


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
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improvements and amenities; there are also things that we can do to show them that we deserve what we ask for by doing our part at our own home sites. Clean them up!

He reminded us that past Management had stopped all of our activities because of the many complaints and issues brought to her office by a few unhappy residents. Cliff added that due to these same issues, turnout to our activities and events had become very low which depleted money from our budget and was, in general, hurting the morale of the majority of our residents. All of us suffered! He added that many of these issues have consequently been resolved and that with the help of his Board, will continue to move forward in a positive direction.

Cliff continues to speak with Management (when possible) on behalf of ALL home owners about the condition of the roads and other community concerns and problems. Some issues have been taken care of but many have not yet been resolved. He promises he will continue working for the betterment of the park.

Cliff stated that one key to the success of having a happy and peaceful park is RESPECT for each other. We don't have to agree about everything somebody says but we don't have to fight about it either. We don't need to bully people and have gossip sessions and whisper about others. Life is too short for that. We can accomplish so much more with understanding and RESPECT.

He added that his plan is to continue the good work that has been started. He would like for everyone to get involved in their community in such a way that will benefit all of the community. 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EVENTS IN MAY

■ FACTS

May is the fifth month of the year in the Julian and Gregorian Calendars and one of seven months with the length of 31 days.

May is a month of Autumn in the Southern Hemisphere and spring in the Northern Hemisphere (Summer in Europe). Therefore May in the Southern Hemisphere is the seasonal equivalent of November in the Northern Hemisphere and vice versa. No other month begins or ends on the same day of the week as May in any year. This month is the only month to have these two properties. However, May like all other months does share starting and ending days with various months of both previous and following years: every year, May starts and ends on the same day of the week as January of the following year.

Additionally, in years immediately before common years, May starts and ends on the same day of the week as October of the following year; it also ends on the same day of the week as February of the following year. In years immediately before leap years, May starts on the same day of the week as April of the following year; it also both starts and ends on the same day of the week as July of the following year.

In a common year, May both starts and ends on the same day of the week as August of the previous year; it also ends on the same day of the week as November of the previous year. In a leap year, May both starts and ends on the same day of the week as March of the previous year; it also starts on the same day of the week as November and ends on the same day of the week as June, both of the previous year. In a leap and a year immediately after that, May starts on the same day of the week as February of the previous year.

■ SYMBOLS

Its birth flower is the Lily of the Valley and the Crataegus monogyna. It is native through the cool temperature Northern Hemisphere in Asia, Europe, and in the southern Appalachian Mountains in the United States, but has been naturalized throughout the temperature climatic world.

- Its birthstone is the emerald which is emblematic of love and success.
- The zodiac signs for the month of May are Taurus (until May 20) and Gemini (May 21 onwards).
- The "mayflower" Epigaea repens is a North American harbinger of May, and the floral emblem of both Nova Scotia and Massachusetts. Its native range extends from Newfoundland south to Florida, west to Kentucky in the southern range, and to Northwest Territories in the north

SAFETY TIPS

Here are safety tips to keep in mind for your vehicle:

- ✓ Never leave any items or valuables in plain sight in your vehicle. Always lock packages, purses, electronic equipment and other items in the trunk.
- ✓ Always turn off your engine, roll up the windows, lock the doors and take your keys, even if you are just making a quick stop.
- ✓ Don't leave spare keys in your vehicle. An experienced thief knows all the hiding places; Store spare keys in your wallet.
- ✓ Park in well-lighted, visible areas near your destination. Avoid parking close to trucks and other objects that obstruct visibility and provide hiding places.
- ✓ Check your vehicle if you hear the alarm sound, but don't try to stop a person attempting to break in. Get a good description of the person and call the police.
 - ✓ Chain bicycles to stationary objects when unattended.

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
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CARDS AND GAMES

DO YOU NEED A RIDE?

► <u>EZride Program</u> – this is a <u>fee for service</u> transportation program offered by Neighborly Care network. The program serves Pinellas county residents aged 55 and older, and disabled residents.

EZride service is offered for ANY trip purpose in Pinellas County with destinations that also include southern Pasco, as well as specific destinations in northern Hillsborough, such as H. Lee Moffitt Cancer center, the VA Hospital/Medical Clinic and the University of South Florida Medical clinics at a flat rate fee

EZride requires an annual membership fee of just \$25, which can be given as a gift. The cost of each trip is based on a \$3.00 pickup fee plus a charge of \$1.50 per mile for each one-way trip. You can visit the website at www.Neighborly.org or call 727-571-4384. Not too bad for a quick trip to the Dr. or the Grocery store or pharmacy.

► <u>Neighborly Care Network Senior Services Transportation Program</u> is the second option.

This is a door to door service, pick up and drop off for medical appointments. At this time there is NO FEE for adults who are 60 or older or transportation disadvantaged and <u>not on Medicaid</u>

Medical trips must be within 10 mile radius from pick-up. Vehicles are wheelchair accessible. Clients must register by phone before service begins.

DECISIONS ... HOW TO MAKE THE BEST!

ou wake up in the morning and it's inevitable that a series of questions go through your mind: What do I eat for breakfast? What clothes should I wear? What shall I do today? The answer to these questions depends on something very important in the life of every human being: "Decisions". Some are very relevant, and others are simple everyday questions. But the decisions that often really worry us are those that can most affect our environment significantly. These are the decisions that often make us stop to think how much we are willing to risk if we are wrong in that decision.

But, how do we know which the right decisions are if we are not a prophet and don't know the future? While the future is unpredictable, every decision involves some level of risk. By evaluating the risks, it helps to see if our course of action is reasonable. Although we are not psychic there are some important elements to consider and evaluate when making important decisions, and today I share them with you.

- Avoid getting obsessed with right or wrong decisions. There are decisions that seem wrong but can bring good results, while those that seem perfect won't work. The important thing is to assume any result by finding ways to learn from the acquired experience.
- If you are in doubt, it is not the time to decide. Wait to feel safer in the decision by exploring alternatives and possible consequences.
- Zero self-deception. Sometimes we tend to find reasons that endorse our ideas and reject the reasons that question them. We do worse when we surround ourselves with people who think like us. It never hurts to evaluate issues with people who see things differently as it can help us evaluate things that were not seen before.



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
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- Avoid impulses. Usually decisions that are made lightly without reflection nor analyzing the consequences, lead us to repentance. Rarely luck is involved.
- Do not rely so much on others. By letting go of everything, making decisions in accordance with the opinions or wishes of others only pleases the aspirations of others and not you. In the end you will always feel dissatisfied.
- On the other hand, don't be too independent. Listening to others never hurts because it will help you explore and balance options and risks.
- Be rational, seek information, analyze, explore and prepare to take the risk that involves the decision made.
- Avoid harming others with your decisions. Sooner or later selfishness takes its toll with negative results.
- Follow your values, remembering that you are a product of your conscience and what you do to improve as a person. There is nothing like a tranquil conscience to feel peace whichever be the final result.

CINCO DE MAYO

Success in your decisions!

inco de Mayo is annually observed on May 5. It celebrates the defeat of the French army during the Battle of Puebla (Batalla de Puebla) in Mexico on May 5, 1862. It is not to be confused with Mexico's Independence Day.

Cinco de Mayo is a day of Mexican pride and heritage.

Cinco de Mayo is seen as a day to celebrate the culture, achievements and experiences of people with a Mexican background, who live in the United States. There is a large commercial element to the day, with businesses promoting Mexican services and goods, particularly food, drinks and music. Other aspects of the day center around traditional symbols of Mexican life, such as the Virgin de Guadalupe, and Mexican-Americans who have achieved fame, fortune and influence in the United States

One of the largest Cinco de Mayo celebrations are in cities such as Los Angeles, San Jose, San Francisco, San Antonio, Sacramento, Phoenix, Albuquerque, Denver and El Paso in the USA's south-western regions. In these cities, a large proportion of the population has Mexican origins. Many people hang up banners and school districts organize lessons and special events to educate their pupils about the culture of Americans of Mexican descent. In some areas, particularly in Pubelo de Los Angeles, celebrations of regional Mexican music and dancing are held.

Cinco de Mayo officially commemorates the anniversary of an early victory by Mexican forces over French forces in the Battle of Puebla on May 5, 1862. It is not the anniversary of the defeat and expulsion of the French forces by the Mexicans, which occurred in 1867. It is also not, as is often assumed, the day of Mexico's celebrations of independence, which are actually held on September 16. It is believed that the origins of Cinco de Mayo celebrations lie in the responses of Mexicans living in California in the 1860s to French rule in Mexico at that time.

RECIPES

Mexican Rice

Ingredients:

- 1 pound lean ground beef
- 1 onion, diced
- 1 green bell pepper, diced
- 1 (14 ounce) can beef broth
- 2 cups fresh corn kernels
- 1 (10 ounce) can diced tomatoes with
- green chile peppers
- 1 (15 ounce) can tomato sauce
 - 1/2 cup salsa
 - 1/2 teaspoon chili powder
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1 teaspoon minced cilantro
- 1 1/2 cups uncooked white rice
- 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese

Directions:

- 1. In a medium stock pot, brown the ground beef over medium heat. Drain any fat. Add onion and green pepper. Cook until onion is tender.
 - 2. Stir in the beef broth, corn, tomatoes with green chile peppers and tomato sauce. Add salsa, chili powder, paprika, garlic powder, salt, pepper and cilantro. Mix thoroughly. Bring to a boil and stir in rice.
 - 3. Cover and cook until rice is done, about 25 minutes.
 - 4. Sprinkle Cheddar cheese over the mixture and continue cooking 10 minutes, or until cheese is melted.





Ingredients:

- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 2 tablespoons canola oil
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 2 pounds beef stew meat, cut into 1-inch cubes
- 2 cups water
- 1 can (14-1/2 ounces) stewed tomatoes
- 1 can (10 ounces) diced tomatoes with green chilies, un-drained
- 1 can (10-3/4 ounces) condensed tomato soup, undiluted
- 1 can (10-1/2 ounces) beef broth
- 1 can (10-1/2 ounces) chicken broth
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1 teaspoon chili powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon lemon-pepper seasoning
- 1/2 teaspoon hot pepper sauce
- 10 corn tortillas (6 inches)
- Shredded cheddar cheese, sour cream and sliced green onions, optional

Directions:

- 1. In a Dutch oven, sauté onion in oil until tender. Add garlic; cook 1 minute longer. Stir in the next 13 ingredients; bring to a boil. Reduce heat; cover and simmer for 1-1/2 hours or until beef is tender.
- 2. Tear tortillas into bite-size pieces; add to soup. Simmer, uncovered, for 10 minutes; let stand for 5 minutes. Garnish individual servings with cheese, sour cream and onions if desired. Yield: 10 servings (2-1/2 quarts).

STOP CALLING ME!!!!

re you bothered by telemarketers or solicitors calling you? Here's the solution.

Pursuant to its authority under the Telephone Consumer Pro-

Pursuant to its authority under the Telephone Consumer Protection Act (TCPA), the FCC established, together with the Federal Trade Commission (FTC), a national Do-Not-Call Registry. The registry is nationwide in scope, applies to all telemarketers (with the exception of certain



non-profit organizations), and covers both interstate and intrastate telemarketing calls. Commercial telemarketers are not allowed to call you if your number is on the registry, subject to certain exceptions. As a result, consumers can, if they choose, reduce the number of unwanted phone calls to their homes.

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You can register your phone numbers for free, and they will remain on the list until you remove them or discontinue service – there is no need to re-register numbers.

The Do-Not-Call registry does not prevent all unwanted calls. It does not cover the following:

- ♦ calls from organizations with which you have established a business relationship;
- ♦ calls for which you have given prior written permission;
- ♦ calls which are not commercial or do not include unsolicited advertisements;
- ♦ calls by or on behalf of tax-exempt non-profit organizations.

Subscribers may register their residential telephone number, including wireless numbers, on the national Do-Not-Call registry by telephone or by Internet at no cost.

Consumers can register on-line for the national do-not-call registry by going to www. donotcall.gov. To register by telephone, consumers may call 1-888-382-1222: for TTY call 1-866-290-4236. You must call from the phone number you wish to register.
