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

Interesting February Trivia

kay ... already, I know it is the month of valentines and chocolate hearts, but what else do you know about this often blustery month with the fewest days in the modern calendar year? Here are some interesting trivia tidbits about the blustery often harsh 2nd month of the year on the modern calendar.

February is the second month, and has 28 days, except on Leap Years when it has 29 (2000, 2004, 2008, and 2012).

It is named after the Roman god Februus. The Latin root word februa means purification; and the Romans held their celebration of purification during the time of the month of February. The Welsh originally called the second month of the year - "y mis bach" meaning the little month. During the time of Shakespeare it was called 'Feberell.'

The flower of this month is a violet or sometimes a primrose and the birthstone is amethyst (which represents sincerity).

Three big holidays are held in February: Groundhog's Day (2nd), St. Valentine's Day (14th) and President's Day (3rd Monday).

February is also Black History Month, a time used to celebrate the accomplishments of people such as George Washington Carver and Martin Luther King, Jr., Marion Anderson, Satchel Paige, Sojourner Truth and many more.

President Andrew Johnson was impeached on February 24, 1868.

On February 25, 1928, a U.S. federal government commission issued the very first Television Broadcast License.

On February 14, 1928 the infamous Valentine's Day Massacre took place in Chicago.

John Glenn (astronaut and US Senator) was the first man to orbit the earth on February 20, 1962.

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

St. Valentine's Day is the most romantic day of the year and has been for many centuries; however do you know the trivia behind the holiday? These silly (but intriguing) Valentine's Day trivia and unusual Valentine's Day fun fast facts will give you some answers.

- 2nd Highest Card Sending Holiday. The greeting card association estimates that approximately one billion valentine's are sent annually world-wide, making it the second highest card sending holiday, behind Christmas.

- Valentine's Day Cards. Valentine's Day is not just for lovers anymore. More than 190 Valentine's Day cards are bought every year, including cards for friends, family, and lovers. If you add in the Valentine's that children exchange in class, that number increases to over 1 billion Valentine's per year.

- Married Valentine's. During the mid-17th century, even married folk took a Valentine and that person was not always their legal significant other.

- Meaning of the word Valentine. The name Valentine comes from the Latin word valor, meaning worthy.

- Name for Valentine's Day. Valentine's Day was named for two men, both Christian martyrs named Valentine who were associated with romantic love in the middle ages.

- Official Holiday. St. Valentine's Day was declared an official holiday in 1537 when England's King Henry VIII declared it for the first time.

- Unmarried Valentine's. In the Middle Ages, people believed that the first unmarried person of the opposite sex that they met on the morning of Valentine's Day was the person they were destined to marry.

- Valentine Birds. February 14th was long associated with fertility and love even before St. Valentine lived. It was the day that birds traditionally chose their mates.

- Valentine Love Messages. Elaborate handmade love messages, cards and gifts for Valentine's Day became popular during the 17th century.

- Valentine Robins Overhead. It was believed that if a woman saw a robin flying overhead on Valentine's Day, it meant she would marry a sailor.

- Valentine's Day Gift Spending. Consumers spend an average of over \$75 on Valentine's Day gifts, the most popular being chocolates, food, wine, and flowers.

Our mothers taught us to buckle our boots, put on our mittens, wear a raincoat and never seek shelter under a tree in a thunderstorm. If today's meteorologists were around scaring people in the caveman era, we'd still be there, cowering in the caves.

The United States had hurricanes when I was growing up; they're not something new. The weather service named them like they do today, except they only used women's names. Now men's names are alternated with women's. I guess it's the Weather Service's attempt to be politically correct. Hurricane Hazel blew through here in 1954; it was the talk of the town for decades. Some of us old coots still talk about it. But, every thunderstorm sliding off the west coast of Africa wasn't portrayed as a looming threat to life and limb and obsessed over for weeks on end by the meteorologists on the evening news.

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

Another stipulation ruled that no year divisible by 100 would have a leap year, except if it was divisible by 400. Thus, 1900 was not a leap year ... but 2000 was! Go figure.

WERE YOU A LEAP YEAR BABY?

According to astrologers, those born under the sign of Pisces on February 29 have unusual talents and personalities reflecting their special status. Most have to wait every four years to "officially" observe their birthdays, but leap year babies typically choose either February 28 or March 1 to celebrate the years that aren't leap years.

LEAP YEAR TRADITIONS

As the story goes, the tradition of women romantically pursuing men in leap years began in 5th century Ireland, when St. Bridget complained to St. Patrick about the fair sex having to wait for men to propose.

Patrick finally relented and set February 29 aside as the day set aside allowing women the right to ask for a man's hand in marriage.

The tradition continued in Scotland, when Queen Margaret declared in 1288 that on February 29 a woman had the right to pop the question to any man she fancied. Menfolk who refused were faced with a fine in the form of a kiss, a silk dres, or a pair of gloves given to the rejected lady fair.

A similar modern American tradition, Sadie Hawkins Day, honors "the homeliest gal in the hills" created by Al Capp in the cartoon strip Li'l Abner. In the famous story line, Sadie and every other woman in town were allowed on that day to pursue and catch the most eligible bachelors in Dogpatch. Although the comic strip placed Sadie Hawkins Day in November, today it as become almost synonymous with February 29.

I'm getting the nail polish anyway. I can use the pity. And just the opposite of the popular Netflix series - "Orange is the new black." - Black will be my new orange.


