There are significant events that happen in our lives where we remember exactly the day, time and where we were when those events occurred. For example, I can vividly remember when President Kennedy and Dr. King were assassinated and when the space shuttle exploded not long after it lifted off towards space. Another significant event that is certainly etched in my mind as well as many of you was September 11, 2001. Although this horrific event happened 16 years ago, it is still as fresh in my mind today SEPTEMBER as it was back then. For me, it was a typical morning working as a Department of Defense Contractor at The National Security Agency



(The NSA). There was an announcement over the buildings PA system of a plane that hit a tower in New York. We all thought it must have been an equipment malfunction where the pilot could not safety land the plane. We turned on the T.V., as I assumed most people did, to see what was happening. To our shock and bewilderment, 18 minutes after the first plane hit the first tower, we witnessed another plane hit the second tower! My colleagues and I now knew this was no accident, it was a terrorist attack on our nation! We immediately went into action

As we all know now, 19 men trained by AL-Qaeda carried out a coordinated terrorist attack on the United States that had been planned for years. The attackers simultaneously hijacked four passenger aircraft with the intention of crashing them into major landmarks in the United States, inflicting as much death and destruction as possible. Three of the planes struck their intended targets (The Twin Towers and The Pentagon); the fourth crashed into a field in Pennsylvania. In a single day, these deliberate acts of mass murder killed over 3,000 human beings from 57 countries. More than 400 of the dead were first responders, including New York City firefighters, police officers, and EMTs.

The results could had been worse if not for the heroic efforts of the passengers of United Flight 93. Because the plane had been delayed in taking off from Newark Airport, passengers on board learned of the events in New York and Washington via their cell phones. Knowing the aircraft was not returning to an airport as the hijackers claimed, a group of passengers and flight attendants planned a revolt. One of the passengers, Thomas Burnett Jr., told his wife over the phone "I know we're all going to die. There's three of us who are going to do something about it. I love you, honey." Another passenger-Todd Beamer-was heard saying over an open line "Are you guys ready? Let's roll!" The passengers fought the four hijackers and are suspected to have attacked them in the cockpit with a fire extinguisher. The plane then flipped over and sped toward the ground at upwards of 500 miles per hour, crashing in a rural field in western Pennsylvania at 10:10 a.m. where all 45 people aboard were killed. Its intended target is not known to this day, but theories include the White House, the U.S. Capitol, Camp David, or one *Continued on page 8* of several nuclear power plants along the eastern seaboard.

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It was one of the most media covered events of all time, and after 16 years, the images are still difficult to view. These attacks and the global reaction to them have profoundly shaped the world we live in today. Additionally, it demonstrates how ordinary people do extraordinary things when faced with a crisis situation. It remains important for us as Americans to stay vigilant and know that our freedoms are not free, and we must never forget those images and always remember what happened on that dark day.

HIS story is about a ball, the most wonderful ball ever invented.

It's better than a baseball, basketball or football. It's better than any ball you can name.

It was gone for 20 years, but it is back now.

It is called a Spaldeen, which might not mean anything to you, unless you grew up on the East Coast, preferably New York City before 1979. I grew up in Brooklyn in the 1940'S, and 1950s which means my childhood memories are filled with Spaldeens.

Starting in the 1920s, the Spalding Co. manufactured tennis balls at its home base in Chicopee, Mass.

But overruns would occur, so there wasn't enough of the fuzzy stuff for the outside of the tennis balls.

Some anonymous genius -- and I use that word "genius" with reverence -- got the idea to market the bright pink, unused rubber cores as the "Spalding High-Bounce Ball."

Because New York City people don't talk so good, they pronounced Spalding as "Spaldeen" -- as in, "Hey, Joey, you wanna play? I got a Spaldeen."

Spalding would box the Spaldeens and ship them down to New York City, where kids would buy them for a quarter each.

And, my God, when you bought a brand new Spaldeen, the aroma alone would cause ecstasy; it was the smell of Bazooka bubble gum and summer and childhood and joy and hope.

Then you would go out and play. All those legendary New York City street games began and ended with Spaldeens.

I'm talking about games you've heard about but might never have played -- stickball, punchball, stoopball, hit the penny and a million others.

When it came to inventing games with a Spaldeen, the only limit was your imagination.

We didn't have baseball fields or any other kinds of fields. We played ball on playgrounds -- really slabs of concrete surrounded by cyclone fences -- or we played in the street, using sewer covers as bases.

The virtue of a Spaldeen, besides that you could whack it a mile, was that it didn't break things.

You hit Mrs. Smith's Olds 88 with a Spaldeen, no big deal. No broken glass. No broken mirror. No broken nothin'.

Of course, Mrs. Smith would come running down her steps, screaming, "I'm gonna tell your mutha."

I apologize, Mrs. Smith, wherever you are.

I mostly played in the playground of P.S. 188.

And every kid would come to the playground with a Spaldeen in his back pocket. If someone had a stick, we'd play stickball.

The stick was an old broom handle or a dowel from the closet. We'd draw a box on the wall







and pitch to it, and if the batter hit it over the fence, it was a homer.

We'd play handball with the Spaldeen, and sometimes we'd go to a friend's house for stoopball. A kid would throw the ball at the steps in front of someone's house, and as the ball sailed back, you'd try to catch it on a fly. If it bounced once, it was a single, twice a double, and so on.

But the king of Spaldeen games all over New York City was punchball. You'd toss the ball over your head.

You'd swing down overhand as if you were serving a tennis ball. And then you'd punch it with your closed fist.

Guys could hit it 200 feet, long fly balls that seemed to never come down. The puncher would be running around the bases -- painted squares on the playground's grimy concrete -- while the outfielders ran like mad after the Spaldeen.

ICE CREAM· YOU SCREAM!

t was the mid-1920s. A solid wood counter loomed high above my childish head. As I patiently waited, my mouth watered as I watched the parlor owner methodically scoop my Lorder of vanilla ice cream into a quart cylinder-shaped heavy cardboard container. Having no ice box at home, our family of five expected to immediately gather around the kitchen table to happily chat and enjoy the treat together ... this is my first ice cream memory!

As I looked about the ice cream parlor, I took in my surroundings. The quiet, cool room appeared very large and a somewhat musty dampness hung in the air. I became aware, also, that town men were present behind a closed door at the rear, playing cards. In later years, I was surprised to learn that this very old wooden structure had formerly been a church which had been moved from another lot at the far edge of town to its present location. I will digress for a moment to say that, as a teenager, I made a special trip to our back street to watch this landmark building being tom down. Uncle Bill was helping with the dismantling and observed my sudden interest as he removed a very ancient small, rounded top trunk from the attic. Imagine my delight when my discerning Uncle handed me the trunk, informing me it was mine to keep! This cherished little trunk has been carefully refinished and presently holds treasured tid-bits of small antique items and my old Fairy Tale Book. Needless to say, my Uncle's kindness left a lasting impression!

A maine ventinourtiny community each hot summer was the Church Ice Cream So- cial! Many of our local ladies took pride in outdoing themselves by baking their favorite pies and luscious cakes to donate for the occasion. My sister and I, more often than not, chose to purchase a slice of our Mother's OWN delicious cake and this never ceased to amuse her. A few days before the social, some of our ladies gathered in the church's cool basement to mix the milk, cream, sugar, eggs and vanilla. (I loved the chatting and sense of camaraderie.) Arrangements had been made with an ice cream company from Hamilton, OH to pickup the mixture for freezing. Activities reached a new high the day of the social. A truck returned the homemade ice cream (always vanilla) - now frozen and packed in dry ice - in heavy, metal two-gallon containers. Our village men got into the act by carrying the heavy folding tables and chairs up from the church basement to place in the shaded side church yard. They also strung up electric lights for use in \:he early evening when nearby farmers were in from their chores and the crowd reached its peak. Miss Maggie, our town's little maiden lady, was always assigned to, and took great pride in cutting the cakes and pies JUST SO. One scoop of ice cream, pie or cake sold for five cents each. As the years passed the price went up, but the goodies remained quite a bargain. I always loved these ice cream socials and was soon old enough to join in on the fun and activities and continued doing so for many years.

As a small child, I experimented with scooping clean, fresh fallen snow and mixing it with sugar, vanilla and milk, thinking it would give me home-made ice cream. My formula did not work, of course, and I most certainly did not relish DRINKING the mixture.

The ice cream purchased in stores of bygone years was the REAL thing and not some thickened, smooth mixture now CALLED ice cream, which is probably much healthier for our arteries. I make do with today's version and can still describe my love of ice cream with our childhood saving: "I scream-you scream-we scream for ice cream!" cream!"
