Teamwork from the birds

creatures it comes naturally as a way to survive and to expend the L least amount of energy, according to a BBCNews Online story. For instance, in France at the Centre National de la Recherche Scientifique in Villiers en Bois, scientists taped heart monitors to great white pelicans. These birds had been trained to fly behind a light aircraft and a boat, and a team was able to observe them during their flight. Pelicans, it is known, fly in "squadron" formation, or in a "V," and they flap in time with their leader. Scientists, now able to observe and gather data from the heart monitors found that the birds' heartbeats were lower when they flew in formation than when they flew solo. This was because they were able to benefit from each other's air streams. They were also able to glide more. Animals of all types evolve certain behaviors because it helps them to migrate, feed or survive more easily. The entire group benefits because less energy is required to perform the great task at hand. Working together, the birds were able to accomplish their migratory goals by expending less energy and being able to fly farther than when they are alone. It seems that there is a lesson here, and it's not for the birds.

To make a good decision, observe the bee

ould you use a little collective wisdom in the workplace? If so, you might want to follow the way bees make their decisions, because according to researchers, they have it all over human beings when it comes to making group decisions.



According to Cornell University biologist Thomas Seely in a Cornell Chronicle Online story by Susan S. Lang, bees build coalitions until a quorum develops. Seely says that humans really could benefit from taking a lesson from the bees when it comes to making decisions because bees rely on disagreement and contest, whereas humans often rely on consensus and compromise.

Here's how a swarm of, say, 10,000 honeybees decide where their next new home is going to be. A few hundred scouts are sent out to look at real estate, and when they find a site they like they do a waggle dance. If they like it a lot, they really get down dancing, which is their way of advertising the site to other scouts. Then the scout will revisit the site frequently and dance the day away. Other scouts select other sites, and advertise those to other uncommitted scouts as well. Bee scouts build up at the best sites quickly, because they grade the level of recruitment, which is directly linked to site quality. Whenever 15 or more scouts have gathered around a particular site, the scouts then signal home to the others to get ready to fly to the new home. Researchers know the bees make excellent decisions because they set up situations that offered choices to the bees, some superior for bees, and others ho-hum. The bees almost always chose the superior sites.

So what should humans take away from the bees? How about this? Frank discussions and disagreements coupled with some friendly competition might just help human committees achieve a little collective intelligence and avoid collective folly, researchers say.

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
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Memo: From the Accounting Department

Microexpressions linked to emotions people may be trying to hide

ne of the world's foremost experts on facial expressions and how they relate to deceit says he first began to develop deceit identification skills when he was a bouncer in a Buffalo, N.Y., bar. Mark Frank, an associate communications professor at the University of Buffalo, a social psychologist and revolutionary researcher says he taught himself to spot behavior that indicated patrons were underage, packing lead or looking for a fight. He says he developed a sixth sense that helped him identify when people were trying to get away with something.



Frank's work now indicates that, when people are being deceptive, they expose themselves by a series of microexpressions of the facial muscles in conjunction with other behavioral cues. Frank says he wants to make it clear that these expressions by themselves or even in a series mean nothing and are not a sweeping indictment of anyone, but only have meaning in context with other cues.

However, J.J. Newberry, who was formerly a senior special agent with the federal bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, says that Frank's methods are "uncanny." In fact, his methods are considered so effective and accurate that he has been called upon by judges, the office of Homeland Security and even Scotland Yard to assist in investigations.

Frank's mentor was Paul Ekman, known as the world's foremost expert in reading facial expressions. Ekman did research on expressions and found that there were facial expressions linked to emotions that were identical from culture to culture. He established a numbering system for each of the movements that created facial expressions, for instance, 1 is left and right eyebrows up, 2 is the eyebrows pulled together, and so forth. Frank took this work, which identified movement associated with the 44 human facial muscles and linked them to things like fear, distress and deception. He developed computer programs that took Ekman's numbering and made it instantly accessible. What used to take three hours of painstaking stop, rewind, start video viewing to assess one minute of facial movement could now be done almost instantly. "What we have done is quantify it, automate it, prove its effectiveness and teach it very effectively," Frank says.

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Some folks are willing to suffer more just to get the bad experience over with

If you've ever really dreaded something, you know the anticipation of something unpleasant is usually far worse than the actual experience. For instance, some people experience dread about having simple dental or medical procedures performed, even though once they're actually undergoing the experience, they find out it's usually not as bad as they imagined it would be.

A team of Emory University Scientists decided they wanted to understand how people make decisions when the outcomes are known to be unpleasant by using functional magnetic resonance imaging. The results appeared in a recent issue of the journal Science.

The study used an MRI scanner to look at the brains of participants while a series of low voltage shocks was delivered to one of their feet. The intensity of shock and the time delays were varied and each participant underwent a series of 96 shocks. Before each shock, the participant was told how painful the shock would be (as a percent of their threshold) and how long they would have to wait for the shock. Then they were given the opportunity to choose different intensity-delay combinations. The degree of willingness to take a stronger shock sooner was indicative of the dread the participant experienced.

There were 32 participants in the study, and while most of them preferred to speed up the waiting period and were considered mild "dreaders," 28 percent of them dreaded the upcoming shock so much that they were willing to take more pain so they wouldn't have to wait. These participants were deemed extreme dreaders.

The accompanying brain scans showed that mild dreaders and extreme dreaders had different patterns of brain activity. Extreme dreaders had more activity in the attention based parts of the pain matrix — and the activity was seen much earlier when compared to mild dreaders.

Neuroscientist Gregory Berns, the lead researcher of the study, says that dread is not quite the same as fear or anxiety. The key finding, he said, was that extreme dreaders devoted more attention to the part of the body where the shock was expected. This is good news for dreaders, because it means that diverting attention to something else can dissipate the experience of dread. Dr. Berns' advice if you're dreading something: watch a movie, meditate, play a sport, do something to shift attention and see if it helps. Or, as many wise people in the past have recommended: Get your mind on something else.

Romance scams occur when a criminal adopts a fake online identity to gain a victim's affection and trust. The scammer then uses the illusion of a romantic or close relationship to manipulate and/or steal from the victim.

The scammer's intention is to establish a relationship as quickly as possible, endear himself to the victim, and gain trust. Scammers may propose marriage and make plans to meet in person, but that will never happen. Eventually, they will ask for money.

If someone you meet online needs your bank account information to deposit money, they are most likely using your account to carry out other theft and fraud schemes.

Tips for Avoiding Romance Scams:

- Be careful what you post and make public online. Scammers can use details shared on social media and dating sites to better understand and target you.
- · Research the person's photo and profile using online searches to see if the image, name, or details have been used elsewhere.
- Go slowly and ask lots of questions.
- Beware if the individual seems too perfect or quickly asks you to leave a dating service or social media site to communicate directly.
- · Beware if the individual attempts to isolate you from friends and family or requests inappropriate photos or financial information that could later be used to extort you.
- Beware if the individual promises to meet in person but then always comes up with an excuse why he or she can't. If you haven't met the person after a few months, for whatever reason, you have good reason to be suspicious.
- Never send money to anyone you have only communicated with online or by phone. ReportFraud.ftc.gov

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

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
