Pool: There is a designated smoking area at the pool and if you smoke, you will be required to smoke there and only there. Every week, the pool company finds butts in the filters. clogging them up and leading to downtime on the pumps which means the pool is closed until repairs are made. Also, per the health department and code enforcement, drinking alcohol at a public pool is strictly prohibited. NO GLASS OR CANS OF ALCOHOL ARE PERMITTED. The health department will shut down the pool and if we find bottles in the trash we will be forced to shut down the pool as well. The bottom line is that this is a community which means that the amenities are for everyone. Please be considerate of your neighbors and follow these simple rules so that everyone can enjoy a day by the pool. Thank you.

Park Appearance: Have you ridden around lately and noticed how much junk is in some driveways? Now is the time to do your part and get this area cleaned up if this is on you. Notices will be sent out soon, if not corrected and can lead to eviction.

To maintain the integrity of the community, we have stepped up our efforts to ensure that the exterior of homes is in compliance with the community standards. The original charm that initially brought many people into the community should be reestablished. CURB APPEAL IS KEY:

Exterior of the home is mildew-free and clean (pressure washed and repainted if required). This includes skirting, trim, awnings, shutters, etc.

Bushes/shrubs are trimmed, and garden beds are free of weeds (recommend installing new or refreshed mulch*/stones/shells).

Fences and/or enclosures are removed (unless previously approved by management). Driveway is clean (pressure washed and repainted if necessary).





Gutters are clean and free of weeds.

Screens and/or window treatments are not torn or broken.

Skirting, windows, shutters, awnings, trim, etc. are not broken or in disarray.

Items stored around the home are removed.

Obstacles in the yard, preventing landscapers' passage, are removed.

Satellite dishes are out of street view.

Cars must be operable, have current registration and not leaking fluids on the ground/ driveway. Registration sticker is current and affixed for visibility.

House numbers are visible.

No hot tubs, fire pits, trampolines, etc

Please be advised that if you will be changing the color of your home, you must check in wit the office to make sure the color won't offend by he new one.

For those on a budget, the Pinellas County Solid Waste Department has a Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) program. From that, they have created a "Swap Shop," for household chemical products such as paint, cleaners, and automotive fluids. It is free for Pinellas County residents. Availability can change, and quantities may be limited. Despite the name, there is no need to swap. When using the Swap Shop, your government-issued ID will be required. Visit: https://pinellas.gov/household-hazardous-waste-hhw-collection/ for more information.

MISC: Everyone who moves in MUST have a background check done. This means even if you have someone staying with you that wasn't an original resident when you purchased. If you think you know someone who hasn't had a background check, please notify the office.

Lastly: Garbage, please stop leaving mattresses and other large items outside of bins. You must arrange to have these taken out of the park yourself. Bins full? Can it keep until they are emptied? Can you push it to the back? Leaves more room for the front of the dumpster. Let's try to be considerate of everyone here, Try it... It could catch on.
