Pets in the Park



TITS allows pets. Many MHP's do not. Let's not abuse this privilege. Your pet is your responsibility, not the Park's. By all means walk your

dog twice a day and make sure you have a doggie bag with you at all times. Use a grocery bag if the Park pet stations are out. Leashes are required. Don't let your cat run free- there is a population of feral cats here with possible diseases.

Please do not feed the feral cats. Their job is to hunt mice and lizards, not get a free lunch. Do your best to keep dog excrement off your neighbors' lawns. If your dog poops and you don't have a bag, go back and pick it up as soon as possible.

Be considerate of residents that don't own or understand pets.

Traffic Rules in IITS

ITS is private property and therefore our roads are not patrolled by City police. Nevertheless we have a 15 MPH speed limit. We have stop signs. In a community designed for people over 55, these are obviously for our own safety.

Some states allow bicycles to roll through controlled intersections. Florida laws treat bicycles as vehicles that must obey stop signs, and, for consistency, so does IITS.

Golf carts are subject to the same rules as cars.

Courtesy and law demands that we yield the right of way to pedestrians and bicycles. Remember, bicycles do not have engines or four wheel stability and pedestrians may be deaf or have vision problems.

Please report speeding vehicles to the Property Manager. If it was a FedEx, UPS or other commercial vehicle, please give her a good description.

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How long can Canadians stay in the US?

Per CBC News, Canada, 3/6/2017

Imost half of our neighbors are Canadian citizens who come South to enjoy the subtropical climate. Canadian snowbirds over 50 years old can generally stay in the USA for 120 days a year. Both US tax law and Canadian provincial health care regulations are involved.

The US taxes ALL INCOME from any source earned anywhere in the world if you are a citizen OR a resident. That means a Canadian who becomes a US resident can have their Canadian income taxed at US rates! You are automatically a US resident if you stay here for 183 days in any year. But the formula also takes into account your history over three years, and each of those past years can contribute to that 183 day total. 120 days a year is currently the safe number. Perennially, US Congress tries to increase that residence time for our Canadian neighbors to 240 days. It has yet to pass.

The health care system in Canada is administered by each Province and each has a residence rule. You must reside in that province for a certain number of days in order to retain health care benefits. B.C., <u>Alberta</u>, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Northwest Territories, Ontario, New Brunswick and <u>Nova Scotia</u> require at least five months of residence in the province to continue health insurance coverage. Quebec and Prince Edward Island require six months' residency, but Quebec does not count trips of less than 21 days as non-residency. Newfoundland and Labrador requires only four months. Nunavut and the Yukon have no residency requirements. Some provinces will allow longer absences under some circumstances or if a written request made by the resident is approved.

Note also: Canadian Federal law allows citizens 182 days out of the country before they lose health coverage. Per Gertie Oosterhuis

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Help for Severe Aortic Stenosis



Severe aortic stenosis is a narrowed aortic heart valve that doesn't open and close properly, reducing blood flow to the rest of the body.

Morton Plant Hospital is now enrolling eligible patients in the Medtronic Evolut R low-risk trial, which investigates the safety and effectiveness of a transcatheter aortic valve replacement (TAVR) system in patients with severe aortic stenosis who are at a low surgical mortality risk. TAVR is a minimally invasive alternative to open-heart surgery used to treat failing aortic heart valves in patients with severe aortic stenosis. Morton Plant Hospital was chosen as the first hospital in Tampa Bay to offer the TAVR procedure for patients with severe aortic stenosis who were at an intermediate or high surgical mortality risk. Our team has completed more than 700 TAVR procedures over the last five years.

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Florida Golf Cart Laws

Any residents of Island in the Sun own and enjoy an electric or a gas-operated golf cart. They often name them. They usually have rain covers for the rainy season, giving them the appearance of diminutive Jeeps. A new golf electric golf cart can set you back about \$5000, but a perfectly good cart can be purchased used for as little as \$2000. Be sure to check the condition of the batteries on a used cart - they are expensive!

Residents certainly can use golf carts to go around inside the Park at all hours, but some use them to go shopping and to local restaurants. Clearwater laws do not specifically prevent using a golf cart on the walkways around the Park, but the written rules do not specifically allow it either. If they are used outside the park, you should know the pertinent state laws for them.

One of the laws passed in 2012 was the option to covert faster golf carts - or similar lowspeed vehicles - to even lower-speed carts, saving golf cart owners registration and insurance fees.

A regular golf cart only goes up to 20 mph. Low-speed vehicles can zoom by at more than 20 mph but not more than 25 mph. Unlike golf carts, low-speed vehicles have to be registered and insured.

The new law permits low-speed vehicles to be converted into regular golf cart status for a one time fee of \$40 dollars.

Annual registration costs for low speed vehicles average between \$46 to \$57.

Required equipment for a golf cart includes headlamps, stop lamps, turn signal lamps, tail lamps, reflex reflectors, parking brakes, a rearview mirror, a windshield and a standard hip restraint or hand hold.

The golf cart operators must possess a valid driver's license pursuant to F.S. § 322.03.

The golf carts authorized for use are incapable of exceeding 20 miles per hour.

Golf carts may be operated during the hours between sunset and sunrise as well as during daylight hours in the designated areas only.

Roseate Spoonbill

gregarious wading bird of the Ibis and Spoonbill family with crimson wing markings on a white body. Like the American flamingo, their pink color is diet-derived. This species feeds in shallow fresh or coastal waters by swinging its bill from side to side as it steadily walks through the water, often in groups. The spoon-shaped bill allows it to sift easily through



mud. It feeds on crustaceans, aquatic insects, frogs, newts and very small fish ignored by larger waders. The roseate spoonbill nests in shrubs or trees, often mangroves, laying two to five eggs, which are whitish with brown markings.

Wood Stork

The wood stork is the only stork species found in North America. It is 40-44 inches in length with a wingspan of five feet. It has a naked gray to black head and neck, a white body and black edged wings and tail. It has a long, slightly curved black bill and long legs. Unlike herons, the wood stork flies with its neck stretched straight out. Males and females look alike.

Wood stork pairs often mate for life. Pairs often return to the same nesting colony site yearafter-year. The nest is a platform made of sticks and places in a tree. There may be a many as 25 nests in a single tree! Both the male and the female build the nest. The female lays 2 or 3 white eggs and both parents take turns incubating them. Incubation takes 28-32 days. Both parents feed and care for the chicks. The chicks fledge in about two months.

The wood stork is an excellent flier. It soars thousands of feet in the air with its legs and neck outstretched and rides on air currents. The wood stork sometimes performs rolls and dives in flight.

Opossum

North America's only marsupial (female has a pouch) mammal. The female carries and nurses her young in her marsupium until they are about 2 to 3 months old; then they are carried on her back another 1 to 2 months whenever they are away from the den.

Size of a cat; grey to black fur; black eyes; pink nose, feet and tail; black ears; and pointed nose.

Solitary and nocturnal: usually slow moving; when frightened and unable to flee may fall into an involuntary shock-like state, "playing 'possum".

Hiss or growl and show their 50 sharp teeth when frightened; but, in reality, they are gentle and placid— they prefer to avoid all confrontations and wish to be left alone.

Omnivorous: eats insects, snails, rodents, berries, over-ripe fruit, grasses, leaves, and carrion; occasionally will eat snakes, ground eggs, corn or other vegetables.

Adaptable; able to live wherever water, food, and shelter exist, including under your house. At home in trees; uses its prehensile tail to help stabilize position when climbing— it does not, however, hang by its tail.

One of the shortest lived mammals for its size, typically 2 to 4 years. Killed by many predators: humans (and cars), dogs, cats, owls, and larger wildlife.

Southern Black Racer Snake

The southern black racer (*Coluber constrictor*) is the "black snake" most commonly found in urban and natural areas throughout all of Florida . These long, slender snakes can grow to 4–5 feet long, and have smooth gray/black scales on their backs and bellies and white chins and throats.

Adult black racers are commonly found sunning themselves on lawns, shrubbery, walkways and fences, and are occasionally found in houses (particularly after rains). Racers are harmless to people and are swift and agile (as their name implies), fleeing rapidly when approached. However, if they are cornered and feel threatened, they may vigorously shake their tail (making a rattling sound on the floor or dry leaves) and may release a foul smelling 'musk' on their captor or even strike if handled. Black racers use their speed to catch a variety of prey, including frogs, lizards, small snakes, birds, and rodents.
