RECIPE OF THE MONTH:

(This is a reprint of the July 2017 recipe of the month.)

Fantastically Fresh Summer Salad

Ingredients:

For the Dressing:

1/4 cup apple cider vinegar

1/2 cup extra virgin olive oil

2 tsp Worcestershire sauce

2 Tbs honey

1/2 cup onion, roughly chopped

1 Tbs sugar

1 TBS Dijon mustard

1/2 tsp salt

For the Salad:

1 head romaine lettuce, washed and torn into bite-sized pieces

1/2 cup radish, thinly sliced

1 cup fresh strawberries, sliced

1 1/2 to 2 cups broccoli or avocado, cut into bite-sized pieces

1/2 cup aged white cheddar or smoked cheddar cheese, cut into small cubes

Directions:

- 1. Mix all ingredients for the dressing into a food processor or blender; blend for 2 minutes. Set aside.
- 2. Place the lettuce in a large bowl; add dressing and toss.
- 3. Top with radishes, broccoli, and cheese. Serve immediately.

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








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
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LIBRARY

FROM THE OFFICE

et's try this again: Do not call the office to see why your check hasn't been deposited yet! We process 400 checks, using a 4-step verification process from the time you drop it off until it is actually deposited. The length of time it takes to get cashed will vary depending on the day of the week the 1st falls on, as well as what other things may be going on. Joelle and I are paid for 12 office hours a week, each.....add in the residents that come in and want a receipt, the phone ringing, rule violations, processing new applications, doing intake interviews, etc. After the third Wednesday of the month, I review the records to see if someone hasn't paid their rent yet or paid the wrong amount. If it is after this time, THEN you can contact us. We are through April, the 4th month of the year, and I am still receiving checks for the wrong amount. It takes time to copy the check, draft a letter, and mail it out. As a bookkeeper, I do not understand why you don't use standard bookkeeping....when you write the check, consider it "gone" from your account!

By now, most of the Snowbirds have left. If you plan to leave the park for any extended period of time, please let the office know the dates and confirm that we have a key for your



unit. If you plan to rent your unit, it must be for a minimum of 30 days and the office must be notified and provided with ID. If you are here and have guests, the office must be notified, and a valid photo ID provided.

Hurricane season researchers predict that there will be 23 named storms, 11 of which will become hurricanes, and 5 that will reach major hurricane strength with sustained winds up to 111 mph in 2024. Hurricane guides are available in the office. Please prepare NOW! The main thing to remember is that Embassy Mobile Park DOES NOT have any hurricane safe structures. I will stay in the Office and Roy will stay in the Hobby House....these are concrete buildings, so they provide the best protection and ensure we are "on site" in case we get hit. Mobile Home Parks are an automatic evacuation zone! By choosing to stay here, you are giving up any help from police, fire, and medical personnel.

Duke energy did a study of the entire park regarding the integrity of all of the power poles. Several have been replaced, with a few more to be done. They are also checking all the power lines for trees that need to be trimmed or removed. If you think the trees on your lot are too close to the power lines, call Duke energy, not the office. If they determine a tree must be removed, as long as it is in the "utility" easement, they have the right to remove it. Just a reminder that you are responsible for all the trees and shrubs on your lot, whether you put them there or they were there when you bought the mobile. The park is only responsible for the palms in front of less than half of the mobile home lots.....a lot have been removed due to disease and dying.

Pinellas County is again changing chemicals and testing the water. You may experience discolored water, a distinct odor in the water, or low pressure. They have also identified 14 manufactured home communities in Pinellas county with waste water system issues. Thankfully, we are not one of them. You can go online to Pinellas County Utilities and learn more about these things.

A reminder that any changes made outside of your mobile home must have park approval and possibly a permit from the city or county. Adding flower beds does not require a permit, but I need to inspect the area first to make sure it won't impede the lawn mower from getting through. I currently have stopped one brick paver project, and am working with another resident to make sure a new screen room follows park guidelines. By the time you read this, I will have a new driveway, and it went through the City of Largo permitting processing. You would not believe the number of departments that had to do "reviews" before I was issued the permit, and all I was asking was to replace my existing concrete driveway with brick pavers. Flower beds and decorative pavers usually do not require a permit, but you cannot install them on the easement between the mobiles. The other concern is the possibility of someone hitting a water or sewer line. Calling 211 DOES NOT identify the water and sewer lines, they are privately owned by the park. If the park must dig underneath a patio, walkway, etc. for an emergency break, it is the resident's responsibility to replace it. Before you begin any digging on your lot, you need to talk to Roy or myself about how to do it correctly with only a minimum chance of a line getting broken. If you or your contractor breaks the line, you are financially responsible for the repair.



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Call Roy immediately if this happens! New residents are given his phone number when they interview, and it is always on the inside of the back cover of every issue of News and Views.

Most of this information has been repeated several times, but still goes unheeded. It also serves to educate new residents.

I will not be scheduling Resident Monthly Update meetings through the summer unless something changes. Please read the News and Views and watch for flyers, the Social Club is bringing back some of the summer events, like hot dog roasts, ice cream social, etc.

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
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NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH





First, have you heard of the CPTED program? Officer Bowling surprised us with a 'pop quiz' concerning the various aspects of the program. For instance, CPTED is the acronym for Crime Prevention Through Environment Design. The basic concept is that you want to make it harder for crimes to happen to your property or your person by making improvements and being aware of your environment. I've included a flyer in this issue which gives more details about the program.

Second, Pinellas County Sheriff's Department Deputy Hughey shared a link for the Pinellas County Crime Viewer web page (https://egis.pinellas.gov/apps/CrimeViewer/). This is a good spot to find out what crimes are happening in our immediate area whether they are Largo PD or Pinellas County Sheriff's Department calls.

Lastly, Deputy Hughey has said she will be collecting unwanted medications at the April 25th meeting.

As a reminder, meetings are held on the last Thursday of the month year round. Everyone is welcome to attend. So, even if you don't want to participate in roving patrols of our neighborhood, you can still be a part of the neighborhood watch by simply keeping an eye out on your street or when you drive through the park going from point A to point B.

Natural Surveillance

Good visibility out of the building to see visitors coming in and good visibility of the building from the road, sidewalk or parking lot.

Access Control

Clear sidewalks, landscaping and signs that show visitors where they should go.

Landscaping and Lighting

Landscaping should follow the 2 foot/6 foot rule: All shrubs should be cut at 2 feet or below and tree canopies should be trimmed up to 6 foot for the best visibility.

LED lights provide the best CRI (color rendering index) which provide superior visualizations of individuals.

Territorial Reinforcement

Decorations, landscaping and personal touches that indicate the property is cared for and is personal.

Activity Support

Energizing a problem area with positive activities can deter crime.

Maintenance

A neglected property send the message that the owners do not care and invite unwanted users.

Target Hardening

Proper deadbolt locks, monitored security cameras and alarms can protect the property and alert owners to problems. The goal of CPTED is to design a property that reduces the opportunity for crime through structure, landscaping and lighting. The principles of CPTED can be divided into the following categories: Natural Surveillance, Access Control, Territorial Reinforcement, Activity Support, Maintenance and Target Hardening.

Largo Police want to help you and your loved ones stay safe and avoid the risk of potential scams. Here are some examples to spot scammers on the phone, in emails and more.

SUSPICIOUS CALLS, EMAILS & TEXT



If you receive a call, text, or email claiming money is owed to the government, a company or a local/federal law enforcement

agency, hang up or delete the email. Be sure to look it up online, and call the listed number to verify.

Contact family members if you receive a suspicious call from them asking for money. Don't send money to people you don't know.

PAYMENTS

Do not pay anything using gift cards, Bitcoin or any cryptocurrency as the only forms of payment accepted. Scammers use this tactic when someone "overpays" for an item or service, then requests the money back.

RESHIPPING JOBS



If you are solicited or apply for a reshipping job, do not answer or give any personal information out.

RENTING A HOME

Meet someone in-person before signing to rent a home or duplex. Be wary of communications only by text



or email. If excuses are given about meeting in person, do your research on the property, and be on alert for a potential scammer.

MORE TIPS



- Do not give personal information to individuals/companies you are unsure are legit.
- Do not open unexpected

emails that look like they're coming from the government or click on any attachments/links.

- Do not engage with scammers via phone, text, or email.
- Never allow access to your computer for remote access to install software. This often leads to anti-virus scams
