

Marilyn Jones helps keep the gals in shape during morning pool classes


Donna Collins, our newsletter Editor works hard at helping to keep us in the know!

MANAGER'S MESSAGE

ffice Closure – The Business Office will be closed December 24th and 25th for the Christmas Holiday. Staff is looking forward to the four-day weekend!

<u>Annual Meeting</u> – Members should have received the First Notice of Annual Meeting, Notice of Intent Forms for those that want to run for the Board, a Voting Certificate, and a copy of the 2021 Emergency Contact form. The Annual Meeting is scheduled for January 20, 2021.

<u>Voting Certificates</u> –If you own your home with anyone other than a spouse or if you and your spouse have a child listed on your Membership Certificate or share, you will need to complete and submit a Voting Certificate to let us know who will be the "voting member" for your home. If you are unsure if you have already submitted this or not, please complete and return the form to update our records.

<u>Tax Exemptions</u> – In addition to a Homestead Exemption for year around residents, there are several other exemptions you may qualify for. Some examples are: Widow/Widower Exemption, Blind Persons Exemption, Disability Exemptions, Disabled Veterans or Surviving Spouse Exemptions, and Low-Income Senior Exemption. The deadline to file for these exemptions is March 1, 2021. For more information, contact the Pinellas County Property Appraiser's Office by calling 727-464-3207 or visit their new office located at 2500 34th Street North, Second Floor.

<u>Flu Shot Clinic</u> – We held a Flu Shot Clinic on October 20th. Walgreen Drugs provided free flu shots to approximately 32 residents. It was a very successful event; we will try to schedule another one next fall.

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FROM THE EDITOR

ell, we made it to the last month of the infamous year 2020. May it rest in peace. Let us move forward to a, hopefully, healthier, happier 2021.

An interesting statement was made at the Town Hall on October 28th. It has long been a topic of discussion in the park whether an individual may own more than one membership certificate and therefore more than one unit in Clearwater Cascade MHP. The general consensus has been "no", partly based on the fact that a person can only, physically, occupy one unit. Our forward-thinking Board of Directors decided to send this question to our lawyers for their clarification.

Mr. Drew Corbin responded;

"With respect to whether Article III Section 1 of the Bylaws requires an individual to literally occupy a lot/unit in order for the individual to be a member of the Association, it does not. Article III Section 1 does require that an individual who owns multiple membership certificates also own the accompanying lot/unit of each of the certificates held. The word "occupy" is a term of art which means "to hold in possession or to hold or keep for use." In this respect, an individual could "occupy" multiple units."

The question now becomes whether a limit should be put on the number of memberships a person can own (each membership certificate is entitled to a vote). Other questions might also include; If a person needs to meet a certain income level to own one, then should they be required to have double that level to own two, triple that to own three, etc.? Think about this issue as you may hear more about it in the future.

In the meantime, I would like to wish everyone a Happy, Healthy Safe Holiday Season, no matter how you celebrate it, and a very Happy New Year.

QUESTIONS TO ASK CANDIDATES RUNNING FOR THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF OUR HOA

lecting a new board member is much like interviewing a new employee for a job. How do you intend to weed out the good from the bad? The people you place into leadership roles are a direct reflection of your community, so choose wisely HOA management com-



reflection of your community, so choose wisely. HOA management companies want to share five important questions you should be asking prospective board members.

1. DO YOUR UNDERSTAND AND COMPLY WITH OUR GOVERNING DOCUMENTS?

Governing documents are extremely important and something that HOA management companies can assist you with administratively. Because your governing documents guide the association, it's crucial that all members understand and abide by them. Members should be educated on the following:

Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions (CC&R) – Articles of incorporation – Bylaws –
 Community plans

2. ARE YOU COMFORTABLE MAKING HARD DECISIONS?

There will be times where board members have to come together to make tough decisions like increasing fees for example. Is the potential member ok with being unpopular at times? They need to be able to think critically and do what benefits the community even if means making some people unhappy.

3. CAN YOU COMMIT TO THE REQUIREMENTS OF THE ROLE?

Taking a board leadership role requires time, dedication, and resources. Make great strides to educate potential recruits about the expectations and requirements of the role. If they are juggling various responsibilities in other areas of their life, discuss how their existing responsibilities will affect their ability to meet the needs of the HOA board.

4. ARE YOU A TEAM PLAYER?

An HOA board is not a dictatorship. Homeowners trust board members to look out for the best interest of the community as a whole, not the board member's own interest. Board members must be unbiased, carry their own weight, and align with the vision of the board and community even when it doesn't suit their personal desire.

5. IN WHAT WAYS CAN YOU ENHANCE OUR BOARD?

Becoming a board member is about serving others with a unified goal in mind for the community. However, each member will possess strengths, talents, and interest that benefit the community as a whole. Prospective members should be ready to discuss what they bring to the table and how they are an asset and not a liability to the community.

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Board Responsibility By Jane Jarlenski

learwater Cascade is more than just a neighborhood. In many ways, it's a lot like a business. Collectively, our regular annual assessments or maintenance fees amount to tens of thousands of dollars that need to be budgeted carefully and spent wisely. And our neighbors who have volunteered and been elected to serve on the association's board are responsible for making critical decisions—on our behalf—about managing the community and our money.

Our board also develops long-range plans—like when the roads will need to be repaved and when the swimming pools will need to be resurfaced. The board must set aside funds so that these kinds of projects can be accomplished on a schedule or even ahead of schedule in the event there is an unexpected breakdown. You will hear the Board of Directors discuss "Reserves". Reserve Accounts are to community associations like Retirement Planning or 401K Plans are for individuals.

The board also sends out requests for bids and contracts with vendors to do the work necessary to maintain the shared amenities. Board members decide who will do the best job of painting the common area buildings at the best price or who will be the most reliable company to hire to mow the grass and remove dead tree limbs.

The board's decisions can have a significant impact on the community's appearance and, consequently, on property values. Regardless of our professional manager, the board ultimately is responsible for overseeing association operations. Be sure to communicate with the board regularly, observe board meetings, and attend annual meetings to elect responsible board members and participate in the conversations about significant community issues.

To Residents:

t a recent Town Hall, Ken Smith asked the Board for a response to the two questions seen below. Since those attending the Town Hall heard the questions, it was felt the answer should be available as well.



Ken,

Thank you for attending the Town Hall on October 20th. You asked two questions that the Board was unable to answer on the spot, but I did assure you that you would receive a response when it was looked into.

Your first question was "The Board voted on Feb. to close the back gate from 1-3 daily in order to eliminate the school traffic. Has this been done?"

The minutes of that Board meeting were not presented as clearly as they could have been.

The actual motion that was voted on in that February meeting was the Motion to accept the Manager's Report as presented. The issue about closing the back gate was part of a discussion presented during the Manager's report.

The discussion was a result of a memo Jane received from a resident after the January Town Hall inquiring about the school traffic problem. It was agreed that we would try closing the gate from 1-3 to see if it did impede school traffic but did not adversely affect the comings and goings of the residents. Before the plan was implemented, we were presented with the COVID situation and Governor De Santos order of closing the schools. With the school closing it became an unnecessary action.

In answer to your question - No, this has not been done.

Your second concern was "Why is it taking so long to get the mailbox kiosks replaced."

First, and again, the Covid issue and the State requirement to close operations played a part in this circumstance. This mandated closure made it difficult for manufacturers to produce product.

This particular Manufacturer was using this reason when our CAM tried repeatedly to determine the status of the project.

The last communication resulted in the manufacturer advising that an error had been made by their engineering dept and we would have to start over from the beginning. An additional seven-month delay!

At that time, it was decided that cancelling the contract and going elsewhere was in the Park's best interest.

The project is already under way using an alternate provider. This, of course, will require a new Board vote when actions and prices have been determined.

Thank you, Ken for your interest in how the Board is working. We are always happy to answer any questions.









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Let Your Voice be HeardBy Jane Jarlenski

TT e've got an election coming up, and ev

e've got an election coming up, and even if you're unable to attend the membership meeting and election, you can still vote by proxy.



A proxy is the written authorization that allows a member to appoint another (the proxy holder) to vote on his or her behalf. State law and

the association's governing documents specify that the association can use proxy voting. The Proxy document is complicated and hard to understand. The State of Florida and the cooperative Act specify the format of the document.

Why would you use a proxy? Maybe you're traveling during the election or have other obligations that prevent you from attending the meeting, but you still want your voice to be heard.

If you're interested in using a proxy, the manager or a board member can explain or help you complete the proxy form. Cite the name and address of the individual you're appointing to cast your vote. Then list your name, address and telephone number, and sign and date the form in the spaces provided.

The association can only accept one proxy form per Unit or Lot, so be sure to fill out your form accurately. By only accepting one official form, the association doesn't need to check each proxy to determine if it's legally sufficient. It also eliminates any potential problems if the vote is close.

Just be aware that by assigning your proxy to another person, you've authorized the proxy holder to vote for you as he or she sees fit on any General Proxy questions. You are required to direct your Proxy Holder how to vote on all Limited Proxy questions.

If you aren't sure if you will be able to attend the Annual Meeting, it is a good idea to complete and return your Proxy so your vote will be counted.




The park is looking especially nice with the new replacement plantings, weeding, and trimming that have been accomplished. Hope you enjoy the views!

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

8 oz. cream cheese


1/4 C. Mayonnaise

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
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
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
