n August my family and I visited The Greenbrier resort in White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia. It is a beautiful hotel with pools, a casino, stores and four golf courses. But, for 30 years, the Greenbrier housed a big secret. It was the location for "The Bunker", a US Government Relocation Facility designed to accommodate the US Senate and House of Representatives in the event of a national emergency. It was built by the Eisenhower Administration between 1958 and 1961. It is buried 720 feet into the hillside under a wing of the hotel. It is surrounded by ceiling and walls that are three to five feet thick reinforced concrete. Included in the facility are 44 separate locations with 153 rooms making up a total of 112,544 feet on two levels. The secret of the location was maintained for more than 30 years until May of 1992, when The Washington Post published a story effectively exposing it. We had a tour of the first floor of the bunker and was amazed at the detail and planning. The bedrooms were dormitory style with bunk-beds. Can you imagine the Democrats and Republicans having to live together? The guide told us that one tunnel was lined with nonperishable foods. Fresh fruits, vegetables, and meats were delivered every 5 days for 30 years, just in case the bunker was needed. Can you imagine? I asked what happened to the fresh foods, and when not used it went to the Greenbrier for the employee cafeteria. At least it didn't go to waste! Our tax dollar at work! The Bunker was never used, and after exposed was now open for tours. A new "Bunker" has been created, but no one knows where it is. Probably around Washington D.C. We had a great day, and it is worth the visit. If you go, plan to stay at the Greenbrier. It is expensive, but it is the most beautiful hotel I have ever visited.

Help for Severe Aortic Stenosis



Severe aortic stenosis is a narrowed aortic heart valve that doesn't open and close properly, reducing blood flow to the rest of the body.

Morton Plant Hospital is now enrolling eligible patients in the Medtronic Evolut R low-risk trial, which investigates the safety and effectiveness of a transcatheter aortic valve replacement (TAVR) system in patients with severe aortic stenosis who are at a low surgical mortality risk. TAVR is a minimally invasive alternative to open-heart surgery used to treat failing aortic heart valves in patients with severe aortic stenosis. Morton Plant Hospital was chosen as the first hospital in Tampa Bay to offer the TAVR procedure for patients with severe aortic stenosis who were at an intermediate or high surgical mortality risk. Our team has completed more than 700 TAVR procedures over the last five years.

One minute a day may lead to stronger bones

eeping your bones in good shape is vital to your health as you grow older, especially for women. Research reported on the Medical News Today website suggests that women may be able to keep their bones strong by running just one minute a day.

Examining data from more than 2,500 women, researchers found that women who participated in high-intensity, weight-bearing physical activity like running 60-120 seconds a day had 4 percent better bone health than women who took part in less than a minute of physical activity. Women who performed more than two minutes of exercise had 6 percent better bone health.

The researchers cautioned, though, that they can't be sure whether highintensity exercise leads to better bone health, or whether people with better bone health tend to exercise more.

New findings about the solar system intrigue scientists

ur solar system is full of interesting places—maybe not to live or even visit, but locations where life might flourish under the right conditions, or may once have been present. Two recent examples from the Science News website:

• Life on Titan? Scientists have discovered that the atmosphere of Saturn's moon Titan contains vinyl cyanide—a molecule that forms membrane-like structures and could support life. Computer simulations suggest the molecule is capable of forming flexible bubbles known as azotosomes, that could serve as an outer shell "protecting" genetic material from biochemical reactions in the moon's frigid methane seas. No one knows whether azotosomes actually exist on Titan, though. A probe would have to check out the seas to detect them.

• Water on Venus? With a surface temperature of 460 degrees, Venus is too hot to support water or life as we know it, but scientists speculate it might not always have been so inhospitable. The second planet's slow rotation—116 Earth days for a single Venusian day—might have led to a gradual cloud buildup in its atmosphere some 750 million years ago, bringing surface temperatures down to approximately 15 degrees Celsius—enough for the formation of a shallow ocean. What happened to the oceans, or whether they even existed, isn't clear. Scientists speculate they may have boiled away or been absorbed into the planet's interior.



Relax with a nice warm bath


hat's more relaxing than a long hot bath? Jacuzzi Luxury Bath commissioned a survey to explore Americans' bathing habits, and found that 38 percent of us take baths at least once a week. Frequent bathers take an average of 3.3 baths weekly for an average of 28 minutes. Among other results:

• **Timing**. The most popular times for taking a bath are weekend evenings and Monday mornings.

• **Demographics**. Bathing breaks down 50-50 between men and women. Younger people are more likely to be frequent bathers: 48 percent of people 25-44 said they bathe on a regular basis.

• **Benefits**. Women tend to take baths because it helps them relax, while men feel baths lead to better mental acuity. Bathers 18-44 said baths make them feel more alert.

• Exercise. Baths are popular for relieving soreness and fatigue caused by exercise. Forty-three percent of runner or joggers take a bath to recover after their workout, along with 34 percent who take exercise classes and 33 percent of weightlifters, followed by basketball players, bikers, and swimmers.

Driverless cars coming to a street near you?

Drivers can't wait for self-driving cars, according to a survey by Bosch Mobility Solutions. Out of 1,000 U.S.-based new car buyers 18 years or older, 52 percent said they expect to own a self-driving vehicle within the next 10 years. Only 14 percent said they'd never buy a self-driving car, and 14 percent were undecided.

Although 72 percent of survey participants signaled worries about lack of control in a vehicle they don't drive themselves, 61 percent said they believe self-driving cars could lead to a decrease in traffic accidents, and 55 percent highlighted more free time and less stress as a benefit to driverless cars.

Why kids stay home longer

t's not just a stereotype: More and more young Americans are living with their parents, the U.S. Census Bureau reports. According to a recent study, one in three Americans age 18-34 were living in their parents' home in 2015—some 24 million people. In 1975, the figure was closer to one in five.

One reason: Young people are delaying marriage longer than their older counterparts did. Eighty percent of Americans were married by age 30 in 1975, but nowadays that 80 percent figure isn't reached until age 45.

Younger Americans are also dealing with high student loan debt, which makes staying at home a convenient way for them to pay bills and save to rent an apartment or buy a house.

Coffee + nap = more energy

ant to take a nap that will leave you refreshed and ready to go again? Try drinking a cup of coffee first.

It sounds counterintuitive, but that's the advice from the Health.com website. The reason why it works: The caffeine in a cup of coffee takes about 30 minutes to kick in. After a 30-minute nap, you'll wake up just as the caffeine takes effect.



Research backs the idea up. In 1997 the journal Psychophysiology reported that sleepy adults who drank 200 mg of caffeine (twice the amount in 8 ounces of brewed coffee) and then took a short nap performed better on a simulated driving test than people who got only the caffeine.

Keep your naps short—15-30 minutes—and take them at least six hours before your regular bedtime so the caffeine doesn't keep you up at night. If you're sensitive to caffeine, try green tea instead.
