Kids Stealing Cars

e're Zack Sampson and Lisa Gartner, reporters for the Tampa Bay Times. We spent the last eight months delving into a crime wave that has swept Pinellas County: Kids stealing cars.

Yes, boys and girls as young as 10 are one of the biggest problems local police face right now. And we, the residents of sunny Tampa Bay, have a hand in it. In 98 percent of theft cases, the young thieves had access to our keys -- left in the cup holders or glove boxes of our unlocked cars.

In the newsroom, we were skeptical when frightened police officers called it an "epidemic" perpetrated by middle schoolers. But after reading thousands of pages of auto theft reports from the last couple of years, we can tell you it's not a joke.

At least once every four days, kids crash a stolen car. Dozens of people have been seriously hurt, including teenagers with bruised or punctured lungs and broken bones. A boy stole two cars and was arrested at gunpoint. In a report, officers listed his occupation as "third grade."

Children, who sometimes didn't even know how to turn on a car's headlights, accelerated to 120 miles per hour, careening the wrong way on the highway, just for a thrill. We talked to them. They called it joyriding.

One year ago, three teenage girls died when they drove a stolen car into a cemetery pond while fleeing

Pinellas deputies. The sheriff said then the situation was unacceptable, but the problem has continued into 2017.

It shows how dangerous car theft is, even though it's considered only a property crime, something that often lands young suspects in lockup for just a few hours or days. They get back out and steal another car, then another

Students and the Flat Tire

There were four seniors taking Microbiology and all of then had an 'A' so far. These four friends were so confident that the weekend before finals they decided to visit some friends in Butte and have a big party.

They had a great time, but after all the hearty partying, they slept all day Sunday and didn't make it back to Montana State University in Bozeman until early Monday morning.

Rather than taking the final then, they decided that after the final they would explain to their professor why they missed it. They said that they visited friends but on the way back they had a flat tire. As a result, they missed the final.

The next day Professor Olesnicki placed them in separate rooms and gave them a test booklet. They quickly answered the first problem worth 5 points. Cool, they thought! Each one, in a separate room, thought this was going to be easy...then they turned the page...

On the second page was written – for 95 points – which tire?

Don't need a will? Think again

oes everybody need a will? The straight answer is YES. That's true even for people who think they don't have a dime to leave to anyone. What if you were in an accident and died later of injuries, and your estate won a \$1 million settlement?

Who gets the money?

Admittedly, that's a little far out. You might get away without having a will if, say, you're a renter living on Social Security with no savings. If you have savings, a pay-on-death account will pass that money to named beneficiaries when you die.

But there are hitches to any no-will scheme, says attorney Patrick Lannon of Bilzin Sumberg in Miami. To begin with, a random financial asset almost always turns up. Examples might be a rental deposit that's returned or a medical reimbursement. Those checks will be made out to the deceased. How do your heirs get them cashed?

If you had a will, you'd have named an executor to cash checks, pay off creditors and distribute any money or property to your beneficiaries. Without one, your heirs will have to ask a court to appoint a personal administrator. Usually, it will appoint your surviving spouse or a child. But you risk a family fight over who should be in charge.

Some couples try to go will-free by putting everything into joint names. Joint assets pass to the other owner automatically. So do assets with beneficiary forms, such as individual retirement accounts. But something is inevitably left out - typically, a car, Lannon says. Heirs would need an administrator to transfer title.

Even if the joint-asset strategy works for the first death, what happens when the other spouse dies? He or she should make a will, which you both could have done from the start.

When there's no will, state law dictates who gets the house, car, savings and other assets.

Those laws vary widely. A surviving spouse might get everything in one state but only one-third in another state, with the rest going to your children. If you have no children, half might go to a spouse and half to your parents.

Lawyers are the best source for reliable wills. Your lawyer will also remind you that you need a durable power of attorney and a health care proxy, so someone can manage your finances and make medical choices if you're unable to do so yourself.

If you're allergic to lawyers, you can find free, state-specific will forms online. In most states (not all), handwritten wills are also accepted, provided that they were witnessed properly. DIY should be better than nothing. But be careful.








Did you know June is also...

Stay safe when working in the heat

When heat and humidity combine to reduce the amount of evaporation of sweat from the body, outdoor work can become dangerous even for those in good shape. The key rules for coping with heat are to drink plenty of water to avoid dehydration and slow down and cool off when experiencing fatigue, a headache, a high pulse rate, or shallow breathing. Overheating can cause serious, even life-threatening conditions such as heatstroke. Look out for these symptoms of heat illness:

ook in

• Heat cramps. Working in hot weather can lead to muscle cramps, especially in the legs, because of brief imbalances in body salts. Cramps become less frequent as a person becomes used to the heat.

• Heat syncope or fainting. Anyone not used to working in the heat can experience a quick drop in blood pressure that can lead to fainting. As with heat cramps, the best approach is to take it easy.

• Heat exhaustion. Losing fluid and salt through perspiration or replacing them in an imbalanced way can lead to dizziness and weakness. Body temperature might rise, but shouldn't exceed 102 degrees. The best defense is to take it easy and drink plenty of water. Don't take salt tablets without consulting a physician.

• Heatstroke. In some cases extreme heat can upset the body's thermostat, causing body temperature to rise to 105 degrees or higher. Symptoms are lethargy, confusion, and unconsciousness. • Get enough rest. Try not to start a trip late in the day. Long-distance driving is tough enough in the daytime. Be ready and awake.

• If possible, don't drive alone. Passengers can take turns driving, or at least help you stay awake if you need stimulation.

• Adjust your car's environment. Use your controls to keep you awake and alert. Keep the temperature cool, with open windows or air conditioning in the summer and frugal amounts of heat in the winter.


