Hints for Closing up Coach for Summer

- 1. <u>Contract with someone to weed your flower beds especially in the front</u>. Other people are still living in the park and wish to see it maintained. Thanks!
- 2. Contact office (5-L) with departure date and northern information. Please let JoAnn know who has key to your coach. Hopefully we won't get storms but let's be prepared.
- 3. Turn off your water on side of coach. Certainly don't needed flooded floors on your return.
- 4. Some residents use Damp Rid and other products to keep out moisture and bugs. Add some Clorox to toilet tank and cover commode with plastic wrap. This keeps evaporation to a minimum. Others cover drains for same reason.
- 5. <u>Optional:</u> Some residents keep their AC at 85 and keep refrigerator on. If turning off the refrigerator, prop the door open to avoid smells. Same for drawers and closets. Keep the doors and drawers open. You may wish to lightly cover furniture, lamps and wrap dishes to keep dust free.

Caregiving has its rewards

Most just help one person, but 22 percent are responsible for two people and 7 percent provide help to three or more. Most caregivers are between the ages of 45 and 64 (23 percent), but 17 percent of people older than 65 act as caregivers as well.

The demands may be high, but many Americans find the work worthwhile. Yes, 32 percent describe caregiving as stressful, but 88 percent say helping out an elderly loved one is a rewarding experience.

Try these year-round common cold remedies

ou can catch a cold any time of the year, no matter what the weather is. Although you can't cure it, you can relieve its symptoms with some simple remedies. Try these:

- Honey. Honey mixed with tea or warm lemon water can relieve coughing and sore throat.

- Hot liquids. Hot tea or water can loosen up congestion in your chest and sinuses.
- Salt water. Evidence suggests that rinsing your mouth with salty water can clear up nasal congestion and unclog your sinuses.



• Vitamin C. Evidence that vitamin C can help you avoid or shorten colds is mixed, although research does hint that it may be effective for those with a vitamin C deficiency.

osing weight is just a matter of exercising, right? Actually, that may not be the case, according to a study of exercise and weight loss reported on the CNN website.

Researchers looked at 332 adults in the U.S., Jamaica, and Africa, measuring their activity level over a week. The volunteers displayed a variety of exercise levels from sedentary to active. Although those who exercised and were active more burned away more calories than the others, their activity tended to hit a plateau—after a certain level, more exercise didn't produce more weight loss.



Switching exercises helped a little, since using different muscles can make your body use more energy. But in the long run, a combination of exercise and a reduced-calorie diet may be your best bet for losing those unwanted pounds.

Don't get zapped at work (or home)

E lectrical hazards at home and in the workplace injure thousands every year from burns and shocks. Faulty or overloaded wires cause the majority of accidents, so protect your family and your co-workers by following these guidelines:

- Get inspected. If your electrical panel hasn't been inspected for more than 10 years, get a qualified electrician to look it over.
- Unplug heat appliances after use. At home, that includes toasters, hair dryers, and irons, among others. In the office, unplug space heaters or anything else that can cause a fire.
- Use the correct wattage. Putting a 75-watt bulb in a 60-watt light socket is asking for trouble.
- Don't overuse extension cords. They're meant for short-term use, not as way to plug in as many appliances as possible into one outlet.
- Use surge protectors. They'll keep computers and other appliances safe from overloaded circuits.
- Keep appliances away from water. If an appliance that's plugged in falls into water or gets wet, unplug it before you reach for it.
- Don't yank cords. When unplugging an appliance, always grip the head of the cord. Yanking and tugging can damage the cord's wire and insulation, which can lead to an electrical shock or fire.






