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Almond Joy Cookies

Ingredients:

- 1. Preheat oven to 375°F. Spray a 13x9" baking pan with baking spray and flour.
- 2. Line a large baking sheet with parchment paper and set aside.

- 3. In a large bowl combine coconut, chocolate chips, almonds, and sweetened condensed milk. Stir until combined.
- 4. Scoop out dough with a cookie scoop onto prepared baking sheet.
- 5. Moisten the tips of your fingers with water and shape into discs. Pat the tops flat.
- 6. Bake cookies for 12 to 14 minutes or until tips of coconut are just starting to turn golden brown.
- 7. Let cool on baking sheet.
- 8. Enjoy!

- 12. The hydraulic thruster and cylinder used to bring the Yeti to life atop Expedition Everest uses more power than a 747 jet engine.







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Skepticism about electric cars

re you ready for self-driving cars? How about vehicles powered by electricity, not gasoline? The AAA took a look at public sentiment about both possible transportation futures.



As the Green Car Reports website reports, 50% of survey participants said they expect most cars will drive themselves by 2029, but only 40% thought most vehicles will be electric by that year.

AAA explains the lower figure for electric cars by citing other survey results indicating that 59% of drivers aren't sure that their range on the highway and in the city is as good or better than that of gas-powered vehicles, although Green Car Reports says that EVs are more efficient and have more range in the city. Consumers said gasoline would have to reach \$5 gallon before they'd consider buying an electric car.

Parents risk retirement to help kids

ost parents want to help their children financially when they're just starting out, but the costs can be substantial: A Bankrate survey found that many U.S. parents are risking their retirement savings to support their children as they begin their careers.

Asked, "Would you say you have sacrificed/are sacrificing your own retirement savings in order to help your adult children?" 17% of respondents answered, "Yes, a lot," and 34% answered, "Yes, somewhat." On the other hand, 41 percent responded, "No, not at all." (For 9%, the questions didn't apply because they hadn't started or aren't saving money for retirement.)

Explorer dives to deepest depths yet

How low can you go? A Texas explorer has gone lower than anyone ever before, taking a submersible to a depth of 35,853 feet in the Mariana Trench, according to an article on the UPI website. It's a new record, beating the previous by 52 feet.

The team behind the dive believes it has found at least three new aquatic species living under the sea, one of them an amphipod with long appendages.



The explorer, Victor Vescovo, said, "We feel like we have just created, validated, and opened a powerful door to discover and visit any place, any time, in the ocean—which is 90% unexplored."

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



