• Get enough rest. You need to be alert when driving, and getting into a car while drowsy or fatigued won't help your concentration. Schedule sufficient sleep and rest for yourself. If you start nodding off or you can't keep your eyes on the road, stop as soon as possible and find a safe place to get some rest.

• Drive defensively. Keep an eye on other cars, and don't try to be king of the road. Maintain a safe distance from other vehicles, watch for trouble spots, steer clear of erratic drivers and speeders, and focus on reaching your destination safely, even if you're a few minutes late.

Avoiding Seasonal Illness

Sleep is critical to maintain vital immune systems. Experts recommend 7-8 hours of sleep per night for optimum results. Indulge in daily naps to give your body the quality time it needs to rejuvenate.

Fluid consumption keeps the mucous membranes in your nose and lungs hydrated, which deters germs from becoming active in those places. Vitamin A can help maintain moisture of the mucous membranes in your nose and mouth, as they are often the first line of defense against infection.

Putting these methods into practice in your daily life can help you maintain overall good health and hopefully limit your susceptibility to seasonal illnesses.

Imagination exercise: Think like a child

ant to become more creative? Try thinking like a young child. An experiment at North Dakota State University (and recounted on the Ideas to Go website) took two groups of adult graduate students and asked a simple question: "If school was canceled for the day, what would \checkmark you do? Where would you go? Who would you visit?"

But one group was given one additional piece of guidance: "Pretend you're 7 years old." Both groups had 10 minutes to write down their answers, and then were given a series of creativity tests. The group that had been instructed to think like 7-year-olds exhibited higher degrees of creative thinking than the "adults."

So whenever you're looking for innovative solutions, try lowering your mental age a bit. The results might be exciting.

Try these three tips to improve imagination

Creative ideas don't come from nowhere. You've got to actively seek them out, not wait for some muse to strike you with inspiration. Here are a few tips for sparking your imagination when you need to solve a problem or develop something new:

- •Think when you're tired. When you're tired, your inhibitions and inner censor aren't as powerful, and you may generate something unexpected. Instead of tackling problems first thing in the morning when you're fresh, let your mind roam later in the day when you're feeling a little fatigued.
- •Get some exercise. In addition to contributing to your physical well-being, exercise can stimulate your creativity by helping your mental health. In experiments, participants who work out to exercise videos tend to come up with more ideas and solutions to problems than counterparts who merely watch the same videos.
- •Have a little noise. While silence is best for detail-oriented tasks, a little ambient noise like music or the bustling of a coffee shop has been shown to enhance creative thought. Don't play loud heavy metal or work next to a construction site, but set up an environment where some quiet activity around you will spark your mental muscles.



hen was the last time you received a handwritten letter in the mail? For most it's a dying or lost form of communication, although nearly everyone I know still loves to receive personal pieces of mail. In the evolution of modern communication, handwritten



letters evolved to electronic mail - or email, and now social media forms like Facebook and Twitter are quickly taking over. However, many don't understand their benefits, or the technology, and are cautious about getting onboard.

Or "Like" your favorite retail store or restaurant and receive Facebook Fanonly specials and coupons.

As intrigued as they are, many older adults like Deborah, a 64-year-old grandmother, simply feel that they don't belong on a site like Facebook because they don't have anything to contribute. "I don't do enough interesting things to post constant updates. Why would people care?" she said. She's already started and closed a Facebook account once, but was coaxed back onto the social networking site by her adult children. They explained that it's an excellent way to keep up with their lives and see photos of her grandchildren, so Deborah's giving it another try.

Many people are simply hesitant to try a new technology or worry about posting too much information online, however social media can be a fantastic way to both rekindle lost friendships and keep in touch with current ones. - 2. Post only what you want made public Never post your personal address or home phone number. Even "About Me" information such as the city you live in, where you work and your personal email address are totally optional.
- 3. Manage your privacy settings Facebook actually does a good job of explaining how to lock your privacy down, even if they don't have the most secure default settings. Read their guide here: http://www.facebook.com/policy.php
- 4. Don't Overshare Be cautious about what personal information you post on any social media site. Going to Hawaii for three weeks? Awesome, but instead of notifying a large chunk of people you'll be gone, why not share the photos on Facebook once you return.
- 5. Don't unthinkingly respond to friends in distress This goes for email as well if you ever receive a post requesting money to help out a friend, do the smart thing and call them in person. As with all matters of identity, verify the source.

Besides keeping up with friends and family, social media also can expand your social world by connecting you to new ideas, cultures and people. You're no longer limited by geographic regions or boundaries - engage in conversations with people across the globe, without limitations. You can be as active on the site as you want to. Disappearing planet? Not exactly a mystery

The first planet discovered in the so-called "Goldilocks Zone," an orbit that's neither too hot nor too cold to support life, may not be so special after all. In fact, according to the Popular Science website, it may not even exist.

In 2010, astronomers announced that Gliese 581g, 20 light years from Earth, was a candidate for further study in hopes of finding evidence of extraterrestrial life. Now, they're saying that the "planet" may have been a

sunspot all along. Since astronomers can't spot individual worlds at such vast distances directly, they rely on observations of a star's illumination. A recent review of the data taking into account new information about how fast the Gliese star spins found that the original evidence of a new world was no longer valid, along with signs of a second potential habitable planet.

Three other planets in the system have been confirmed as real, though, and scientists say that most of the other 977 exoplanets tracked by the Kepler Space Telescope are still out there.

Odds & Ends

Believe it or not? We're going with 'not'

History is full of practical jokers, some more successful than others. Check out these three tales of hoaxes that seemed plausible—before they fell apart:

- •I'll take Manhattan. A carpenter by the name of Lozier claimed in 1825 that Manhattan was in danger of sinking because of overbuilding on the lower end. Lozier proposed that the lower end be sawed off, dragged into New York harbor, and then reattached. He came up with a plan and commissioned numerous laborers. When the day came for the big move, the laborers gathered with supplies and provisions. Lozier never showed up.
- •Not so elementary. Sir Arthur Conan Doyle created the famous detective Sherlock Holmes, but his own deductive powers weren't always superior to anyone else's. Two young girls, 16 and 10, once sent him a picture of fairies supposedly photographed in the English village of Cottingley. Doyle brought them national attention. Photography experts declared there had been no touching up or manipulating of the picture. In the early 1980s, the two girls (now grown women) had admitted that they had posed with paper cutouts of fairies, which had been supported by hatpins.
- •Out of the Stone Age. In 1971, the world was told that a tribe of Stone Age people, never exposed to modern civilization, was found deep in the jungles of the Philippines. There was great hubbub about the discovery. Then in 1986, a Swiss journalist revisited the tribe, only to find them living in huts and dressed in T-shirts and shorts. The group of people then revealed that they had been instructed by a government official to pretend they were cave dwellers.
