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


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
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
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From the Executive Board

ur Second phase of the water project will begin soon where they will be removing and replacing water mains from service to include pipe removal where applicable. Our Maintenance team are working on completing Phase One service lines to all the units. We estimate that portion of the project to be completed in mid-May.

I am receiving several complaints about animals running free throughout the property. If you have a <u>DOG</u>, it must always be on a leash and not permitted to run free or unattended. The resident is responsible for cleaning up the waste and properly disposing of it.

If you should have a <u>CAT</u> and it's outside <u>IT MUST BE ON A LEASH</u>. Please do not let it out to roam, since the same rules apply for both. If these animals continue to run free, we will be forced to call animal control and they will be picked up.

With our hotter days coming fast, we want to remind those using the pools, please make sure that you and your guests always have the appropriate badges with you. Since the weekends are the most active,

I am asking if you wouldn't mind helping me out by being more observant of uninvited people trying to use our facilities. All it takes is nicely approaching someone that might not have a badge and asking if they are staying here as a guest, or maybe they are just a new resident not aware of our rules.

We also don't want to hold the gate open for those without badges or give out our security codes when they are unsuccessful gaining entry.

Just an F.Y.I.... all mobile homes must have a visible sticker on the front windows. Failure to do so could cause you to be fined if an inspector should check our property, which they check periodically. So, if you should have changed out your windows, or lost them, they can be purchased at the Motor Vehicle Department for \$ 3.50, which is much cheaper than what a fine will cost.

For those of you that might be a new owner, or maybe you just need an updated 2019 sticker we have Clearwater Cascade Identification Badges. These badges are made here in the office for all our residents to wear at the pool or at a community function. Please let us know when you can pop in to the office for a quick picture and then once we have eight of them to fill a whole page, we then make your badge and give you a call when they are ready for pick up.

Otherwise, there are still some plants to be removed from the fountain area, and this will be completed in the not-too-distant future.

algae was removed, new stones added where the water reservoir bladder was exposed, large boulders

that were loose were made to be secure again, cables re-covered, and the filter was cleaned of debris. All-in-all, the fountain looks beautiful again and is proudly welcoming everyone "Home" again. Thanks, Jeff!

As I am speaking about the fountain, I would like to remind all of the residents and their guests that they are NOT permitted to climb or walk anywhere on the fountain! The "Keep Off





Fountain" signs have been placed back in the area as a safety precaution. Only Beautification Committee personnel are allowed on the fountain! Please understand that we cannot take a chance on anyone being injured by falling on it, and we also do not want damage from people climbing and/or playing on it. This also means not picking up the stones and throwing them into other locations – these stones are strategically placed on the fountain. This is part of our "Welcome Home" – please help us keep it nice!

Work on the rest of the park will continue – as needed, plants will be replaced, weeds pulled, watering at the pools (I still need volunteers to help with this one), and fertilizing. If you can help with watering the plants at one or both of the pools, please let either myself or Sherri Bourque know. Also, if you have an idea of something you would like to see done in the park, please let us know about that too.

Safety Committee

SAFETY FIRST

Tith spring weather firmly in charge, everyone is out enjoying the great outdoors by bicycle or on foot. To ensure everyone's safety, here are a few reminders about Park rules.

Pedestrians have the right-of-way when walking along and crossing the street. That being said, remember that motor vehicles have the right-of-weight. Mom and Dad were right when they said to always look both ways before crossing the street, don't assume that the drivers are looking out for you. And when crossing the street, cross it, don't wander across on a diagonal. If you walk after dark, carry a light. Lastly, walk on the left side of the street, facing traffic. If the driver of the vehicle coming at you doesn't see you, at least you can get out of the way.

Bicyclists in Florida are subject to the same rules as motor vehicles. Those rules include driving on the right side of the road, stopping at stop signs and yielding the right-of-way. Don't assume that motor vehicles will yield to you because if they don't, you lose. Once again, it's that right-of-weight thing. And make sure that your bicycles have proper lights, reflectors, etc. when riding after dark.

Drivers must be particularly alert in the park, as we have many bicyclists and pedestrians to look out for. Parking is also a consideration and there are a few rules to consider. Parking in the street is OK from 7:00 am to 11:00 pm; no overnight parking is permitted. At no time can a vehicle park within 30 feet of a corner. No vehicle may be parked in a carport or driveway so that any portion protrudes into the street or lawn. The speed limit in the Park is 15 miles per hour.

Let's all look out for each other, follow the rules and enjoy the nice weather!

Pool Rules

Summer is fast approaching and that brings a much higher volume of guests using the pools. When I say guests, I mean invited guests and uninvited guests. We have no way of knowing who is an invited guest unless they have a guest pass. Please remember that our rules state that guests must have a guest pass. As residents, we are responsible for ensuring that our guests follow the rules and that means, we report to the office, register the guest and get them a guest pass. So, register your guests, don't give out the pool code and don't "let someone in" that doesn't have a pass with them.

That way, we don't have to wonder if someone using the pool "belongs here".

Remember, when guests aren't registered, the guest won't receive a violation letter from the office, but the resident will! Just sayin'.

If you do see someone you suspect is an uninvited guest and they cannot produce a pass, call the office or park patrol. If necessary, call 911 or our Park designated officer, Officer Gatti at 727-244-1715 or 727-369-7864. Uninvited guests are trespassing and will be treated as such.

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
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

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

My Mother (Anna) Merrill Tait Allen **April 16, 1917**By Donna Allen Collins

Ty students at school would call my mother and me pioneers. In their eyes, they were certainly right about my mother at least. She was born in a small Saskatchewan farming community on April 16, 1917. Five years later found her living between Toronto, Ontario and the small farming town of Wroxeter, Ontario. She met my father in high school and they never looked back. She trained as a nurse, married my dad and after the war moved to the mining town



of Rouyn, Quebec, where Dad was the accountant. Given a choice of being transferred to Nicaragua or Canada's Land of the Midnight Sun, Yellowknife, NWT, won hands down. So, in 1947 Mom and I followed Dad to Giant Yellowknife Gold Mine. The life of being a pioneer began.

The two biggest pluses at the outset of this adventure were steam-heated homes (to survive the extreme winter temperatures) and indoor plumbing. The challenges- mosquitoes, no baked goods or dairy products, no fresh produce for nine months of the year, no communication with the "outside" except mail or telegrams, ravens taking the clothes pegs and dropping the washing onto the rocks and muskeg and numerous other situations. Now these things were more of an issue to my mother. As a small child and later an adolescent, they were no problem at all, just a matter of the way life was.

As time passed my mother found baking bread weekly was actually relaxing. Making milk from powder wasn't such a big deal and opening cans to pepare meals was a creative opportunity. In the summer months fish was a staple as it was plentiful. Cooked over a campfire after a day's work and a boat trip "up river" was the norm along with the ever-present brown beans. Berries of all kinds were available and since we kids ate more than we brought home our moms took responsibility for the task. Market gardens were to be found in the few places where soil had accumulated between the rocks. Cabbages, carrots, and onions grew extremely large with the long days.

In addition to the daily chores of looking after the needs of the family, mom had to deal with the situations that arose with us kids. In the summer these issues ranged from scrapes, cuts, bug bites, splinters from the pipe boxes, frog eggs that we collected, getting in the way of the workers at the docks, eating vegetables from the neighbours' gardens to name a few. In the winter the biggest problems we caused her was dealing with frostbite and the bumps that came from colliding with the rocks while sliding down the hills in cardboard boxes.

As the years passed and the amenities improved, she will tell you that these were among the best years of her life. The great-grandchildren love to hear her stories and I hope she is around for a while yet to tell them.









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And now as an added treat....a couple of family recipes!

Saskatoon Rhubarb Pie

Ingredients

Filling

- 4 cups Saskatoon berries
- 2 cups rhubard (fresh or frozen), chopped
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- ¼ cup all-purpose flour (add 1 Tbsp extra flour if using frozen fruit)

Crust

- 1 ½ cups all-purpose flour
- ½ cup whole-wheat flour
- ½ tsp salt
- 1/3 cup butter, chilled

- 1/3 cup shortening
- 1 small egg
- ½ tsp white vinegar
- Cold water

<u>Directions</u> Filling

1. Filling: In a large bowl, combine all of the ingredients. Set aside until ready to use.

Crust

- 1. Crust: Preheat oven to 350°F.
- 2. In a large bowl, combine flours and salt. Using a pastry cutter or two knives, cut in butter until mixture resembles small peas.
- 3. Add shortening and stir until chunks of shortening are dispersed throughout. Set aside.
- 4. In a liquid measuring cup, combine egg and vinegar. Fill measuring cup with cold water until it reaches the 1/2-cup mark. Whisk to combine.
- 5. Add the wet ingredients to the dry ingredients and, using a pastry cutter, work as little as possible just to combine. Divide mixture in half and form two equal balls (Don't overwork the pastry.)
- 6. On a flour-dusted work surface, roll out one portion of dough into a circle 11 inches in diameter.
- 7. Roll out remaining dough into a 10-inch circle. Using a sharp knife, cut some artistic air vents in centre.
- 8. Pour prepared filling into bottom pie shell. Top with second crust. Trim overhanging dough and crimp edges to seal.
- 9. Bake in preheated oven for 10 minutes. Reduce heat to 300°F and bake for another 45 to 60 minutes, until filling is thick and bubbly in the middle and crust is golden brown.



Ingredients

- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 Tbsp baking powder
- 1 tsp sugar
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/4 cup canola or other mild vegetable oil
- 1 cup water
- lard or additional canola oil, for cooking

Directions

In a large bowl, combine the flour, baking powder, sugar and salt. Make a hollow in the mixture and pour in the oil and water, and mix until a dough is formed. Knead until it's soft and only slightly sticky. Let it sit for about ten minutes, and then roll it out onto a lightly floured baking sheet, pierce the top with a fork in several places and bake at 350F for 20-25 minutes, or until golden brown.

Alternatively, wind the dough onto the end of a stick to cook over an open fire. To make fry bread, pull off pieces a little larger than a golf ball, pat into a circle and poke a hole in the middle. Cook in lard or oil in a heavy skillet set over medium-high heat until golden on both sides.

Tear open and slather with jam, or dunk in soup or chili or stew.

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




