

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RECIPE OF THE MONTH:

7-LAYER SALAD

3 carrots, shredded

2 cups of Mayo

Cheddar cheese, grated

8 slices of bacon, cooked and chopped


Sugar (optional)



Directions:

FROM THE OFFICE



nce again, we are having dumpster and garbage issues. When you recycle boxes, they need to be flattened or they take up too much space in the dumpster. Also, the plastic bubble bags and styrofoam packing peanuts CAN NOT go in the recycle bin. If the park rent increase is partly due to fines being assessed for dumpster issues, this affects EVERYONE, so if a resident sees something they have the right to mention to you what you are doing wrong. If you are a resident who doesn't feel comfortable doing that, send me an email with the dumpster location (12th St or 3rd St), the day, and the approximate time. I will then look at the cameras and see if the culprit can be identified. Some people are just plain stupid, other people don't like rules....but everyone suffers the consequences!

A reminder to everyone that if you are doing a remodel project, call Roy and schedule the park trailer. It is delivered to you, picked up when you are done, and we empty it.....how much easier can we make it? This also includes tree and shrub trimming. We have a 30-yard dumpster in the RV section that is only for yard waste, tree trimmings, etc.

If you have a large appliance to get rid of, DO NOT put it at the road! Call Roy and he will make arrangements for Mitch to pick it up......Mitch will get it from your carport. If you put it




out to the road without making the proper arrangements, it will become your responsibility to get it taken care of. If you put items out to the road ahead of time, so everyone has to look at your garbage, they also will not get picked up!!!!! Read your rules....Nothing is to be put out to the road before 5 p.m. on Sunday, Tuesday, and Thursday because garbage is picked up on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday mornings, beginning as early as 7:30 a.m. They do not come back around; if it's not out by the first time around, it's not getting picked up. Check around, see how many mobile home parks do not pick up any garbage, do not have a large dumpster, or a brush dumpster. You have it good here, just follow the rules.

More hurricanes than normal are expected for this season; tornados and waterspouts are also increasing. I have begun sending out letters to residents to clean up their carports and backyards. No household furniture is allowed outside, it must be furniture designed for outdoors. Why, you ask? Because outdoor furniture is designed to withstand the weather and not become faded, torn, etc. Rats like to nest in cushioned furniture, so if the cushions become chewed looking, you probably have unwanted guests! (They usually chew from the bottom, so you will not know they are there until it's too late). Whatever you do, do not take furniture that you have had outside, inside. You are most likely moving "guests" inside, such as rodents and bugs. Fleas are a huge problem, and their eggs are so small you would not know if they were on the furniture. It also is a good idea to clean your outdoor furniture on a regular basis....a little bleach or chemicals will send unwanted guests running and kill any nests that may have been started. If you have mosquitos in your yard, chances are good that you have standing water somewhere....in old flower pots, buckets, anywhere it does not run off. It takes less than a teaspoon of water for mosquitos to breed.

Appliances are not allowed in your carport; I understand that you may need a second refrigerator, so I can ignore it IF it cannot be seen from the road and is kept locked. Weeds must be maintained on a regular basis, the walkway between your mobile and carport must be uncluttered, your screen room must be clean (no stacked storage boxes or mess that can be seen from the road); no broken windows, no ripped curtains, no blankets or paper on the inside of your windows, no boarded up windows, etc. All mobiles must be power washed annually. All paint and trim must be free of mold and not have faded paint on it. These are the main things that I look for when I do a park ride looking for problems. Take some pride in your home, imagine if everyone was not required to maintain the exterior of their home....after a while we would become a "trailer park" and no one wants that.

The Hobby House is not available for use until it gets some interior work done and painted inside. It has been rewired; hopefully by the time you read this all the trash will have been removed. My goal is to have a place where residents can have small get-togethers for a few friends and family that they could not normally have in their mobile home or RV. It will require you to reserve the date, and have it completely cleaned before you leave after you use it.

The Sewing Guild has done some "thinning out" of items, and their possessions will be confined to the sewing room and closet for storage when the building re-opens. They use the



In another Park building, Lynn Turner, Bill Burtt, and "crew" (sorry, I don't know who all helped), did a fantastic job of cleaning up the area that is used for Comedy Night props. I am having maintenance clean out some more "junk" that is in the front area where we keep handicap items (wheelchairs, walkers, portable potty chairs, shower chairs, crutches, and canes). If you have one of these items to donate, call Roy if it is in good condition.....we try to keep only good, clean, functioning items. These items are available to all residents who may need them short-term, so you don't have to buy them. Please limit the use to park residents and guests, not for friends and family that do not live here.

My goal with all this cleaning is to NOT have an area that is nothing but a collection of resident's "junk." There is no place for things you no longer want or need at Embassy. If you don't want it, or can't store it at your home, throw it out. For far too long residents have put things in various park storage areas that they either didn't want to store or no longer had any use for...moving forward, please place these items in the 30-yard dumpster. Even though these areas are usually locked, residents leave things outside the door, or put them inside when it is open. The amount of old small appliances in the Hobby House kitchen is ridiculous. Most residents had good intentions when they left them there, but no more. Moving forward, all that will be available in the Hobby House will be the refrigerator and kitchen sink. I am hoping to save the countertop, but all cabinets will be removed (they are a hazard, falling apart, splinters, etc.). I may add a small coffee pot and a microwave, but the ones we currently have are antique dinosaurs and not energy efficient. You will need to bring all items you need if you have a party in there.

One last note, do not leave your unwanted items in the Library screen room. If you receive a delivery in error, bring it to the office during office hours; Joelle and I do our best to deliver these items to the rightful owner, or have the delivery company pick them back up.

HURRICANE SEASON



es, folks, it's that time again. Hurricane Season runs June 1st through November 30th and the time to start preparing is NOW. Last year we ran a series of articles on how to prepare and what to expect. This year I thought I'd consolidate the information into a checklist of sorts. So, here goes:

- 1. Power. What are you going to do if the power goes out? If you purchased a generator, be sure to store your gas responsibly. If you plan to rely on flashlights and lanterns, check your batteries. It is a good idea to have at least one full set of replacement batteries for 'just in case'.
- **2. Cash**. Set aside some cash for necessary expenses. If the power goes out the ATMs at the bank cannot dispense money.

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
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
- **3. Bottled water**. Buy an extra case of water now and store it in the closet until the end of the season. It won't spoil.
- **4. Paper products**. Get a pack of paper plates and some paper bowls. If the power goes out or the water supply is disrupted, you will not be able to wash dishes.
- **5. Important papers**. Gather your important documents and secure them in a watertight container.
- **6. Medications**. Make sure you have a 30-day supply of medications on hand at all times.
- 7. Pack a "go bag" for you (and another for your fur baby, if you have one). Important things to pack? As a minimum, you should include several changes of clothing, medications, chargers for all your electronic devices, and hand sanitizer. Important items for your fur baby include leash and collar, pet carrier, immunization records, and food (don't forget food and water dishes!).

As a reminder, manufactured home communities are considered mandatory evacuation zones in the event of a hurricane. You can choose to remain in your home; however, you forfeit access to police, fire, and medical assistance until after the storm passes. Also, <u>NO BUILDING</u> IN THE PARK IS A DEDICATED HURRICANE SHELTER.

EMBASSY LUNCHEON



EMBASSY COMEDY SHOW



n Interview with the Director, Lynn Turner

Question: What made you volunteer to run this year's show?

Lynn: When I was part of the cast I had so much fun with the recitals, the practices every Tuesday, and the whole

show itself was fun. I didn't want to see the tradition stop.

Question: Are you glad you volunteered?

Lynn: I actually enjoyed taking it on once it started. The staff that worked with me this year were phenomenal. They helped in every way possible. Elaine would tell me things I should look out for or do ahead of time, so I was prepared when the actual events came on. I could've used more hands with the stage, but Angela and Norm did their best. I'd love to see more people get involved next year. I've already been told that people are working on something for next year. That's what I'd like to see happen ... more people getting involved when they see how much fun it is. We will keep the same format and only do it for one night so hopefully they get their tickets early.

Question: Isn't this a lot of work to do for only one night of performance?

Lynn: Actually, I found it too much work with 2 performances. I was exhausted after performing for 2 nights; don't forget the night before for the dress rehearsal. This year, we rehearsed weekly on Tuesday nights and



then, the week before the performance, we were here for 4 nights. Still, I wasn't as exhausted as I was doing 2 nights. It takes a lot of guts to get up on stage. It's a good thing sometimes the lights are in your eyes. You're scared, but you're there to entertain so that's what you do. I find it very much fun and the one night is perfect.

Question: Did you have problems with people not wanting to show up for practice? Or, did just one night a week for practice work well?

Lynn: This was not an issue. Every Tuesday night the entire cast showed up. For the first few weeks, our meetings lasted only an hour because they were mainly planning meetings. Once we started actually practicing our performances, we got up on the stage to rehearse.

Question: In the past, the comedy show had a theme. Do you think it would've been better to have a theme?

Lynn: I feel that selecting a theme limits the performers to acts that are related to that theme. In fact, I suggested at this year's "after party" that we select a theme for next year and everyone said "No!"

Question: The majority of the acts were geared toward humor, is that what you're looking for? Only comedy? Or, if someone wants to recite a poem or do a serious reading, would that work?

Lynn: To me, that is talent. So, I would go for that. Also, people who play instruments. I'd like to see more musical acts. Not everything has to be comedy. It's really a variety show.

Question: We had some new faces this year. What kind of feedback did you get from them?

Lynn: They were so excited. Jesse and Carla told me they are already looking for ideas for next year. I did tell everyone that we want all new acts for next year.

Question: What about props and costumes?

Lynn: Jerry and I went to the Fun Night storage and organized everything. We put stuff on coat racks, put hats on shelves, put other stuff in bags. That's one of the things we are going to do next year - the day after our initial meeting we will go as a group to the storage area to look at what there is to use. There are still backdrops from previous years, benches, canes and walkers ... just so much stuff. If someone wants props or costumes that are not in storage, it is the performer's responsibility to buy their own stuff.



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








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
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Question: How did you handle the dressing room part?

Lynn: That was a bit tricky. The guys had the garage, but they chose to use the shuffle courts area instead. Most of the cast didn't have a lot of costume changes to make. Jesse and Carla used the kitchen. Cathy Russell and Gloria Burtt used the front lobby. They put their stuff in the closet and used the area behind the curtain to change. Cast members who weren't on stage waited outside.

Question: Any thoughts on what could make it better?

Lynn: We need more stage hands. It gets a little crazy when the performers also have backstage duties. And we need people with a little muscle to do the heavy lifting.

Question: Any regrets?

Lynn: No, absolutely not. We had a ball. It was a pleasure to actually do it. It is a bit time consuming to set up a schedule for the acts, but once it was set up it was good. And the cast never complained. We would discuss new ideas and either accept or reject them on their merit. I plan to make up a book over the summer showing what it takes and what to do when setting up Fun Night. This year was a learning curve, but I want to put down the stumbles and fixes I had along the way to make it easier for the next person.

Question: Are you looking forward to next year?

Lynn: Really looking forward to next year. Changing the name to "The Variety Show" sounds like a good idea. I can't wait to see what the cast comes up with for next year.

We do ask that you sign up in advance of the event. A sign-up sheet will be posted outside the Clubhouse as we get closer to the event.


HURRICANE TAX HOLIDAY

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
