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

HIGHLIGHTS SPECIAL R.O. MEETING RE; HOME & CERTIFICATE SALES

- ❖ Approximately 150 homeowners were in attendance, along with Park Attorney Steve Nickoloff.
 - ❖ V.P Doug Stewart acted as moderator. He opened with the following quote,
 - "You are all guaranteed to get your \$24,000.00 back".
- ❖ The thrust of the meeting was to explain why home sales in Lake Highlander now are advertised and sold with the home and share (membership certificate) listed as one price.

Our by-laws had referred to the share as a separate \$24,000.00 item. Florida State law has superseded our bylaws and now the entire package consisting of home and share are taxed by the State at a 7% rate when the sale is completed. Coach & Share must be sold together, however, the owner sets the package price. You are no longer limited to asking a set amount (\$24,000.00) for your share. You can roll it into the home price and arrive at any figure you think is appropriate. The price of your home must include the total purchase price, home and share.

- Questions from the floor included;
- 1. May extra names be placed on the share? **Answer** YES.
- 2. If a coach is removed from my lot, may I sell the share (membership certificate) for any price I think is fair? **Answer**, YES
- 3. Is the owner or his or her heirs responsible to continue paying the maintenance fee and real estate taxes until the coach is sold? **Answer** YES.
- 4. Are there different laws governing Mobile Home Parks and Co-Operative Parks like Lake Highlander? **Answer**, YES.
- 5. If a homeowner become incapacitated and asks a relative to sell the coach/share, how does that person proceed? **Answer**, the L.H. office will furnish names of several Title Companies and Law firms that have successfully acted for absent home owners. The office does not get involved any further than identifying professionals to help.

MORTGAGE TEAM ANNOUNCES SEARCH RESULTS

t a special R.O. Board meeting held on March 30, the team assigned the task of finding a new mortgage deal came through with flying colors. Ending a 2 year effort begun by retired Treasurer Dusty Rhodes and completed by current Board members, Susan Zerbe, Michel Bergeron and Doug Stewart, a new mortgage vendor has been selected. Before bringing their results to the full board of directors, the park accountant Lorri Kidder reviewed things and gave the search team's choice a stamp of approval. If all goes as planned, a motion will be made at the April 12 R.O. meeting to start toward a deal with Mortgage Brokers Crown Capital who will arrange a new mortgage with Symentra Insurance Company. Current working projections see things finishing up with a 15 year fixed rate mortgage at 4.56 % interest. The resulting new mortgage will allow annual prepayments (without penalty) if the board feels they want to do that. All in all we will have a substantially lower monthly mortgage payment freeing up cash to fully fund reserve accounts as a hedge against future assessments.

HIGHLIGHTS OF APRIL R.O. MEETING

- ❖ President Killham opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance and also announced a quorum was in attendance.
 - ❖ An OPEN FORUM was offered but there were no comments from the members
- ❖ Director Susan Zerbe gave a comprehensive report of the Swan Replacement Committee's findings. A Swan dealer has been identified and contacted for a firm price and shipping details. A delivered price FOB Tampa International Airport is \$1,200.00 for a pair of young female swans, pinned to prevent flight. The Committee identified several items that will require further study.
 - 1. A permanent holding pen should be built to provide some protection during storms as well as making removing the swans from the water much easier.
 - 2. The Committee provided a detailed drawing of the enclosure, as well as a conceptual drawing showing how the enclosure would blend in with its surroundings.
 - 3. A swan handling group will maintain the swans after receiving training from the Regal Swan Society.
 - 4. A "Disaster Plan" will be on file
 - 5. The Committee suggested NO FISHING sighs will be posted on the lake.
- ❖ Board members reviewed the report and followed through with many additional questions and comments. Director Zerbe answered all the Board's questions using facts gathered to date by the Swan Committee.
- ❖ Members were given an opportunity to make comments. They overwhelmingly favored new swans over continued fishing on the lake. It was also brought to the Boards attention that if the average swan costs remain at \$2,000.00 per year, it would cost each household .56 cents per month. Director Zerbe (who is also the R.O. Treasurer) assured the Board that the cost was not going to be a problem.
- President Killham indicated the Board was not prepared to make a decision on the swan question at this time.
- ❖ The Swan Replacement Committee will continue to gather facts concerning swan replacements.

❖ MANAGERS REPORT; 1, Several types of park directories are being studied to replace the one at the front entrance near the flag poles. The Board directed the manager to proceed with her planning for a rebuilt directory. 2, All the palm trees used to replace missing trees have been planted. 3, The floor in the pool room has been damaged by the items that were stored

***OLD BUSINESS, Patsy Perry asked what was happening with upgrading the wooden fencing and general appearance of the maintenance area. Park Manager replied that other projects have higher priorities

- NEW BUSINESS; Following a discussion, the Board decided to install new security cameras at the same time the new directory is built. This all will all take place after the new mortgage is finalized.
- ❖ TREASURERS REPORT, Susan Zerbe announced that Symentra Insurance Company will carry the new park mortgage. The interest rate is quoted at 4.56%. as a fixed rate for 15 years. The mortgage arrangements are expected to finalize in June. As planned, the Pay Down Account will be applied against the mortgage.
 - ❖ There were no further committee reports Meeting adjourned at 11:30.


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
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HIGHLIGHTS APRIL SOCIAL CLUB MEETING

- > 1st. V.P. Kay Byrne filled in for President Brown
- Margaret French gave the invocation.
- > 2nd. V.P. Roseann Hubbard led the Pledge of Allegiance
- > Secretary Louise Shoksnyder read the March minutes, they were approved as read.

- Treasurer Judy Walling gave the financial report. Several inconsistencies have been corrected, including a bank error of \$733.00 which has been resolved in our favor. The Club bank balance as of March 31 was \$11,408.13.
- ➤ OLD BUSINESS; a propane tank safety storage cage has been located. It will cost approximately \$350.00.
- NEW BUSINESS; It was announced that Eugene "Brownie" Brown will not be available to chair the 2018 White Elephant sale. The Board is considering the elimination of furniture sales at the 2018 White Elephant.
- Comments from the floor; Pat Kasprzak mentioned that the furniture pickups and storing of furniture for the sale is very labor intensive and she thinks we should eliminate that part of the sale. Alternatively, she feels storing and picking up for 4 months ahead of time is too much. Perhaps only picking up and storing for 30 days prior to the sale would make things easier. Doris Lapointe feels more people should know what the club is deciding and suggested making their plans known at coffee hour. Lynn Marro suggested having donors deliver their own furniture to the sale site on the day before the sale. The Chairwoman then decided the sale details will need more study. The final sale particulars will be announced in the fall.
- Susan Zerbe, speaking on behalf of the Wine and Cheese organizers, commented that the Wine and Cheese parties have become very popular. At the last two parties, the organizers rented three hi-top stand-up tables which got lots of use. 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

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FOOD FOR THOUGHT

y sister-in-law's mother was a great southern cook. At one of the family's gatherings she made a delicious cake she called a "wash day cake". She said it was an easy dessert to make on the day she did the wash (laundry for us northerners) for her family of seven. Her recipe started with a yellow cake mix to which she added powdered sugar. When I asked her how much powdered sugar she said "Lordy, honey, I don't know. You just stick your hand in the box two times." Needless to say, I never made "wash day cake". However, here is a recipe from another great southern cook I know.

Chocolate Éclair Cake (To me from Pat)

- a 9x13 pan with a tight-fitting lid
- 45 graham cracker squares
- 2 3.4 oz. boxes of vanilla instant pudding and pie filling*
- 3 cups of milk
- 1 9 oz. container of Cool Whip
- 1 can of chocolate frosting
- -Mix pudding and milk.
- -Add Cool Whip and beat with a mixer.
- -Lay 15 crackers on the bottom of the 9x13 pan.
- -Spread ½ of the pudding mixture on top.
- -Add another layer of 15 crackers then the other ½ of the pudding mixture.
- -Top with the last 15 crackers.
- -CAREFULY frost with chocolate frosting.
- -Refrigerate overnight in the sealed pan.
- *I have also made this with chocolate, butterscotch, and pumpkin pudding. Pumpkin is usually only available at Thanksgiving.

Help for Severe Aortic Stenosis



Severe aortic stenosis is a narrowed aortic heart valve that doesn't open and close properly, reducing blood flow to the rest of the body.

Morton Plant Hospital is now enrolling eligible patients in the Medtronic Evolut R low-risk trial, which investigates the safety and effectiveness of a transcatheter aortic valve replacement (TAVR) system in patients with severe aortic stenosis who are at a low surgical mortality risk. TAVR is a minimally invasive alternative to open-heart surgery used to treat failing aortic heart valves in patients with severe aortic stenosis. Morton Plant Hospital was chosen as the first hospital in Tampa Bay to offer the TAVR procedure for patients with severe aortic stenosis who were at an intermediate or high surgical mortality risk. Our team has completed more than 700 TAVR procedures over the last five years.




