# **October Trivia**

Ctober," the tenth month in the Gregorian calendar, received its name from the Latin numeral octo meaning "eight," because in the days of the old Roman calendar it was the eighth month.

One of the notable days in October is Columbus Day, October 12, honoring the discovery of America by the Italian map-maker and explorer, Christopher Columbus. It is celebrated as Discovery Day in Central and South America and was set aside as a holiday in the United States in 1892 by President Harrison.

Hawaii has a special October event called "the Aloha Festival," sometimes described as the "Mardi Gras of the Pacific." It is observed with pageantry, street dancing, hulu festivals, luaus, parades, and fancy balls.

October gave its name to one of the best-known German fall festivals. Oktoberfest started on October 17, 1810, the wedding day of King Ludwig I. It still retains the name, even though the festivities may start in September, with October having only a partial share of the time schedule.

An important October day for the entire world is October 24, United Nations Day, which commemorates the founding of the United Nations on October 24, 1945. It is a holiday for many of the member nations and is generally observed by all nations as a way of publicizing the aims and achievements of the world organization.

The month ends with Halloween or All Hallow's Eve. It is a religious festival in some countries but a trick-or-treat night in the United States, when small children in costume roam through their neighborhoods to solicit candy or cookies.

The flowers for October are the calendula and the cosmos. The birthstones are the opal and the tourmaline.

# October 31

Birthday of John Keats (October 31, 1795 - February 23, 1821). English poet trained as a surgeon but turned to poetry. The Eve of St. Agnes and other poems assure him a permanent place in world literature. Keats, known as the {Poet's Poet," is buried in the Protestant cemetery in Rome.

Birthday of Juliett Gordon Low (October 31, 1860 - January 17, 1927). American youth leader and founder of the Girl Scouts of America.

Birthday of Sir George Hubert Wilkins (October 31, 1888 - Nov. 30/Dec. 1, 1958). Australian polar explorer, the first to fly an airplane in the Antarctic and to fly over both polar regions.

Nevada Admission Day, a legal holiday, celebrating Nevada's admission to the Union on October 31, 1864, as the thirty-sixth state.

Halloween, All Hallow's eve, or Beggars' Night, a festival for children, known in the United States as Trick-or-Treat night, when costumed youngsters roam their neighborhoods with open bags for treats and with soap for the windows of their absent or ungiving neighbors.



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National Magic Day, honoring the skills of magicians and commemorating the death of the great magician Harry Houdini on October 31, 1926

Reformation Day, commemorating Luther's signing of the theses. The Sunday preceding October 31 is usually observed as Reformation Sunday in Lutheran churches. Called "Luther's Theses Day" in some parts of Germany in memory of October 31, 1517, when Martin Luther posted his ninety-five theses in Wittenberg.

UNICEF Day, a day set aside by presidential proclamation in the United States and observed in many nations for the purpose of aiding the United Nations International Children's Fund.



# A Brief Biography

### Juliette Gordon Low Founder of Girl Scouts of America

Early Life

Born Juliette Magill Kinzie Gordon on October 31, 1860, in Savannah, Georgia, "Daisy," as she was affectionately known, descended from a long line of strong and independent women. Her home, often referred to simply as the Birthplace, was designated a registered National Historic Landmark in 1965.

Juliette was a sensitive, curious, and adventurous girl known for her sense of humor, compassion, and concern for others. She was interested in athletics, the arts, animals, and nature - attributes that would one day become central to the Girl Scout Movement.

As a child and young adult, she experienced several ear injuries resulting in almost total hearing loss that affected her for the remainder of her life.

She married William Mackay Low in 1886, and together they set up homes in both England and Georgia. Juliette returned often to the United States to connect with her many friends and family members - and also to find support during what ultimately proved to be a calamitous marriage that ended shortly before her husband's death in 1905

Birth of a Movement

A meeting in 1912 with Sir Robert Baden-Powell, the founder of Boy Scouts, inspired Juliette to establish Girl Scouts that same year. Telephoning a cousin from her home, she announced, "I've got something for the girls of Savannah, and all of America, and all the world, and we're going to start it tonight!"

From that first gathering of a small troop of 18 culturally and ethnically diverse girls, Juliette broke the conventions of the time - reaching across class, cultural, and ethnic boundaries to ensure all girls, including those with so-called disabilities, had a place to grow and develop their leadership skills.

Using her innate talent for fund raising and public relations, combined with her vast network of friends and supporters, she led Girl Scouts with passion and determination - ensuring it was, and always would be, an experience that was "girl led."

Juliette Gordon Low died January 17, 1927, at her home in Savannah, Georgia, after a long and private struggle with breast cancer.

### An Enduring Legacy

After her death, her friends honored her by establishing the Juliette Low World Friendship Fund, which finances international projects for Girl Scouts and Girl Guides around the world.

She is remembered nearly 100 years after her passing with camps, schools, and scholarships established in her honor. Other tributes include a postage stamp, numerous biographies, and even an opera about her life and achievements. She was posthumously awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom by President Barack Obama in 2012.

Today, the vision of Juliette Gordon Low lives on in Girl Scouts across the nation and the globe who carry on her legacy. She is remembered and honored by generations of people whose lives have been touched by Girl Scouts, the premier leadership development organization for girls around the world.

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# **25 Delicious Facts About ... Chocolate**

- 1. Nazis would use chocolate to lure Jews onto cattle cars destined for concentration camps.
- 2. The first chocolate chip cookie was invented in 1937 by Ruth Wakefield who ran the "Toll House Inn." The term "Toll House" is now legally a generic word for chocolate chip cookies. It is the most popular cookie worldwide and is the official cookie of Massachusetts.
- 3. The country whose people eat the most chocolate is Switzerland, with 22 pounds eaten per person each year. Australia and Ireland follow with 20 pounds and 19 pounds per person, respectively. The United Sates comes in at 11th place, with approximately 12 pounds of chocolate eaten by each person every year.
- 4. Chocolate is so important to cacao farmers in Indonesia that they built a 20-foot statue of a pair of hands simply holding a cacao pod.
- 5. In Oaxaca, Mexico, healers called curanderos use chocolate to treat several illnesses such as bronchitis. In some regions, children drink chocolate in the morning to ward off scorpion and bee stings.
- 6. Over 50% of adults in American prefer chocolate to other flavors.
- 7. In a small study at Indiana University, cyclists who drank chocolate milk after a workout has less fatigue and scored higher on endurance tests than those who had a sports drink.
- 8. The largest and oldest chocolate company in the U.S. is Hershey's. Hershey's produces over one billion pounds of chocolate product annually.
- 9. The most expensive chocolate in the world is the "Madeleine" and was created by Fritz Knipschildt of Knipschildt Chocolatier in Connecticut.
- 10. There are actually zero cacao solids in white chocolate.
- 11. A drawing from the Mayan Madrid Codex shows gods piercing their ears and sprinkling their blood over the cacao harvest, indicating a strong association between blood and cacao in Meso-American tradition.
- 12. In the ancient Mayan civilization, humans were often sacrificed to guarantee a good cacao harvest. First, the prisoner was forced to drink a cup of chocolate, which sometimes was spiked with blood because the Maya believed it would convert the victim's heart into a cacao pod.
- 13. Belgium produces 172,000 tons of chocolate per year. Over 2,000 chocolate shops are found throughout the country, may located in Brussels where Godiva chocolate originated.
- 14. Owing to the nature of cacao butter, chocolate is the only edible substance that melts at around 93° F, just below body temperature. This means that after placing a piece of chocolate on your tongue, it will begin to melt.
- 15. Commercial chocolate usually contains such low amounts of cacao solids that is more likely the sugar that the chocolate lovers are addicted to.
- 16. The cacao beans naturally contains almost 300 different flavors and 500 separate aromas.
- 17. Cacao has been around for millions of years and is probably one of the oldest of nature's foods.
- 18. Motecuhzoma Xocoyotzin (Montezuma II), the 9th emperor of the Aztecs, was one of the most wealthy and powerful men in the world. He as also known as The Chocolate King. At the height of his power, he had a stash of nearly a billion cacao beans.









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- 19. Columbus's son Ferdinand recorded that when the Mayans dropped some cacao beans, "they all stopped to pick it up, as though an eye had fallen." Columbus, who was searching for a route to India, did not see the potential of the cacao market and mistook them for shriveled almonds.
- 20. In Mayan civilization, cacao beans were the currency, and counterfeiting cacao beans out of painted clay had become a thriving industry. Goods could be priced in units of cacao: a slave cost 100 beans, the services of a prostitute cost 10 beans, and a turkey cost 20 beans. While the Spanish conquistadors horded gold, the Mesoamericans horded cacao beans. In some parts of Latin America, the beans were used as a currency as late as the 19th century.
- 21. The first machine-made chocolate was produced in Barcelona, Spain, in 1780.
- 22. When English Buccaneers overran a Spanish ship loaded with cacao beans, they set it on fire, thinking the beans were sheep dung.
- 23. Madame du Barry, reputed to be a nymphomaniac, encouraged her lovers to drink chocolate in order to keep up with her.
- 24. Some scholars link the growing popularity of chocolate houses in Europe, such as the Cocoa-Tree Chocolate House on St. James Street in London, with the beginnings of the Enlightenment. That was the drink on the table when 18th-century thinkers started to question long-held verities: the supremacy of the Church, the rights of kinds, and potential for improvement in the common man and woman.
- 25. One of Louis XV's many mistresses, Madame de Pompadour, became a famous chocolate addict and used it as a treatment for her sexual dysfunctions. The Marquis de Sade, possibly the world's first sexologist, was also hooked on chocolate.

Statehood was rushed to help ensure three electoral votes for Abraham Lincoln's reelection and add to the Republican congressional majorities. The state surely was "Battle Born" (one of its several state mottoes).

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
