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
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FROM THE OFFICE

his month I am going to discuss the letters that were sent out due to the Embassy Park inspection conducted by Largo Community Development. First off, it was only done in the Largo portion of the Park, which is 6th street west. (I will be doing the Unincorporated part of the Park soon).

As a result of this inspection, I sent out almost 100 letters to residents who were found to be in violation of the City regulations.

Here is a breakdown of them:

No Garbage cans are allowed if visible from the street; NO household furniture on the carport; NO tools, lawn mowers or ladders outside; The area between the shed and the mobile home must be free and clear (as in, not used for storage). Screen rooms must be neat inside, not being used as storage; the exterior of your mobile home must be clean, no mold showing; all cars need to have current license plates; ALL REFRIGERATORS ON THE CARPORT MUST BE LOCKED AT ALL TIMES and not visible from the street; No ripped screens or broken windows; carports must be clear of all DEBRIS.

Here is the cities definition of debris-Debris means material which is stored externally and is not otherwise covered and shall include, but not be limited to, the following: household items, inoperative machinery, automobiles or appliances, refuse, garbage, rubbish, trash or junk, used scrap or lumber, pipe, steel, aluminum or other nonferrous metals, plumbing fixtures, insulation and other building material, construction equipment, tanks, totes, cans, barrels, boxes, drums, piping, glass, old iron, plastic, cleared trees, removed tree stumps, inoperative boats or other inoperative recreational equipment (golf carts).

Most of this is already covered in our Park rules; this inspection was an eye opener for me, as I had never deemed the area between your shed and mobile as "outside" storage; also, I

had never checked screen rooms as long as they weren't piled full of boxes visible from the street. I also never realized how many ladders were laying or propped up on the outside of sheds—they must be stored inside.

Understand that this is not a one time thing, but must be maintained in this manner now and in the future.

AS Editor of the News & Views I would like to thank everyone for their articles, I even have a recipe for next month!

HOME OWNER'S ASSOCIATION

Embassy Park Home Owner's Association (or HOA). First of all, I would like to thank the retiring members of the Executive Board for their work over the past number of years to get us where we are today. The organization is in good shape, and I hope we can build on their work over the next couple years. Thank you Ron Russell and Terry Hazlett. I would like to welcome two new members to the Executive board-Debra Ranta and John Halliday. Together with the returning Executive members-Mary Ann Cassey, Elaine Pepper, Mike Matheny and Bob Whipple, we will do our best to represent you-the most important members of the HOA.

When I was considering accepting the position, Ron Russell, the previous President, told me "Don't worry, Al. There are people in the Park who are willing to help you -some will tell you where to go and others will tell you what you can do when you get there." I am not really sure what he meant by that. In any case, over the next two years, I look forward to working with the others on the Executive Board, with Park Management, with the owner Mr. Larson, and with all the residents to make Embassy MHP a place where we all love to call home.

I have asked a few people what they thought was the role of the HOA here at Embassy. The responses varied, from settling an argument with a neighbor to getting more amenities within the Part to ensuring there are no more rent increases. So maybe it is time to clarify the purpose of the HOA as outlined in our Constitution. Article 2 of our Constitution says the purpose of the Embassy HOA "is to maintain an organization of mobile homeowners for the purpose of exercising all rights under Chapter 723 of the Florida Statutes. It shall act for the benefit of it's members in establishing and maintaining good relations with the owners

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and operators of Embassy Mobile Home Park. With the consent of the majority of the members, it may negotiate for and acquire the mobile home park on behalf of the mobile homeowners." What does this mean for us as mobile homeowners? It means that Chapter 723 gives specific legal rights to both the Park owner and the mobile homeowner, and more specific rights to members of a HOA. For example, it means that because we have a HOA,

Mr. Larson is legally bound to meet with members of our HOA Rent Committee to explain the rationale behind any rent increase. Mr. Larson operates the Park as a business, and as such, is entitled to a reasonable rate of return on his investment. Our Rent Committee meets with Mr. Larson in September to review and discuss any proposed increase for the next year. It is no secret that our rents at Embassy are lower than the rents at two-thirds of the other MHP'S in Pinellas County. Without the HOA Rent Committee, we could reasonably expect higher rents that what we are currently paying.

On a daily basis, it means that the HOA will work with Park management and owner on issues that affect all the residents of the Park. For Example, one issue brought up by the Neighborhood Watch program (and others) is that there are too many vehicles speeding on some streets within the Park. We have seen vehicles travelling 30-40 mph or more through the Park. Safety of all our residents affects all of us. This is one issue we will discuss with Management to reach a mutually satisfactory outcome. Having an active HOA means that if you see an issue that you think effects the residents of the Park as a whole, bring it to the attention of one of the Executive Board. (Contact info is posted on the HOA bulletin board in the Clubhouse and on the inside back page of the News & Views). The Executive Board would like all residents to become involved with the HOA. Membership is free (some other parks charge a membership fee). There are two mandated meetings per year — one in December and one in January — but other meetings may be called if a need arises. Each of us on the Executive Board are homeowners too, but we need input from you to understand your concerns. Please feel free to bring them up with any of us at any time. We are committed to working together with you, with Management, and with Mr. Larson to make this Park a nice place to live. We look forward to hearing from you!

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

MY HOME TOWN



hata fun tournament. Thanks to a great Organizer and Director Ron McDougall Participants included all league players and those that just come out to fun shuffle. The tournament lasted two days on Feb. 3rd and 4th. The format was new this year. All participants got to play 5 games. The first day (Feb. 3rd) doubles played. Two divisions.



'A' and 'B' with 44 participants. In the 'A' division an individual with a low average or no average (fun shuffler) would randomly pick a name and that person would be their partner for the 5 games, then they would randomly pick a court assignment for the Lake court for their 1st game, then would pick another court assignment after each game. 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HISTORIC TIES TO EMBASSY

he year just past, 2019, was the anniversary of two very significant historical events, one in Canada, and the other in the United States.

1. The Canadian event, 60 years ago 2019, in 1959, was the cancellation of the Avro Arrow interceptor jet that Canada had well along in it's development. "The hypersonic fighter was on the cutting edge of aerospace technology at the time: it could reach a speed nearly three times the speed of sound, travelling at an altitude of 60,000 feet... "Global News.

In fact there were many who believed the Arrow was by far the best plane of it's time.

2. The other significant event, but 50 years ago 2019, in 1969, was the landing of the first man on the moon, the Apollo program run by NASA.

"That's one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind' ... Neil Armstrong

I only became aware of the significance of 2019 during a newscast last summer that mentioned the anniversaries, and it so happens that I met a man, through contacts here at Embassy, who was closely involved with both of those events.

Dr. Lloyd Thompson was the brother-in-law of former Embassy resident Betty Pickles, and the uncle of one of our present residents, JoAnn Curran. It was through Betty Pickles that I met Dr. Thompson.

Dr. Thompson was working on the Avro Arrow project in 1959 when it was cancelled, and he was laid off and lost his job. "It's a day that would soon become known as "Black Friday". At 11:00 a.m. on Feb. 20, 1959, Prime Minister Diefenbaker stands before the House of Commons



and makes the unexpected announcement that the Arrow and Iroquois engine programs are terminated immediately. Members of Parliament greet the announcement with stunned silence...." CBC

However, John F. Kennedy was elected President in 1960 and he decided that America should embark on the moon landing project.

"John F. Kennedy will no doubt be remembered as the U.S. leader who in 1961 asked the country to commit to sending Americans to the moon "before this decade is out."

And soon after that a number of the laid off

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Avro Arrow engineers, technicians and scientists were hired by NASA to help out in the moon landing program, and one of those hired on was Dr. Lloyd Thompson.

And with Dr. Thompson's help, along with thousands of others, a manned moon landing occurred—"On July 20, 1969, American Astronaut Neil Armstrong stepped off the lunar landing module Eagle, and became the first human to walk on the surface of the moon."

JoAnn told me a little about her uncle, it seemed he was a bit stand-offish for a good part of his life but later on he had a transforming experience, and change of heart and became eager to talk about his experiences. Another former resident of Embassy, Herb Gardzilla and myself met with him at Betty Pickles' place and he gave us quite an account of his experiences.

I just found it intriguing that a man with ties to Embassy Park had taken part in two quite historic events.



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
