

NOVEMBER R.O. MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

(Editor's note) Sorry these highlights are late but this meeting was conducted after The Printers Deadline for Copy.

- *Newly appointed Board member Steve Shultz is serving as R.O. Board secretary.
- Correspondence: A letter & photos were sent by the office regarding a coach on Lot 231, the letter reminded the owner that his coach was in need of a paint job. The homeowner replied with photos showing the home (freshly painted). The homeowner thanked the office for the Friendly Reminder.
- President Dick Duclow reported that Board workshops have been suspended. All Board business will now be conducted at the regular monthly meetings.
- An OPEN FORUM before each meeting will allow residents an opportunity to speak to the Board about specific items of concern.
- OPEN FORUM saw 5 homeowners speak against the new speed bump located just west of the Park Office. All agreed it was working but was the wrong style. The "Bump" is very abrupt and has caused several cart owners to suffer back and neck injuries. The crowd was asked by show of hands, how many would like to see the speed bump removed. A large majority of residents put their hand up.
- Reducing the Board of Directors number to 7 from the current 9 members is under study. A vote is expected next year.
- Geo-Thermal engineers are doing an in-park study of potential ground depression problems. These are generally forewarnings of serious erosion problems.
- Sewer line repairs along the north property line are on hold due to very high water table. This follows a very heavy summer rain season.
- Tree Rings are being installed throughout the park. Residents who have paid for installation will be reimbursed.
- Managers Report:
 - 1. Brighthouse customers may access Lake Highlander notices on Channel 732,
 - 2. Tree branches hanging over our fence along the property line with the next door subdivision (Braemore) will be trimmed.
 - 3. Coach on Lot #8 has been removed, following a foreclosure action
- Director Dennis Lapointe reviewed current "service Animal" laws. Service animal owner must provide "official" written certification annually.
- Treasurer Dusty Rhodes reported the Park Finances are proceeding <u>ON BUDGET</u> for the year. The mortgage pay down account stands at \$800,000.00.
- Asst. Treasurer Susan Zerbe gave a power point (with graphs) presentation of draft budget for 2016. The draft budget recommends the same maintenance fee for 2016 (\$195.00 per month).
- Treasurer Rhodes reviewed the method being used to fully fund our RESERVE

ACCOUNT. Monies will be transferred from savings to fully fund the reserve account until 2018. At that time we will renegotiate our mortgage. It is anticipated that after applying the pay down account money, we will have a considerably lower monthly mortgage payment. It is expected that the maintenance fee will hold steady and the extra cash generated may be used to repay our savings. Paying back the transferred funds will be debated at mortgage renewal time.

- Motion by Treasurer Rhodes to transfer funds from the General Account to the Reserve account passed unanimously.
- Motion to send the draft budget to the residents passed unanimously.
- The Board decided to maintain the current Flag Lowering protocol. Flags will be lowered for residents passing only. Exceptions for a death within the first year of leaving may be made.
- Director Sue Stevens, who chairs the Safety and Security Committee, reviewed the Speed Bump issue. There was lengthy discussion. The existing bump is too high. The Board will look for a model that allows a slow but smoother crossing. Motion By Sue Stevens "Remove the speed bump at the office and install a new STOP SIGN at that intersection". Motion passed. ...(Editor's note, the speed bump was removed that afternoon)
- Director Myron Paris inquired about Maintenance fee direct deposit (checks). Manager Beth Carroll indicated this method is being studied. Our bank feels it may accept that method of paying the monthly maintenance fee.





- This meeting started at 9AM to accommodate the annual Christmas Luncheon that was being held on the same day.
- Invocation by Susan Zerbe, Pledge of Allegiance led by President Duclow
- Open session comments included how pleased the residents were with the Park Manager creating Holiday decorations on the Island.
- Managers Report, **** Stage phone MUST stay plugged in at all times. **** Auto deducting Maintenance fee checks is in the works. More info when all is approved by bank. **** The leak in the sewer line behind lot #89 was caused by W.O.W. cable installation. The park will be reimbursed by W.O.W. for the entire expense of the repair; \$9,557.00. **** Park Office MUST be informed when you order cable TV service. Park will oversee installation.
- Finance report; Asst. Treasurer Susan Zerbe gave a power point presentation showing our budget progress. Year to date, we are slightly under budget. She announced the Mortgage pay down account stands at \$808,386.00. Treasurer Dusty Rhodes commented that it has always been the intent of the Board to use the pay down money to reduce the mortgage in 2018. However, the Board will have full flexibility (Re: use of these funds) when the time comes for mortgage negotiations.
- MOTION by Treasurer Rhodes to accept the 2016 budget as presented and amended, motion passed unanimously. Resident Owner's Maintenance Fees for 2016 remain unchanged at \$195.00.
- Safety and Security Chairperson Sue Stevens reported that parking violation tickets will be handed out beginning January first.
- V.P. Dennis Lapointe reviewed several by-law changes that are pending. One change concerns reducing the number of R.O. Board members from 9 to 7. Also the regulation that did not allow guest to use a home if the owner was not present has been removed. Replacing Board members who resign must be done in open board meetings. If Less than a year remains on the term of a Board member who is being replaced, the position may remain vacant. It was announced that the R.O.Executive Board has been dissolved.
- Long Range Planning Committee Chair, Susan Zerbe reports the committee's new plan will be presented in February. It will include goals, objectives and recommendations.
- Sales and Marketing Chair, Myron Paris announced park wide OPEN HOUSE events will take place on January 24 and March 13, 2016. He announced that 21 homes were sold during 2015.
- New Business;*** Following a motion by Myron Paris, V.P. Dennis Lapointe and Rita St Laurent will revamp the financial statement form that all clubs must complete annually for the Social Club. This should provide more club funds transparency. *** The Geo Tec survey (soil sampling) will continue for some time. Several issues have been discovered concerning depressions within the park.

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
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A POSSUM PRIMER

(FROM DICTIONARY.COM)

POSSUM; noun, plural opossums (especially collectively) opossum. A prehensile-tailed marsupial, Didelphis virginiana, of the eastern U.S., the female having an abdominal pouch in which its young are carried: noted for the habit of feigning death when in danger. Editors Note; For some unknown reason, Lake Highlander has become a popular place for possum. As of mid December, two Snowbird trappers (who started their trapping efforts in October) have relocated 18 of these unwanted guests from the park.

The critters are live trapped in oversized humane traps and relocated to Hammock Park, a 90 acre wilderness located in northwest Dunedin. On at least one occasion, opossums chewed their way into a home here in the park. They seem to enjoy living under our homes. Here are some Possum facts taken from the **Professional Wildlife Removal website**; **Possums aren't usually dangerous animals, but many people run into various problems with opossums due to their scavenging and opportunistic behavior. Opossums turn up in many unwanted areas, such as in sheds, under decks and in attics. Some common Possum Problems:-Raiding the garbage cans.- Endangering pets.- Stealing pet food.- Living under a shed or deck.- Living inside an attic or wall.- Living under the house or basement.- Living under a mobile home.- Dying on the property.- Dying in the walls or attic.- Spreading fleas to pets.- Spreading feces on property or in attic.**

One park resident has volunteered to help pursue pesky possums. "Trapper" Dan Fraher of Lot # 204 is the park "GO TO" possum guy. If you hear strange noises under your home, give Trapper Dan a call. He may be able to help.

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

Never too late to succeed

poor boy named Harlan with only a sixth-grade education wouldn't have made anyone's list of the most likely to succeed. His first major success came when at the age of 39, when he was able to come up with the financing to open a small-town gas station and restaurant. He did pretty well, too—but only for a while.

With the onset of World War II, Harlan's once-solid customer base left the small town to enlist in the military or take factory jobs in the city. Still, he managed to hold on until a new interstate highway eliminated his drive-by trade. Then, after nearly 30 years in business, Harlan was forced to sell his dream to pay off his debts.

Broke and nearing 70, Harlan could have closed the curtain on his career ambitions. Instead, he took to the road, offering to share his pressure-cooking techniques with other restaurant owners if they'd agree to become his franchises. He sold only five in the first two years, but he stuck it out.

Four years later the self-proclaimed Colonel Sanders had sold more than 600 Kentucky Fried Chicken franchises. And by the time Harlan Sanders died at age 90, KFC was a worldwide brand.

Is today's success holding you back?

Imanthes was a celebrated Greek artist of the 4th century B.C. As an aspiring young painter, Timanthes worked with a respected tutor to learn his craft. After several years, he produced what he believed was his masterpiece.

Delighted with his accomplishment, the young artist stopped striving to further his art. Instead, he devoted hours each day to gazing at his painting, mentally patting himself on the back for his achievement. Then one morning, when he arrived at the studio, he was horrified to find that someone had slathered paint across the canvas, destroying his work. The tutor eventually confessed that he'd done the deed.

"I did it for your own good," he explained. "The painting was holding you back." He urged the artist to try again: "See if you can do better."

Timanthes took his teacher's advice. His next effort, "The Sacrifice of Iphigenia," became his signature work and is regarded as one of the finest paintings of its time.

You should celebrate jobs done well. But don't get so caught up in yesterday's achievements that you forget tomorrow's challenges.

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
