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UNOFFICIAL NOTES OF THE LHRO BOARD MEETING OF November 8, 2018

- ✓ All directors were present. The meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. The Pledge of Allegiance and a moment of silence were observed.
- ✓ Prior to the open forum, President Susan Zerbe said there will be three vacancies in the board of directors. Being involved on the board is an excellent way to learn about the park and to serve the park. Interested persons must submit a letter of intent to the office by November 30, with a profile [resume] being due by December 7.
- President Zerbe also mentioned that questions regarding items displayed at residences have been asked. Our attorney was consulted who said that we cannot deny an individuals' freedom of speech.
- ✓ Open forum
 - o Kay Byrne, lot 309, asked if a liaison from the board could sit on the Social Club board. Susan said it would be something for the board to discuss.
 - o Karen Judson, lot 184, expressed her gratitude to the office for their support after some bricks were stolen from her property.
- \checkmark The minutes of the October meeting were approved by the board.
- ✓ Manager's report:
 - o The trash compactor in the maintenance area will be replaced. The current compactor will be taken away by the city of Dunedin within the next four weeks.
 - o The main drain in the pool [a Virginia Graeme Baker drain which is required by law after a young girl of that name was entrapped underwater by the suction of a spa drain] was installed in 2010. It needs to be replaced. The pool will be shut down for about a day in December for that purpose. At that time the tile in the pool will be regrouted.
 - o The chair committee has a selection of four different chairs and will display them for public opinion.
 - o The white flags around the park represent ball valves which have been inspected. It was a very thorough inspection. Two ball valves must be replaced. Two others must be fixed. Several others need new handles. The valve replacement and repair will probably take place in January. Only sections of the park will be affected at any one time. Robo calls will go out to those who will temporarily be without water.
 - o Bruce De Waters and Beth met with our engineer to begin the process of selecting a contractor for street repairs. The engineer has worked with the seven contractors who will be receiving RFPs [Requests for Proposal]. He cannot give a personal recommendation on any of them due to his continued work with them. By the end of next week, the RFPs will be sent out. Beth will also send out supplemental RFPs for the following: Concreting the maintenance area [when the cost is lumped into the paving it will be more economical], new curb around the lake, and speed humps [permanent asphalt humps smoother and longer than the current speed bump]. The hope is that the contractor will be selected in January. The proposed start date will be

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in March and will take about two weeks. The contractor will control traffic during the paving. No resident will be prevented from getting in or out of their home.

- ✓ Treasurer's report
 - o \$39,974 in surplus as of the end of October [income over expenses]. There are still some outstanding payments due [the generators and other projects].
 - o We are trending in the right direction for expenses according to budget.
 - o Total assets are \$1,274,031
- ✓ \$479,244 operating
- ✓ \$544,189 capital reserves
- ✓ \$223,598 cash on hand
- o We are financially ready for the roads with our reserve monies.
- ✓ Sales and Marketing Committee report
 - o There are seven homes for sale -5 are listed with the park, 1 with a realtor, and 1 is a private sale.
 - o Cathy Quast will replace Mary Lou Fraher as the head of the Sales and Marketing Committee.
- \checkmark A job description of the needed webmaster will be posted.
- President Zerbe thanked the Long-Range Planning Committee for its work in readying the residents' survey.
- ✓ Unfinished business
 - o The propane tanks have not been installed near the generators due to a lack of an easement around them. A new plan has been sent to the city. Fred Wimmer was told that should take 7 to 10 days.
- \checkmark There was no new business.
- ✓ The meeting was adjourned at 11:00 a.m.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE NOVEMBER 5 SOCIAL CLUB MEETING

- ✓ Treasurer's Report: Balance as of September 30, \$7673.47.
- ✓ Summer activities report by Kay Byrne: There were many people who helped and made the activities run smoothly. We were authorized \$250 per month for 5 months (May to September) for a total of \$1250. Additional money for activities was raised during the summer via 50/50 raffles and pancake breakfasts. At the end of the summer activities there was a remaining balance of \$6.57.
- ✓ There was a program on Saturday, November 3 with Dale Anderson and Friends. Fall desserts were served.
- ✓ New business:
 - o Veterans Day program on November 12. All were encouraged to sign up for the luncheon.
 - o November dance with Bandstand on November 17. 7-10 p.m. \$3.00.

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- o Rita and Ron Teeter have volunteered to host the Thanksgiving Dinner. All were reminded to sign up if they are attending.
- o The Christmas luncheon will be at Bon Appetit on December 6. Sue Stevens is in charge. 11:30-3:30; \$28/person plus a cash bar.
- ✓ Election of officers: A sign-up sheet can be found on the bulletin board in the back of the clubhouse. The nominating committee consists of Jerry Santerre, Kay Byrne, and Steve Schultz
- ✓ Karen Judson said the festoon lights in the clubhouse will be replaced by Thanksgiving per Beth Carroll. Beth and Karen went through all the closets and they will be reorganized, trying to accommodate everyone.
- ✓ The Hobby Club is in transition, but they still need to be included in the 50/50 rotation. They will no longer be making items and selling them. Instead they will rely on the 50/50 drawings to do community outreach. They have already sent checks to Dunedin Cares and Clothes for Kids. On October 11th, our resident ventriloquist and magician, Lowell Tauszik from Lot 109, left for Bangkok, Thailand for a two-week mission trip. Lowell and his wife have been there four times before. This time, he was asked to teach English to children during their school break. The English "camp" was held at the Baptist Student Center.

Flying from Tampa to Atlanta to Seoul to Bangkok takes about 30 hours in total, and their time zone is 12 hours ahead of ours. Lowell left here on Thursday evening and arrived in Thailand on Saturday at noon.

The Baptist Student Center is a popular school for learning English, and their evening classes are well attended by adults of all ages. Through those classes, Thai people also learn about the Christian faith. As a result, a church was started there called New Vision. Since its inception, that congregation has planted eight more churches.

On Sunday, Lowell attended church at New Vision, then on Monday, the camp began. He was responsible for teaching about a dozen children. Some topics he covered were introductions

and telling others about yourself, how to give stepby-step instructions, and how we use technology. The key focus was to get the children engaged in English conversation.

In addition to the camp, the Baptist Student Center also featured a magic show by Lowell on Saturday afternoon. The second half of the show was focused on teaching about the Bible and the Christian faith. It was well attended and a fun event for a wide range of ages.

This trip was not just about the camp. Lowell also had the opportunity to work with another church, Calvary Baptist. He spoke during the Sunday service and taught an evangelism workshop later in the afternoon. He was also able to go with a

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couple church members to take food and visit two Muslim refugee families from Pakistan. And he was asked to teach one evening at one of the New Vision church plants, called Church of Joy.

All in all, the trip was very successful. Considering that only .07% of the population in Thailand is Christian, the church is strong and growing, and Lowell always finds it encouraging to see their faith in action.

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TIPS FOR LIVING WITH MACULAR DEGENERATION

n Thursday, November 1, low-vision consultant Judith Hawley spoke at the Lake Highlander clubhouse and gave tips on living with macular degeneration. She has been living with macular degeneration for over 66 years, having been diagnosed at age 11. Judith gave some excellent tips which are reported here.

Glare can be a significant problem for those suffering a vision loss. Wearing a visor or a hat with a brim can reduce the glare and allows one to use their vision at a maximum. Finding the right shade of sunglasses for your vision is worth researching. You may find that a gray tint works better for you than brown. Or perhaps you would do better with a pinkish shade. Try on the various shades and ask if you might take them out of the store into the sun to find the best tint for you. A shield above the glasses and on the side noticeably reduces glare. Attractive styles of this type of sunglasses can be found at Walgreens or the Oldsmar Flea Market. Also explore the best positions for your inside lighting such as moving a table lamp or reducing the amount of light above your bathroom mirror.

Keep working at it until you find the best lighting and position of lighting that reduce the glare you may experience.

Contrast is very important for the low vision individual as you lose your depth perception. Try using a light-colored dinner plate with no center pattern and a placemat or tablecloth which has a darker color. This allows you to see the edge of your plate more clearly and helps you see the food on your plate. If you have trouble finding your phone, place it on a light-colored cloth or doily to allow it to stand out, especially if you have dark colored furniture. Yellow edging strips are very helpful to place on the edge of your steps whether indoors or outdoors. You need to be able to see the contrast from one step to the next without falling. And be sure to hold onto the railing as you go up and down the stairs, never letting go of the railing until you are off the last step.

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

Coldest place in the world

You may think it's cold where you live right now—if you're in the northern hemisphere, at least—but scientists have located the absolute coldest spot on Earth. No surprise—it's in Antarctica.



The National Geographic website reports that satellite data have identified an ice sheet in the middle of the southern continent with a temperature of minus 144 degrees Fahrenheit. This breaks the previous record for the chilliest place on the globe minus 128 degrees, recorded in 1983 at the Russian Vostok Station close to the South Pole. At that low temperature, breathing itself is dangerous—more than a few breaths would make your lungs hemorrhage.

Chances are we won't find any colder places. Increases in greenhouse gases and water vapor in the air have scientists expecting a rise in temperatures across the Antarctic of three to four degrees in the coming years.
