chewing gum was issued to a Vernon, Ohio, dentist named William F. Semple.
- William Wrigley Jr. was a pioneer in branding and promoting goods through advertising in the early 1900s. His spearmint gum became a best seller.
- U.S. military personnel popularized chewing gum during World War II by giving it away as gifts in Europe.
- Cinnamon, spearmint and peppermint are some of the most popular flavors of gum today.
- Bubble gum cards were first issued in the 1930s. Pictures varied widely, from war heroes, figures of the Wild West and professional athletes. The Topps Company became famous for offering baseball cards in packs of gum and sponsoring bubble-blowing contests for players.
- The largest bubble-gum bubble ever blown was 23 inches in diameter. It was blown in 1994 by Susan Montgomery Williams in Fresno, Calif.
- You can remove gum that is stuck in hair using peanut butter. It helps disperse the gum from the strands of hair.
- Kids in North America spend about half a billion dollars every year on chewing gum.
- And, finally, bubble gum is pink because it was the only color the inventor had left at the time of inven-tion. The color was accepted or "stuck," if you will, and today bubble gum is still traditionally pink.
