

Chocolate and Peanut Butter Microwave Mug Cake Recipe

A chocolate sponge cake with a peanut butter melting middle, topped with chocolate sprinkles.

SERVES 1

INGREDIENTS

1 slice of butter

6 squares of dark chocolate


1-1/2 tsp. peanut butter

1 egg

1 Tbsp. soft brown sugar

5 Tbsp. plain flour

1/2 tsp. baking powder



1 tsp. peanut butter

1 tsp. chocolate sprinkles

METHOD

In a mug: melt the butter with the chocolate in the microwave for 30-40 seconds (800 watts).

Beat the mixture until smooth, then allow it to cool slightly.

One by one, whisk in the peanut butter, egg, sugar, flour and baking powder. Cook in the microwave for 50 seconds (800 watts). Push the spoonful of peanut butter into the middle and cook for a further 40 seconds.

Decorate with chocolate sprinkles. Allow to cool for one minute before eating.

August Trivia and Folklore



Rhubarb Peach Cobbler

9-1/2 ounces all purpose flour, approximately 2 cups

1 ounce sugar, approximately 2 tablespoons, plus 1 cup sugar

1 tablespoon freshly grated lime zest

1 teaspoon kosher salt, plus 1/4 teaspoon

4-1/2 ounces unsalted butter, chilled and cut into small pieces, plus extra for dish

1-1/2 ounces lard, chilled and cut into small pieces

1-1/2 ounces ice water, approximately 3 tablespoons

2 tablespoons cornstarch

1 pound rhubarb, chopped into 1/2-inch pieces

1 pound sliced peaches, leave peel on and sliced into 1/2 to 1-inch pieces

1 tablespoon freshly squeezed lime juice

Preheat the oven to 375 degrees F. Place a piece of aluminum foil on the bottom rack to catch any drippings. Butter a 9 by 9-inch glass baking dish and set aside.

Place the flour, 1-ounce sugar, lime zest and 1 teaspoon salt in the bowl of a food processor and pulse 3 to 4 times. Add the butter and lard and pulse until the mixture just becomes crumbly. Sprinkle or spritz the mixture with the ice water a little at a time and process just until the dough holds together when squeezed in a fist. Place the dough into a 1 gallon zip top bag and form into a disk. Place the dough into the refrigerator for at least 30 minutes, while you prepare the filling.

In a medium mixing bowl whisk together the 1 cup of sugar, cornstarch, and 1/4 teaspoon of salt. Stir in the rhubarb, peaches, and lime juice.

Remove 1/3 of the dough from the bag, pinch into pieces and distribute evenly in the

bottom of the prepared dish. With the remaining dough still in the bag, roll it out to a sheet large enough to cover the top of the dish. Pour the fruit mixture into the dish and top with the dough that has been removed from the bag, pressing the dough into the corners of the dish. Bake, uncovered, for 60 minutes or until the dough is cooked through and starting to turn golden. *If using frozen fruit, increase cooking time to 90 minutes.



Change the oven setting to broil and continue to cook until golden brown, approximately 3 minutes. Remove from the oven and allow to stand for 15 to 30 minutes before serving.

Depression Cost of Living

Remember when it cost \$3.50 to get a marriage license? That's what it cost my sweetheart to make our marriage legal in 1932. Seems odd, too. More of us stayed married when the fee was minimal than folks do today. We didn't go to Niagara Falls for our honeymoon. We were content to drive 20 miles to a romantic old hotel that had once been a gristmill. We watched the water run over the dam and dreamed our dreams of the future.

I remember when the doctor came to our house to deliver our first baby. He charged \$20. What kind of baby can you get for \$20 today?

We were farmers. My husband worked for the more affluent farmers for \$1 a day. But then, it evened out; he could buy a pair of denim overalls for 98 cents. That was in 1933, B.S.T. (Before sales tax).

I taught the District 7 School and received \$70 a month. We thought that was a fine salary. Our money went farther in those days. We could buy a 50-pound sack of flour for 89 cents and a 10-pound sack of sugar for 49 cents. We could buy Grit magazine for a nickel and The Saturday Evening Post for a dime.

We lived through the depression, Kansas dust storms, droughts, hail storms and the grass-hopper plague, and we didn't go on Relief. When an occasional vagrant stopped for a meal, we gave him scrambled eggs, stewed tomatoes with bread and butter, the same food we ate.

That was before the days of rural electrification in our area. We used kerosene lamps and washed our clothes in a tub on a washboard. We didn't even have an icebox. To keep butter and milk cool we put them in a bucket and hung the bucket down the well.

We milked one cow and set the milk overnight for the cream to rise. In the morning we skimmed the cream off, sold it, and drank the skim milk.

The first year of our marriage we bought an incubator. We set 150 eggs in it and in three weeks, we had 120 little chickens. When the chickens were about 6 weeks old, a storm came along and blew away the brooder house, but left the chicken. We went out in the pouring rain, slogged through the mud and, soaked to the skin, collected the chickens. (Wet chickens stink!) We brought the waterlogged chicks into the kitchen, dried them off and put them in the oven of the wood-burning range to warm up.

We bought chicken feed that came in beautifully colored print material. When the sack was empty I washed it and used it to make aprons, curtains, or a little girl's dress. Many farm wives bought the feed two or three sacks at a time, and chose sacks with the same print pattern. Three sacks were enough to make a house dress. They wore them to church, too.

We had a Model-T Ford that was prone to have flat tires. It could speed down the road (on the level) at 40 mph. It went downhill faster. But we could fill old Lizzie's gas tank for about a dollar.

The first year we farmed, we had no tractor or horse. To plow our garden, we borrowed a horse from a neighbor. When the potatoes and sweet corn needed to be cultivated, my husband hitched the horse to a single-row cultivator. I had to lead the horse because he had a penchant for walking on the corn instead of between the rows. The beast just seemed to delight in putting his 10-inch foot on every other stalk of corn. He didn't mind putting his foot on me, either.

Country folks had the wisdom to manage things back then. Can't say I'd like to live again in those Good Old Days, but they certainly weren't bad, either.


Next, plant three rows of "squash" – Squash gossip, Squash criticism, Squash indifferent.

A little silver-haired lady calls her neighbor and says, "Please come over here and help me. I have a killer jigsaw puzzle, and I can't figure out how to get started."




The little silver haired lady said, "According to the picture on the box, it's a rooster."

he world of books, reading, and words is full of surprises. Take a look at some of these stories about writers and other creative people (from the Buzzfeed website):

- Green Eggs & Ham. This Dr. Seuss classic was written on a bet. Publisher Bennett Cerf wagered \$50 that Ted Geisel couldn't write a children's book using fewer then 50 different words. Geisel won.
- Thomas Jefferson. The third U.S. president (and writer of the Declaration of Independence) invented more than 100 "American" words to distinguish U.S. writing from British usage—including the word "anglophobia."
- Gone with the Wind. Margaret Mitchell began work on her first (and only) novel after recovering from an auto accident. During her convalescence, she read so many books from the local library that her husband got tired of going back and forth—so she suggested she try writing a book of her own.
- Amazon. The first book sold on the now dominant website
 was Fluid Concepts and Creative Analogies, by Douglas Hofstadter. Its subject: whether
 machines could be taught to think like people.

Stay optimistic to get ahead

uccessful people are optimistic. They're realistic, and they see the challenges, but they don't lose their confidence. Here are some of the characteristics of "intelligent optimists" that anyone can master:
