

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

In keeping with the By-Laws of the Association, the election will take place at the annual meeting on the third Wednesday in February, February 19 at 7:00 p.m. in the Clubhouse.

Jeanne Hunter is heading up the Nominations Committee for elections, which needs two more members. Please contact Jeanne at 432-9792 to volunteer to be on the committee or be willing to serve if she asks you. The Nominating Committee will solicit candidate for directors. Please consider volunteering or agreeing to run, if you are asked.

Prior to the election, the Nominating Committee will deliver a written notice to each residence in the park to introduce each nominee for director and state their experience and relevant capabilities. Nominations will also be accepted from the floor during the annual meeting. The new Board of Directors will take office immediately following the election.



Voting may be in person or by proxy. The form naming the person voting and his/her proxy will be included with the notice introducing the nominees. The proxy must bring the form, signed by the voter and the proxy, to annual meeting in order to vote. Proxies are counted toward establishing a quorum.

Dee Murphy and Jeanne Hunter are current members of the Board. Malcolm Dean, former President, and Wayne Perkins were recalled by vote of the HOA. James Shelton resigned to Dean. Murphy and Hunter solicited Jack Lees, Patty Harwood and Carol Raabe to serve in the interim to help plan and carry out the election.

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
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

NOTES FROM THE BAY RANCH OFFICE





- 1. Parking on grass or sidewalk, overnight on street, and/or every day.
- 2. Parking overnight at the Clubhouse without Office authorization.
- 3. Failing to register at the office all persons living living with you.
- 4. Piling garbage in front of garbage bins. When you throw garbage, throw it to the back so when you open the door, it doesn't fall out and there is space.
- 5. Failure to maintain, paint and/or clean mobile home, trim, awnings, planter and driveway.

Rent increases of \$20 a month go into effect January 1, 2020. Rent that is now \$572 a month will be \$592 a month in 2020; rent that is now \$580 will be \$600 a month. No other fees related to rent will change.



Sewage remains an intractable problem. Drains continue to back up because grease, vinyl/rubber gloves, paper towels and other inappopriate items are flushed. **Bay Ranch will not pay to unclog sewers when the clog is caused by inappropriate items put down the sewer.** The tenant will have to pay for this problem.

Eds. Note: It is inappropriate to flush anything other than toilet paper, and doing so causes costly sewer clogs. If the park pays, we will we all, ultimately, through rent increases.

Also, those so-called flushable personal cleansing cloths are really *NOT FLUSHABLE*. They do not disintegrate in the sewer system, and they WILL clog the sewer someplace in the system. Lots of people like to use these cloths in the bathroom, but PLEASE do not put them in the toilet. Limit what goes into the toilet to toilet paper. Eds. Note: My housemates and I had



to hire a plumber when our own drain system clogged due to dishwasher detergent that was not well dissolved. We had virtual rocks of detergent blocking the drain. Our solution (after paying the plumber): liquid detergent.

> Those metal electric service boxes behind each mobile home belong to Duke Energy. Please do not service or pay to service them yourself.


Call Duke Energy or Carol Alvey (see her cell phone number at the front of the Review) if your electric needs service. Why? Well, in a couple of instances, residents have submitted bills for about \$4,500 for service. If the repair is the park's responsibility, we have an electrician who will do the work for \$1,500. It just makes economic sense.

From the box to the mobile home is the resident's responsibility. Please make your own arrangements with an electrician if that area needs repair.



Homeless people are moving into the park. In one instance, an empty coach was left unlocked and homeless people had moved in. In several instances, people have been sleeping in the driveways/patios of empty homes. And other have been sleeping on the shuffleboard courts, sometimes using cushions from outside the clubhouse for mattresses.

Please watch out for your neighbor and neighborhood. If you see someone entering a home you know to be empty, or someone sitting or sleeping in that home's driveway/patio, or any other inappropriate behavior of this type, please call the Largo police. It is ok in this case to use 911 because you don't know what the danger is.



Cars parked on the street during the day should be staggered so emergency vehicles can pass by. Do not park on the grass or sidewalk.

You must register at the office if you have something parked in the field north of the clubnouse, or see Brent (maintenance).

- * Please, put ALL garbage in the dumpsters, even big and heavy items like furniture.
- * DO NOT dump behind, beside or anywhere near the trash bins. Put the garbage in the bins.

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- *Put household trash in the smaller trash bins.
- * Do not bring garbage to the bins on Monday morning. By that time, the bins are overflowing. Wait until Monday afternoon or later, when the bins are empty.
- * Pick up for furniture, tree brush/limbs and other debris will be on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday only. Put out trash after 5:00 p.m, the day before.

*DO NOT DISPOSE OF TVS OR ELECTRONICS IN THE PARK. DO NOT PUT THEM IN OR BESIDE THE DUMPSTER. We get fined. Call pinellascounty.org/recycle to dispose of them.

*If you need help disposing of something, someone in the park may help you for a fee

Larger families and visitors: Reminder: that rent is based on one or two per household. Each person above the two must pay an additional \$30 a month, including visitors who stay over 30 days. Please be proactive about this and pay the money without first being reminded.

The following information remains in force:



Fires: Test your smoke detectors to make sure they work. Recommended action: purchase a fire extinguisher if you don't have one and know how to work it. If a fire starts, spray it with the fire extinguisher immediately and GET OUT OF THE HOUSE. Fire destroys mobile homes very quickly.

Management requests that you turn off your water heater when the water is off, to prevent the element from burning out. Eds. Note: According to diy.stackexchange.com/questions/3766, this needs to be done because the element will burn out if the water heater becomes empty. Tankless heaters don't need this.

Other announcements:

The purified water dispenser at the clubhouse operates on its own schedule. After someone has filled containers, it may take the dispenser some time to regenerate enough water for more containers. There is a light on the dispenser that tells whether it is ready.

Some have questioned why the application fee is "so high." One reason is to help cover garbage fees, since new owners usually throw away most of the furniture and electronics.

Mr. Larson (the owner) calls the lawn service for lawn care on an as-needed basis. The park pays for lawn mowing, etc., once a month but the need sometimes goes unnoticed. If you notice the lawn needs trimming, please let the office know so they can call Mr. Larson.

Sometimes an automobile will leak oil onto our new, nice looking pavement, creating an eyesore. If you notice a leak by your house, call the office to have it cleaned up. Let's keep these streets looking nice!



Lost and Found Dog/Cat: If you have found a dog or cat, you can post on a site called pawboost.com or call Animal Service on Walsingham. If you call, Animal Services will come out, free of charge, to pick up an animal.

All Residents: Rules commonly broken:

- 6. Parking on grass or sidewalk, overnight on street, and/or every day. The Office must authorize overnight parking at the Clubhouse.
- 7. If you have someone living with you, make sure you have registered in the office.
- 8. Piling garbage in front of garbage bins. When you throw garbage, throw it to the back so when you open the door, it doesn't fall out and there is space.

Check mobile for cleaning, trim, awnings, driveway and/or painting.

see reports of the various sport and club events during the previous month. Reports can be short and basic. Here is a sample template:

Friendly shufflers played [name of park] (here or there) on [date.] The final score was [## to ##]. Name, name and name won both of their matches.[Any relevant comments.]

When Mr. Larson decides to increase the rent, my reaction is usually to accept the increase because I know his costs are also increasing. I love living here and recognize that rent here is very reasonable compared to other 55+ parks in the area. The HOA used to visit with the owner before rent was changed and tell us residents the reasons for the rent increase. If this happened for 2020, I missed it.

What I am aware of, however, is resident misconduct which leads to higher costs for the owner and can't help but inform rental rates. Examples of this are flushing inappropriate items down the toilet and arranging for repairs that the park would provide if management were notified.

Really, what responsible person flushes grease, paper towels or rubber gloves? No wonder their sewer clogs. Fixing these clogs is, in my opinion, the responsibility of the resident, and I encourage management to follow through with billing them.

I'm not privy to total costs last year for sewer transgressions, but management has given me an example of the comparative costs for residents who make their own arrangements to fix the electric box in the metal case behind each coach. The office has received bills from residents of nearly \$4,500 for repairs by electricians they have hired. Bay Ranch can have the same repairs made for less than \$1,500. And Duke Energy may be responsible for making the repairs without cost to any of us!

I'm pretty sure that no one I know is responsible for either of these blunders. In fact, we

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had an extra member in our family named Yahooty. Yahooty was the little man who wasn't there, and he was responsible for everything no one would take credit for. Or blame. We probably have a Yahooty or two in our park.

But if we want to keep our rent down, and/or if we want the owner to maintain the park according to high standards, we ALL need to do our best to curb costs where we have some control. It never hurts to contact management about needed repairs, and it always helps to be smart about what we flush.

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
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
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Decisions were made by going "eeny-meeny-miney-mo."

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

ost resident activities begin their seasons in October or November and continue through March. Activities during the hiatus are usually impromptu, so watch the white board at the clubhouse for notifications.

Fishing

Jim Hale, Coach 177, 403-6434

Fishing is a new activity proposed for next winter, October 1 to March 31. This activity will be open to all. Options for fishing include:

Charters. Prices below are for an 8 hour trip composed of 1½ hours out 20 to 30 miles, 1½ hours return trip, and 4-5 hours fishing. No license is required. The charter will clean and bag your fish for a nominal fee. The arranged charter is \$125 per person.

In general, large charters can handle up to 150 people and cost from \$70 to \$90 per person. A small charter with 6 people costs \$130 per person.

Shore Fishing is also a possibility. It requires a license.

Sign up in the club house if you are potentially interested.

Horseshoes
