

You can always go at your own pace. You can sit one or more out and then get up and go again. It's also fun to watch while you catch your breath. If you like synchronized dancing, this is for you!




The Neighborhood Watch consists of the participation of EVERY resident in our park who wants to feel protected and take a part in making Crystal Lake a safer place to live.

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There are many ways in which you can help. As for now, we provide you a partial list of things you can do:

- Be a Watch Captain Collect information from patrols in your designated area, remind people in your area about meetings and encourage them to attend.
- Be a **Street-Patroller** make a note of anything you see that seems suspicious on your daily walks such as unidentified vehicles (We're looking into getting decals for authorized cars), people walking or biking through looking into carports or walking between houses, etc.
- Be a **Window Watcher** Be more observant and take a minute or two to make a note of anything you see on your street that just doesn't look right. Save this information for your Watch Captain to deliver to the Coordinator for record-keeping or necessary action.

So you see there's something for everyone to do to have a part in keeping our park safer and always remember: If you see something suspicious, pick up the phone and call the Pinellas Park Police Department at (727) 541-0758.

KEEPING OUR RESIDENTS SAFE

You can see Vickie and Corky riding their cart and Richie walking through the park at any given time of the day or night watching out for our safety. SOME FACTS ABOUT NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH

- Over 40 million crimes are committed every year and the number is still growing.
- There can't be a law enforcement officer on every corner, so citizen involvement is essential to combat this social crisis.
- By cooperating with each other and the police, people can help fight crime in their community the most effective way - before it begins!
- Neighborhood Watch is a crime prevention program that enlists the active participation of residents in cooperation with law enforcement to reduce crime in their communities. It involves:
- Neighbors getting to know each other and working together in a program of mutual assistance;
- Citizens being trained to recognize and report suspicious activities in their neighborhoods; and
- Implementation of crime prevention techniques such as home security, Operation Identification, etc.

You may hear it called NEIGHBORHOO WATCH, Home Alert, Citizen Crime Watch or Block Watch - The idea is the same:

NEIGHBORS LOOKING OUT FOR EACH OTHER!



STREET LIGHT OUT

If you know of a streetlight that is our or not working properly, you can call Duke Energy at (727) 443-2641 with the number on the pole and a nearby address. We need to keep our streets well lighted and safe. You can also use the Duke Energy website to make the report.

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH SPECIAL NOTE

This is a special orientation provided to all of the residents of Cristal Lake to better understand what Neighborhood Watch is and what to do when you see a real crime in progress. As specified in several articles in prior and present issues of the COURIER, Neighborhood Watch consists on the participation of EVERYONE in the park that wants to take action in the prevention of crime.

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CRIME occurs when someone breaks the law by an overt act, omission or neglect that can result in punishment. A person who has violated a law, or has breached a rule, is said to have committed a CRIMINAL OFFENSE.

There are two main categories of crime: PROPERTY CRIME and VIOLENT CRIME:

- Property Crimes: A property crime is committed when someone damages, destroys or steals someone else's property, such as stealing a car or vandalizing a building. Property crimes are by far the most commonly committed crime in the United States.
- Violent Crimes: A violent crime occurs when someone harms, attempts to harm, threatens to harm or even conspires to harm someone else. Violent crimes are offenses which involve force or threat of force, such as rape, robbery or homicide.

Some crimes can be both property crimes and violent at the same time, for example carjacking someone's vehicle at gunpoint or robbing a convenience store with a handgun

Due to space, we are not able to explain more about the crime, but at this point; we would like to give you some tips on what to do when a crime is in progress:

- 1. Call the Police. When it's a REAL EMERGENCY, dial 911; but if you need the police in a non-emergency situation, then call the Pinellas Park Police Department at (727) 541-0758 (any time) and be ready to answer all the questions they will ask you.
- 2. Please, have handy all the details about the suspicious activity or crime in progress. Be ready to describe the person, give description of a car including license plate and give other important details such as location and more. The more accurate you are, the faster the police can help.
- 3. After doing this, call your Neighborhood Watch Team. In CRYSTAL LAKE, you can call Vickie/Corky and/or Richie. Their phone numbers are on Page 2 of this edition of the COU-RIER. REMEMBER: Call the Police first; then call NHW.
- 4. Don't expect us to act as Police Officers. We are the "eyes and ear" of the Police Department but are limited to some functions. And the most we can do in most cases is to call the Police. That's why we urge you to call the Police first; the faster they come, the better you will be served and/or the crime is prevented.
- 5. ANIMAL CONTROL: As Neighborhood Watch, we are limited to certain responsibilities. They do not include control of animals or making a call in favor of the residents. They are responsible for calling the corresponding agencies in these circumstances and to investigate the necessary fee to pay.

As you could see, there is a lot of responsibilities that all residents in our park are able to do to

I've always said that the best tool to prevent or resolve conflicts is the question. Nothing is like asking to find out the actual causes of a problem. RECIPES:

EASY KEY LIME PIE

Can decorate with a slice of lime or if using the chocolate pie crust you can put some shaved chocolate on top too. Cover and put in refrigerator with plastic wrap if possible; but not really necessary. For extended time it will keep it from drying out. ENJOY!

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CINNAMON BREAKFAST CAKE

Indredients

- 2 cups flour
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup seedless raisins
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 4 tablespoons brown sugar
- 4 tablespoons shortening
- 1 egg, well beaten
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 tablespoon butter, melted

Instructions

Sift flour, measure, and sift with baking powder, and salt. Add brown sugar; cut in shortening with 2 spatulas. Add egg and sufficient milk to form a soft dough. Add raisins. Spread in well-oiled and floured cake pan.

Pour melted butter over top of cake. Sprinkle with 2 tablespoons sugar and cinnamon.

Bake in hot oven (400°F) 20-25 minutes.




Patience is important to achieving success, as novelist José Saramago learned during a long life spent doing things other than writing. Saramago was the son of a Portuguese peasant father and an illiterate mother. He was brought up in a home with no books, stopped his formal schooling at age 12, and took 40 years to go from metalworker to civil servant to editor in a publishing house to newspaper editor.

Despite all his early challenges, Saramago wrote his first novel when he was 25. It was published but went unnoticed. A second novel he submitted to a publisher never came back. So he decided to stop writing, saying, "I think I reached the conclusion that I had nothing important to say."

Saramago went 20 years without publishing another word. Then in 1977, he began writing again. His fourth published novel brought him international acclaim, and in 1998 he became the first Portuguese-language writer to win the Nobel Prize for literature.
